

RENDEZVOUS WITH VICE CHANCELLOR

Professor Anu Singh Lather

This period witnessed the sufferings of the second wave of the pandemic, what measures did the University administration take to reach out to its own community of students, faculty and staff?

Due to COVID-19, entire world witnessed unprecedented times; everything was in pause mode including the ever vibrant education world. A role of higher education institute is much more than what we imagine in terms of classrooms teaching and awarding degrees. Higher education institutions including universities are meant to facilitate learning and nurturing and promoting creativity, idea generation, creating perspectives and to prepare a responsible and sensitive citizen for the society and the nation. It's all about providing integrated experience for developing compassionate, sensitive and well-meaning human beings. The challenge gave us an opportunity to think beyond and explore, how a varsity, particularly a public institution will work. As far as assessments and evaluation of the batches, AUD has designed its own continuous assessment and evaluation system, which provides opportunity to students to holistically develop with immediate feedback from faculty, given regularly on their performance to take corrective measures. On the other hand, it also gives faculty a wider scope to understand the students, counsel them about their performance by proving remedial opportunities. During this period of COVID-19 pandemic, teachers have also given emotional support to students.

AUD's response to the pandemic and support to the Staff/Faculty and students was a collective effort. The different constituents of the University, the administration, staff, faculty and students came together to make sense of this collective experience and address the shared challenges. University adopted multi-pronged strategy to reach out to its constituents.

• Facilitation for online teaching:

To provide exposure to faculty related to online teaching, several webinars were conducted.

• Psychological support by Ehsaas Clinic

Ehsaas Psychotherapy and Counselling Clinic had started an initiative to offer psychological support and counselling to the students of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University Delhi, to help cope with the sudden disruption of way of life, due to the



COVID-19 pandemic. Some members from the *Ehsaas* clinic were available on phone and email to help students to deal with the anxieties created by sudden isolation, change of routine and anxieties about academic and career plans. The opportunity to share problems and difficulties with therapists leads to considerable reduction in distress.

• Student Grievance Cell

The University has created a "Student Grievance Cell – COVID-19" in the wake of out spread of COVID-19 pandemic for handling grievances of the students related to examinations and other academic activities arising due to this pandemic and notify the same to the students. The students had been advised to register such grievances atstudentgrievance-covid19@aud.ac.in.

Medical Facility

The University started Doctors Tele Consultation facility for all its employees in order to mitigate the scarcity of the medical consultation and timely availability of medical care. University had also arranged for oxygen backup and transport facility in case emergency arises. The office of the Registrar continuously communicated with the employees for further facilitation. The University also organized vaccination drives for all the staff and their family members and students.

• Laptop and Internet reimbursement

AUD implemented need based special internet package reimbursement policy for its students in the last semester. University also provided laptop to the students as per requirements.

As the head of the institution, what was the primary thought and motivation that drove you behind taking

these above steps?

The nation saw an unprecedented upsurge in the spread of COVID-19 epidemic followed by high human fatality rate. The things have become more severe and difficult. The situation and circumstances required us to be more humane by helping and supporting our fellow colleagues, friends and family members. The suffering and pain we all underwent as a society has also connected us emotionally.

I made a commitment that the University administration will stand with all its members in these difficult times with all its sincerity and in every possible way.

Has the pandemic taught us the renewed importance of community outreach and engagement? What are the directions that AUD is taking towards this?

One very clear message of the pandemic was that we can win this battle together. It was a fight for survival of everyone, for everyone and by everyone. The pandemic shook the foundation of the individualistic society and forced us to rethink community living.

As a measure to institutionalise the community engagement, the University is planning to launch Outreach and Extension Division with the vision to engage with people, cultures and communities. The division among other things will design certificate course on Care and Crisis Management for community leaders and development practitioners. These will help to build a continuous preparedness in the population, acting as bulwark at the time of such crisis in future.

As a social science and humanities university, does AUD intend to carry out research projects, generate knowledge, start courses related to this global health crisis?

