





Ambedkar University Delhi

Ambedkar University, Delhi (AUD) was established by the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi through an Act of Legislature in 2007 and was notified in July 2008.

AUD has been conceived as a unitary university focusing largely on research and higher learning in areas of knowledge broadly under the domain of social sciences, humanities and the liberal arts.

Mandated to focus on research and teaching in the social sciences and humanities, and guided by Dr Ambedkar's vision of bridging equality and social justice with excellence, AUD considers it to be its mission to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in higher education. AUD is committed to creating an institutional culture characterised by humanism, non-hierarchical and collegial environment, teamwork and nurturing of creativity.

AUD functions through its various Schools and Centres. Schools are expected to have relatively well demarcated epistemic contours. The distinct typologies in the nomenclature of the Schools reflect the focus on areas of knowledge and professional specialisations, which are relevant to contemporary times.

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Education at AUD



Schools at AUD

There are, at present, nine Schools that have been established at AUD. These are:

- The School of Undergraduate Studies
- The School of Development Studies
- The School of Human Ecology
- The School of Human Studies
- The School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship
- The School of Education Studies
- The School of Liberal Studies
- The School of Culture and Creative Expressions
- The School of Design.

The School of Law, Governance and Citizenship, is expected to start functioning in the near future.

The School of Undergraduate Studies (SUS)

SUS is the academic home for the undergraduate programmes. Its seven BA Honours programmes offer students a unique liberal arts education that acquaints them with diverse approaches to knowledge. The undergraduate programme at AUD offers students a wide choice of courses to choose from. It teaches students to think critically and creatively; to analyse and reason; to communicate effectively; and to make evidence-based conclusions. It aims to achieve a good balance between the range and depth of the subjects studied.

The School of Development Studies (SDS)

SDS was one of the first schools that became functional at AUD. The School offers an MA programme in Development Studies. The first batch of MA Development Studies students completed their programme in 2011. In the same year, the School also launched a Ph.D. programme in Development Studies.

The School of Human Ecology (SHE)

SHE is engaged with the pressing issues of development and environment addressed through a diverse, interdisciplinary programme. The school envisages to develop its core strengths in the areas of Core and Applied Ecology, Political Ecology, Development and Social Change, Ecological Economics and Environmental History. A host of programmes at MA and PhD level

are being planned at the school with a view to create professional expertise with interdisciplinary and plural perspectives. At present the School offers an MA Programme in Environment and Development and a PhD Programme in Human Ecology.

The School of Human Studies (SHS)

SHS is an explorative, interdisciplinary space for thinking and reflecting on the myriad meanings of being human. The programmes being housed by SHS focus as much on the promise and potential of the human, as on the actual historical exclusions and marginalisation that humans have led to.

At present the School is offering MA in Psychology (Psycho-Social Clinical Studies) and MA in Gender Studies. The three MPhil Programmes on offer at SHS are MPhil in Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking; MPhil/PhD in Women and Gender Studies and MPhil in Development Practice (in collaboration with SDS). In 2012, SHS also launched a PhD Programme in Psychology.

The School of Liberal Studies (SLS)

SLS offers MA Programmes in History, Economics, English and Sociology.

The existing and the planned activities of the SLS are geared towards long-term objectives of preparing a new generation of young social scientists, who will be both cognitively and methodologically trained, and are socially sensitive.

The School of Business, Public Policy & Social Entrepreneurship (SBPPSE)

SBPPSE has been set up to promote research and provide professional education and training in the field of Business Administration, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship. The 2-year MBA programme offered at the SBPPSE is founded on the belief that there is a need to develop a holistic approach to business and profit within the larger context of the wider society and economy.

The School proposes to launch a one-year Diploma in Publishing in July 2013.

The School of Culture and Creative Expressions (SCCE)

SCCE is constituted by the principle of integration, creative overlap and interdisciplinary processes between varied creative practices and disciplines, including historical, theoretical and critical engagements. The School is a breeding ground for the development of newer and different art making practices and theoretical insights. The mission of the School is in the direction of finding interdisciplinary paradigms, engaged scholarship, and greater amalgamation between various arts; theory and practice on the one hand, and between various arts on the other.



The School of Education Studies (SES)

SES at AUD is envisioned to evolve as a community of professionals and scholars endeavouring to understand education in its historical and contemporary contexts through engaged scholarship and practice. The School proposes to bridge the gap between the theory and practice of education in its multiple locations – in that it would foster greater convergence between the study of education as a social phenomenon and the preparation of professional educators. The School would work towards development of a rigorous and praxis-based theoretical perspective for analysis and research while engaging with teacher education, curriculum, policy, planning and administration.

The School of Design (SDes)

The School of Design (SDes) at AUD is unique in its conception – this is the first time in India that design education will be embedded in and collaborating with the humanities and social sciences. The School draws from its distinct position within a Humanities and Social Sciences University to amalgamate core attributes of design with socially complex issues, needs and sectors. By relocating the object centred design focus to that of the “social”, SDes proposes to create better informed, sensitised, empowered and robust communities through new products, services, systems, interfaces and scenarios. This setting offers an opportunity to re-visualise design education and practice in order to creatively meet the multiple challenges offered by a rapidly changing, deeply interconnected local and global landscape. Contemplating the larger role and potential of design in Indian context, SDes will prepare design students to engage in challenges of visualising new services, systems, interfaces, products and enterprises. The School of Design is offering its first program, Masters in Social Design from July 2013.

Centres at AUD


The Centres at AUD have a relatively flexible structure and comprise a group of professionals and scholars put together, more or less in project mode, to undertake research, documentation, training and some teaching in lesser known or neglected areas of social and academic concerns.

The Centres, as conceptualised at AUD, are identified as distinct locations for project-based research, policy advocacy, capacity building and networking with the community. The Centres are visualised to have project staff appointed on part-time and contractual basis from time to time and can also be staffed by faculty from the various Schools of study concurrently for a finite time.

Currently the following three Centres are functioning at AUD:

- **The Centre for Community Knowledge,**
- **The Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development,**
- **The Centre for Social Science Research Methods**

AUD is in the process of establishing a few other Centres, such as the Centre for Innovation & Entrepreneurship, the Centre for Publishing, the Centre for Leadership and Change, the Centre for Equality and Social Justice, the Centre for Engaged Spiritualities and Peace Building and the Centre for Social Applications of Mathematics.





Life at AUD

AUD Campus

AUD is currently located at Lothian Road, Kashmere Gate, Delhi -11006, which is within a 10-minute walk from the Kashmere Gate metro station. AUD hopes to move into its permanent campus in Dheerpur, near Kingsway Camp (North Delhi) in the next four to five years. The University visualizes its campus to be futuristic, both as physical and social space. The campus will be energy-efficient, ecologically-frugal and disabled-friendly. It is hoped that it will constitute space which will inspire openness and commonality; space carved out of the urban landscape of Delhi which attempt to blend compact human habitations and workplaces in a seamless continuum with nature; space which include academic, residential, recreational and social facilities for students and staff.

AUD is a non smoking campus.

Consumption and sale of illegal drugs or any other intoxicating substance are strictly prohibited within AUD campus.

Gender-Sensitive Campus Spaces

AUD is committed to ensuring a dynamic and participatory academic experience and safe campus environment. Our endeavour is to evolve campus spaces for our students and staff, both women and men, in which we as individuals and as part of diverse collectives can grow and explore our potential without fear or the burden of prejudices.

Canteens, lawns, corridors, classrooms and other such spaces are spaces where a variety of gender ideologies play out in our daily interactions with our friends and colleagues. Campus spaces and even pedagogy affect the way we perceive and locate each other. Most of the time we struggle with the idea that our casual comments, thoughts, jokes and so on contribute towards consolidating the alienating and offending culture of patriarchy. It would be instructive for us to unpack our 'commonsense' ideas about men and women and the processes by which we gender our understanding of the 'self.' Building 'gender-sensitive,' healthy campus spaces would be crucial for creating an enabling environment where we as individuals and as groups can unfold our creative potential.

The prevalence of sexual harassment is one of the hindrances towards an enabling campus space. While we all might recognize and agree upon extreme forms of harassment, the acts that constitute harassment can be much more general and diffused in our life. It is, therefore, important to understand what constitutes sexual harassment and how it affects our everyday lives in both public and private spheres, in educational institutions and work environments.



Zero Tolerance for Ragging

No form of ragging shall be tolerated in the University campus. Fresh students are advised to desist from doing anything, willingly or against their will, even if ordered to do so by a senior or any other student, and any attempt at ragging should be promptly reported to the Anti-Ragging Squad or to the Dean or to the Head of the Institution, as the case may be.