The core function of any University is teaching and research. It is the research culture and research output that will sustain the universities in future. At AUD, we have taken certain measures to create a research ecosystem. AUD's Merit Research Fellowship Scheme, Reward system for research publications in quality journals, dedicated hall for PhD students and augmenting e-library facilities by providing platforms

such as Refread to researchers are some of the initiatives that AUD has taken.

The University has launched 'Master of Public Health' (MPH), a two-year post-graduate programme, from the academic year 2021-22.

The Programme aims to impart core competencies of public health from a perspective that looks at disease prevention, health promotion, health protection and well-being at a broad population level, with key focus on the role of the State. In addition, developing skills to understand complexities, systems thinking in addressing public health concerns and promoting cultural competence to empathise, communicate, learn and practice amongst diverse populations shall also be the stated aim of the programme. The Program will focus on knowledge and skills in the core public health domains like epidemiology, biostatistics, social and behavioural sciences, health economics and policy, environmental health, food and nutrition, public health administration and public health law. The programme will include a strong practice component with about 25% of credits focused on practice/field-based and/or independent work.

Having passed more than one year of the pandemic, what are the broad future plans for a COVID resilient, sustainable university?

The university has robust institutional structure in place, which helped the University to deal with the pandemic. Continuous assessment policy can be taken as an example. Despite being severely affected by the pandemic and the lockdown, the University has risen to the challenges and finished the academic session on time. This had been made possible because of the dynamic system of continuous assessment that is at the heart of teaching-learning processes in the University. Such institutional structures/procedural aspects will be strengthened.

The University is also planning to strengthen its medical infrastructure by having a COVID Care Facility of 10 Bed in one of its campus just in case there is resurgence of COVID in future.

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LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

We present to you AUD Newsletter 4 documenting information between January to June 2021. As the global pandemic proved lethal during this time period in India, with the second wave; reaching out to staff, students and faculty through multiple care initiatives, was one of the chief role that the University played. The University authorities organized tele consultation services for doctors, and set up vaccination centres at multiple campuses. Faculty members came together to collate and share information on availability of hospital beds, oxygen cylinders, medicines. The Library played a crucial role towards teaching learning activities continuing without disruption. While the library has always been digitized and provided remote access services to all users of AUD, through the last one and half years it has reached the homes of AUD users even more with facilitating online re-issue of books, providing scans of some pages from hard copy books, also building its e-book collection. The University conducted the mock NAAC peer team visit in anticipation towards the main NAAC visit later in the year.

This Newsletter starts a section on Alumni News, while the University has also launched the Alumni portal. This is a way to keep connected to the Alumni who are now the biggest ambassadors of the University. In this Newsletter, we have documented publications, employment positions and higher research positions acquired by AUD alumni. This issue brings back the section Experimenting with Pedagogy, where some Schools have shared interesting experiences of internships, field visits, journal writings, peer review activities, that faculty did in their courses with the students. In this phase the University had reopened its campus for teaching in blended mode, for final year students, for the months of February and March 2021. The Newsletter attempts to capture this blended existence—online and in campus for faculty and students. All branches of the administration worked tirelessly, and mostly being present on campus, to assist the teaching learning processes. Engaging with the multi-faceted aspects of the pandemic still dominates faculty lectures, publications as witnessed in this Newsletter.

Through this Newsletter we pray for all the departed soul and wish endurance for loss and suffering. As we move towards the second half of the year, we hope that people both within and outside the University heal and make efforts to rebuild each-others' lives beyond the crisis.

130th Birth Anniversary of B.R. Ambedkar

Dear AUD Family

Today we are celebrating the 130° birth anniversary of Dr. Bhimrao Ramji Ambedkar. On this occasion, we pay our gratitude to the revered Dr. Ambedkar who was not only a freedom fighter but also an iconic statesman.

Among the architects of Modern India, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar has a towering stature. He is one of those builders of modern India who incessantly worked for the emancipation of the Dalits and other socially backward

classes. The very premise of democracy is equality and freedom for which Dr. Ambedkar spent his entire life to achieve . "We must stand on our feet and fight as best as we can for our rights" is truly exemplified by the life and personality of Babasaheb Ambedkar. He suffered a great deal in his personal life and persevered with his faith in values of democracy and equality.

He was sensitive to the interface between law and custom and popular beliefs. Ambedkar's idea of constitutionalism revolved around social justice. He wanted to create an egalitarian society through the process of constitutionalism. Babasaheb was of the belief that political democracy alone is not sufficient for us, India needs to be transformed into social democracy in order for it to survive as a nation.

Babasaheb was a flagbearer of change. He believed that "If you believe in living a respectable life, you believe in self-help which is the best help." He was also opposed to the concept of society which stressed on individuals ignoring community bonds. Community was central in his consideration.

He was opposed to authoritative and paternalistic tendencies which restrict humanism, freedom of enquiry and equality of persons.. He discussed democracy as a way of life but also believed that rule of law should be a bond uniting people ensuring equal participation of individuals.

His core values were always guided by reasoning without losing sight of the ideal values at the same time. On this day we pay homage to Dr. B.R. Ambedkar for his contributions made to the nation by inculcating in ourselves a feeling of unity and immense pride for the nation that Babasaheb envisioned for us.

Lastly, in his words, "Cultivation of mind should be the ultimate aim of human existence". Let us all strive for these values.





Membership of Association of Commonwealth Universities

With effect from January 2021, AUD has joined the Association of Commonwealth Universities (ACU). ACU, with members from 500+ countries established over 100 years ago, is the world's first International University network. As the representative body for higher education in the Commonwealth, ACU's membership reflects the breadth and diversity of the Commonwealth itself.

AUD showcased on AIU International Collaborations Portal

In May 2021, the Association of Indian Universities (AIU) requested AUD to identify some good departments/facilities/centres of our university, who are willing to enter into international collaborations, and fill information on their performance indicators, on the AIU Collaboration Portal. To initiate the process of promoting international collaborations through AIU, and based on data received from Schools so far, the information submitted by SES, SBPPSE and SVS has been showcased on the AIU portal, while further data from other Schools is awaited.

ICCR Scholarships

With effect from January 2021, AUD has been included in the list of reputed Indian Universities recognized by the Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR), for participation in the Government of India scholarship scheme for foreign students seeking admission to institutions of higher education in India. In the ongoing admission cycle for 2021-22, students from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Botswana, Cambodia, Cameroon, Ethiopia, Gambia, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Kazakhstan, Kenya, Malawi, Maldives, Mauritius, Mongolia, Myanmar, Namibia, Nepal, Netherlands, Nigeria, Panama, Sudan, Syria, Tajikistan, Tanzania, Vietnam, Yemen, Zambia and Zimbabwe have applied for admission to UG, PG and PhD programmes at AUD under the ICCR scholarship scheme.


LIBRARY reaches HOME during COVID


To address learning gaps and reach out to users at their homes during the COVID-19 pandemic, AUD library took several initiatives to transform into a complete online library service

- 1. **Video Tutorials:** When lockdown started in March 2020, library produced two video tutorials to access library resources remotely. These two videos were based on how to use and install INFED and Sophos, two remote access platforms being provided by the library. These videos also cover the searching techniques, how to optimize the search results.