At AUD, our attempt is to devise methodologies to generate a consciousness amongst the university community that treats the experience of sexual harassment as a violation of one's dignity as well as freedom of mobility, freedom of speech and expression. We are committed to providing a creative and stimulating academic culture and healthy and safe campus life to our students and staff. We welcome all those who join us in the coming year to become a part of this process of creating a campus environment with a unique and fulfilling experience.

AUD Hostel

AUD has at present limited hostel facilities. Students can apply for hostel accommodation once they have secured admission. The application form and brochure for the same will be available at the University Offices and on the AUD website.


Student Life at AUD

Students at AUD start their day with classes, but it gradually transforms into a day where students become a part of a wide range of events happening across the university. At one moment one might see a street play in progress, at the other moment one might walk into a discussion over serious issues. AUD students spend their day engaging in these activities, enjoying each moment with full zeal and then preparing for the events of next day with equal enthusiasm.

Film screenings, literary festivals, musical nights, street plays, poetry recitations and other such events bring diverse kind of culture to the students; they not only enjoy but also learn. A student not only gathers knowledge in lectures but here at AUD, the horizon of education goes beyond the four walls of classes.

The Student Cell

Understanding the need for a student support structure, AUD has created a Student Cell – a peer support group that would hand-hold and assist fellow students, especially those who are facing economic, academic, social or emotional difficulties as well as identify and engage with such difficult experiences of the students. Its initiative rests vitally on the student's sense of responsibility towards themselves and on their sense of identification with the University. Such an effort may help in the creation of an institutional culture that would be marked by a sense of community and ownership, aimed at addressing the alienation that is often felt in such large spaces. The Student Cell would primarily act as a buffer between the students and the administration. It would be a quasi-official body comprising largely of students themselves meant to act as a liaison between Student Services and the students. The Student Cell would become the first space for the students to approach in case of need



Programmes across Schools

The School of Development Studies and the School of Human Studies have jointly launched an MPhil programme in Development Practice in collaboration with PRADAN. The programme involves 'field immersion' for about two semesters in rural and tribal locations.

An MA programme in Global Studies is on the anvil. This involves participation of faculty across several schools.

Research at AUD

At AUD, MPhil and PhD degrees are granted at all the schools of the University, other than the School of Undergraduate Studies. Admissions to the MPhil programmes occur once a year in July-August. Admissions to the PhD programmes generally happen twice a year, in July-August and January-February. The number of seats available in each school for research may vary year to year. Cutting-edge, unconventional and interdisciplinary research in new and established fields is welcomed and encouraged at AUD.



Medium of Instruction

The medium of instruction at AUD is English. However, we encourage students from different linguistic backgrounds to apply for admission to the undergraduate honours programmes at AUD.

Specially designed courses in English are organised to help students improve their language proficiency.

Student Assessment and Evaluation

The purpose of assessment and evaluation at AUD is to facilitate and promote learning with understanding. Students are expected to be regular in attending classes, workshops and other educational exercises. Work done by students during the teaching semester will count for more than the end-of-course examination. Grades will be given to students for performance in tests, classroom presentations, group discussions, fieldwork/project works, term papers and other exercises designed by teachers. Ability to work in a group or design an investigative project may be tested and evaluation may include peer assessment. Results of assessment will be communicated to students in a timely manner so that they have adequate opportunity to improve their subsequent work. Tutorials and mentoring will be important features of all programmes.



Admissions at AUD

Reservation of Seats

Eligibility

To be eligible for MA Programmes at AUD the candidate must have a Bachelor's degree with 45 per cent marks (or equivalent grade) from a recognized university in any discipline. (Relaxation of 5 per cent for candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste, Scheduled Tribes and Physically Handicapped).

For the eligibility criteria for MA Education programme please refer to the Bulletin for SES.

Eligibility for BA Programmes is listed in the Information Bulletin of the School of Undergraduate Studies (SUS), available with this main prospectus, for applicants of Undergraduate courses.

Number of Seats

The total intake this year in most MA programmes is 42 (including general as well as reserved seats as per norms set by the government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi). Total number of seats in MA Education is 30.

The total intake this year in every BA programme is 35. Hence, there will be a total of 245 seats for all the BA programmes for the academic session 2013-14.

Admissions will be made in accordance with the reservation policies of the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi in respect of various social groups and other categories as applicable to institutions of higher education.

Applicants claiming the benefit of reservations will have to produce the requisite certificates from the competent authorities.

A maximum of 2 seats per programme would be allowed for foreign nationals in each BA Honours programme. Further the total number of foreign nationals admitted in all 7 UG programmes cannot exceed 10

NCT category will include those students who have passed their qualifying examination from an institution located in the NCT of Delhi or are residents in the NCT of Delhi.

The quantum of reservation under the social categories mentioned is subject to change according to the Regulations of the Government of the NCT of Delhi.

Each applicant will choose to apply in one of the following Categories :

- Gen** General
- SC** Scheduled Caste
- ST** Scheduled Tribe
- OBC** Other Backward Class, non-creamy layer
- PD** Physically Disabled
- Cw1** Children/ Widows of Defence Personnel, including paramilitary personnel, killed/ disabled in action
- CW2** Children/ Widows of Defence Personnel, including paramilitary personnel, killed/ disabled while on Duty
- CW3** Children/ Widows of Defence Personnel, including paramilitary personnel died in peace time with attribute to military service
- CW4** Children/ Widows of Defence Personnel, including paramilitary personnel disabled in peace time which is attributable to military service
- CW5** Wards of ex-service Personnel and serving personnel including Police personnel who are in receipt of Gallantry Awards
- FS** Foreign Nationals not studying in India

Within the **CW** category, CW1 candidates will have pre-emptive claim over other CW category candidates such as CW2 etc.; CW2 over others such as CW3 etc.; CW3 over others such as CW4 etc.; and CW4 over CW5. Only an Entitlement Certificate issued by Secretary, Kendriya Sainik Board Delhi; Secretary, Rajya/ Zila Sainik Board; Officer-in Charge, Record Office/ First Class Stipendiary Magistrate is acceptable.

OBC candidates need to submit both the caste and the non-creamy layer certificates to claim reservation against OBC quota. Creamy layer OBC candidates should apply as General category candidates.

Those applying under the **PD** category may note that only those candidates who submit proper medical certificates will be considered for admission under this category.

Application Procedure

Applying for Admission to AUD for UG & PG Programmes:

- All applications are computerised; there are no paper application forms.
- A single on-line application form can be used to apply for as many UG programmes as an applicant wishes; similarly one form can be used for as many PG programmes.
- Applications forms can be filled on-campus at the AUD campus in Kashmere Gate or off-campus (on-line) by logging on to **www.aud.ac.in** and following the links provided there.

Before you start filling the online application form, make sure that you have the following:

1. A valid e-mail ID. The password during the registration for the application process will be sent to this e-mail account.
2. Scanned copy of your recent passport size photograph. You will also need the same photograph to affix on the printed form.
3. Scanned copy of your signature

The scanned copies should be in JPEG (.jpg) format and should not exceed 50 KB (for photograph) and 20 KB (for signature).

If you choose to apply on-campus, you are advised to have the scanned copies of your photograph and signature sent to your e-mail account for access during application filling.

Last date for submission of Application is 22nd June 2013.

Off-Campus Application

1. Visit the AUD website <http://www.aud.ac.in>; You will be directed to the **Online Registration page**.
2. You will be required to register with a valid E-mail ID; to which a password will be sent. You can then log-in to fill your application form by entering the E-mail ID and the password provided.
3. Fill in required details in the online application form. Further detailed instructions for filling the form are provided on the website.
4. After completing the application form, verify the data entered. No data can be modified after the registration is confirmed.
5. Thereafter, you will be asked to pay the application fee through **Internet Payment Gateway**. Confirm payment through credit card / debit card or internet banking.
6. After successful online payment, you will be directed back to the admission website. A page (acknowledgement) will appear stating the candidate's name, registration number, address, space for photograph and space for signature. You will need a scanned copy of your passport size photo and signature to upload at this point in the application form.