- 2. **Online Hands-on-Workshop:** Library conducted series of hands-on-sessions on online resources, how to use them, how to install Sophos connect etc. Apart from this library conducted some webinars on research ethics, reference management tool (Mendeley) and how to get published in high impact factor journals along with the awareness about the predatory journals.
- 3. **24x7 Email consultation:** The Library team responded to many queries and resolved the issues through email consultations. The Library also extended the due date of books issued by users prior to lockdown through email.
- 4. **Scanning Facility:** Based on the demand of library users whenever required library provides scanned chapters to users under the copy right policy to maintain social distancing.
- 5. **Audio Books:** On the request of visually challenged user, library converted a print book into audio book and shared with the student to fulfill his requirement.
- 6. **Quick initiation of library ID and Password:** Library provided usernames and passwords for all the subscribed resources so users can have one more option to access resources remotely.
- 7. **Open Educational Resources (OER):** In order to promote open educational resources, the library compiled the links to access OER offered by various universities globally and posted it on the website.
- 8. **User's feedback:** It was crucial to know the challenges faced by the students, whether its infrastructural or technological or awareness about the resources along with the skill to use them


Library Orientations



The second session was on Reference Management Tool "Mendeley" In this session Deputy Librarian Alka Rai, described the installation of the Mendeley desktop version, how to use it for referencing and managing research work, how to cite the articles and how to generate bibliographies through Mendeley was demonstrated.

'AUD used lockdown to prepare for online shift, focus now on research'

Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD) Vice-Chancellor Anu Singh Lather talks about how the institution adapted during the lockdown, imple-mentation of the National Education Policy, introduc-tion of the Happiness Curriculum and focus on research and entrepreneurship. Ex-cerpts from the interview:

It has been a very tough year for education and learning. How did AUD switch from

physical classes to online?

As soon as the lockdown was announced, we went in for a long vacation that was initially planned for June-Ju-ly. This gave us time to plan and prepare, including facul-

line classes. While many universities had short-term plans, expecting educational institutions to open by May, we realised that COVID-19 was not going away. Hence, we made a plan till Decem-ber that included the new ad-mission process. We also followed a continuous assessment system so we did not face problems regarding conduct of exams.

How did you deal with the digital divide and access to high-speed Internet as AUD attracts students from across the country?

 We went in for a synchro-nous as well as an asynchro-nous mode of teaching. Books, study material, pre-

were all put together and emailed to students. We also ecorded the lectures so that students from the Northeas and Kashmir, who were fac ing problems with Interne ectivity, could watch re cordings and access mate-rial. We had students approaching us for laptops smartphones and other re lief. We provided EWS stu dents with reimbursements for their Internet connection. We also purchased and gave tablets to those who were in need.

With the National Education Policy (NEP) coming in, what changes will we see at AUD? The university is taking a few steps on the quality pa-rameters when it comes to research. We have created our own ordinance for the PhD programme. Also, regu-lations for that have been created to meet the interna tional demands of research the next session after discus-

 We are going in for a major revision of our syllabus in the near future to incorporate as-pects of the NEP and keep it updated. We are also planning to launch a Happiness Curriculum. This will be done at two levels. At the university-level, it will be introduced as an essential course. On a wider note, a training programme will be launched for the judiciary, government officials and others.

In the three-six months of training, the course will teach those enrolled to look at life differently.

The Cabinet also approved the merger of Delhi University's College of Arts, functioning under the Directorate of Training and Technical Education, and Delhi Institute of Heritage Research and Management (DIHRM) affiliated with GGSIP University functioning under the Directorate of Higher Education. Both will now be part of Dr. B.R Ambedkar University.

Ambedkar University to soon launch its happiness programme

New Delhi: Ambedkar University of Delhi (AUD) is likely to launch the three-month happiness programme for adults soon.

A draft curriculum of the programme will be placed before the AUD academic council, which is scheduled to meet later this month, officials said. The programme is inspired from the happiness curriculum taught at Delhi government's schools.

"We had planned to place the draft before the consultative committee of experts in March last year but that could not happen due to the pandemic. We then submitted the draft curriculum to the consultative committee last September," said Kartik Dave, who is working on the curriculum development and is the Dean of School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship. "We are almost ready with the changes and will be submitting the updated curriculum to the council around mid-January."