7. In case you are paying application fee by DD, you must send the DD (made in favour of 'Ambedkar University Delhi'), along with a print out of the application filled by you to:

On-Campus Application

Assistance is available at AUD campus, to help you fill the computerised application form and apply for admission:

1. Visit the **AUD campus at Kashmere Gate** with the necessary documents and information required to complete the application form.
2. You must first make the payment for the application fees at the Admissions office. You may pay your application fee in cash or through a Demand Draft drawn in favour of "Ambedkar University Delhi", payable at New Delhi. (You are advised to keep the cash payment receipt or demand draft details in hand while filling the application form.)
3. Proceed to the help desk at the admission

office to fill your computerised application form. You will be required to follow all the steps that are to be followed in case of off-campus application. Keep ready the scanned copy of your passport size photo and signature and all other information and Caste/Category Certificate (if applicable). You will also need the original passport size photo to affix on the printed copy of the form.

The application process must be completed by 22 June 2013 and the Demand Draft paid for application must be submitted in hand at the University office by 4 p.m. on 22 June 2013.

Selection Procedure

Fee Structure

The vision guiding AUD is the commitment that prospective students learn to value and appreciate the social privileges they enjoy because of the heavy subsidy that goes into public institutions of higher education in India. Based on this philosophy, AUD has instituted a **differential fee structure** for different programmes, with an understanding that the upper slab is envisaged not to be so high that only a particular segment of society could afford it and the lower slab not so low that the sense of responsibility among the students goes missing. Therefore, a minimum proportion of the cost actually to be incurred by the University for each of its students is reflected in the fee being set per semester.

- The **differential fee structure** ranges from Rs1000/- to Rs2000/- per credit of course work for most of the courses.
- The fees for most programmes is Rs16000/- per semester,
- In addition students are required to pay Rs500/- per semester toward Student Welfare Fund
- Rs2000/- is to be paid as refundable security deposit.

It may be noted that at present the fee constitutes not more than 10 per cent of the operational cost. At the same time, it is the stated policy of the University to ensure that no deserving prospective student, as far as possible, is denied the opportunity of studying at AUD merely due to her/his inability to pay the fees.

Fee Waivers and Scholarships

The University offers full and partial fee waivers to students who are in need of support given their economic backgrounds. In fact, 25 per cent of the fees collected from students are returned to the economically disadvantaged students by way of Fee waivers and scholarships. **Over the previous 3 years, 229 students have been awarded fee waivers.** Most of these have been full fee waivers.

- Students, whose combined family income is less than Rs 400000/-, will be eligible for fee waiver. A student will continue to receive fee waiver provided s/he is found regular in attending classes and maintains acceptable level of performance in studies.
- At the time of admission, a student can apply for fee waiver by submitting supporting documents.
- If provisionally admitted, s/he will be permitted to take admission without having to pay the fee.
- SC/ST/PwD students are advised to submit their application in the month of February for Scholarships under the SC/ST/PwD categories for the academic session of that year.

Student Welfare Fund

The University has created 'Student Welfare Fund' with the objective of making financial assistance available for meeting the welfare needs of needy students, such as emergent medical assistance, purchase of books & study material, meeting the boarding & lodging expenses equivalent to the amount that is required to avail of AUD hostel facilities, and any other comparable needs of the student.

An amount of Rs500/- per semester is collected from all students towards 'Student Welfare Fund' and an amount equal to that collected from students shall be contributed by the University to this fund. The Student Welfare Fund is managed and monitored by a committee which includes a nominee of the student community.

Through the fee structure as well as the exemptions offered, AUD hopes to inculcate a social sensitivity in its students – to respect what they enjoy as privileges and to be able to serve society in their future professional capacities.

Refund of Fee - University Policy

If the student withdraws admission before orientation, Fee will be refunded with a deduction of Rs1000/-. If the student withdraws admission after orientation, only the Caution Fee will be refunded.

The decision of the Admission Committee on all matters of admission will be final. The jurisdiction of dispute will be limited to the NCT of Delhi.

Foreign Students

A few seats are reserved for foreign students in every programme; Candidates who fulfill the eligibility criteria to apply in this category must note:

1. Foreign nationals may apply for a programme by using either the online facility or on- campus (on-site) facility; however all foreign nationals should submit a letter of recommendation from their consulate or embassy.
2. All foreign nationals must hold a student visa valid for the entire period of study endorsed by the Ministry of External Affairs.
3. The degrees of foreign nationals must be recognized by the Association of Indian Universities.

Fee for foreign students will be Rs.2000/ per credit for each semester and Rs.500/- per semester towards 'Student Welfare Fund'. In addition they will be required to pay Rs4000/- as refundable deposit.

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
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