Following the success of happiness curriculum in Delhi government schools where students from classes 1 to 8 were introduced to mindfulness and other exercises, the programme gained popularity with even former chief justice of India Ranjan Gogoi suggesting in August 2019 that judicial academies too could have such classes. Following the announcement, AUD, which is a state university, said it would prepare a happiness curriculum for judges which would involve "practical learning".

The consultative panel members noted that the three-month certificate programme has become more relevant following the Covid-19 pandemic and the subsequent mental health crisis. "Long-term happiness will come once we start accepting things around us and be able to handle situations. Changes have been introduced in the curriculum to make it suitable for the current period because we know how important mental health and well-being is," said Dave, adding that they would sensitise people on "empathy and compassion".

"For instance, family as an institution became more important during the pandemic and in our journey of happiness. So, we have focused upon that in the curriculum. Participants will be made to realize the importance of work-life balance and spending more time with family for maintaining harmony within themselves and with their family," he said.

The three-month certificate programme can be customized for different sectors like police, judiciary and government departments.

In addition to the three-month certificate programme, the committee also plans to introduce a oneyear diploma course for those wanting to replicate the happiness curriculum model. However, committee members said they would take more time to prepare the proposal for the "train-thetrainers" programme as it needs "further elaboration" based on the feedback received from the roll-out of the certificate programme.







It explores how a State school, as a social and pedagogic institution, shapes the aspirations and worldviews of children in the urban margins. Based on ethnographic fieldwork, the book will be of interest to researchers, students, and teachers of sociology and politics of education, teacher education, childhood and youth studies, and urban studies. 

Film piracy is a terrain where traditional concerns of film studies with the formal properties of cinema overlap with legal concerns about the status of film as property. If the former focuses on the aesthetic, diegetic and affective qualities of film as a medium, the latter is concerned with the illicit technological reproduction of the medium. From laws prohibiting camera recordings, region control of DVDs and the use of sniffer dogs to track pirated discs, piracy attests to the dynamic and opposing relations between two major trends that define cinema in our time: the technological and the legal. The property rights of cinema have been traditionally secured through legal controls of the material object of cinema (prints, cassettes, etc.), but there is an inherent tension in cinema's striving for a juridical form, with transformations in the materiality of the medium unsettling possibility of any stable property regime. Thus even as more complicated systems of rights management and licensing in copyright law are created to ensure the smooth flow of films across the world, the ordered flow of cinema is constantly frustrated by technologies that enable the reproduction of a 20 million dollar film on a 20 rupee CD.

This split was also reflected in a traditional division of labour between scholarship in film, law and the political economy of media. Piracy has blurred these lines and in the South Asian context there has been a particularly rich tradition of interdisciplinary scholarship at the intersection of film, technology and legal studies. Research on film piracy has been less interested in the legal concerns over what piracy is and more interested in the cultural and technological questions about what piracy does (Bagchi, 2006; Liang, 2008; Sundaram, 2011). Scholarship on piracy in South Asia has focused on questions of modernity and infrastructure and the intertwined worlds of livelihood, survival and leisure. Piracy, in these accounts, becomes a mode through which excluded social worlds make their way into the cultural sphere through innovative techno-practices and lay claim to cultural participation not through a logic of developmental paternalist access granted by the state but as a form of defiant access.

While official rhetoric pits film piracy against the film industry as though it were an ahistorical evil that comes from outside, scholarly works on film piracy have demonstrated that piracy has always been an inevitable part of the development of the film industry. Jane Gaines' demonstrates that copying was central to the practice of the early industry and the history of early competition was marked by a frantic race by the



EXPERIMENTING WITH PEDAGOGY

School of Global Affairs

MA Urban Studies dissertation is accompanied by a credited *Writing Workshop*, where students get hands-on training in how to conceptualize material, how to connect theory with evidence, and get peer feedback on their writing. Usually, students tend to work individually (guided by their respective supervisor) at this stage of their dissertation work, but the idea of the workshop is to make this a shared exercise, so students get a sense of a collectivity, while also learning from each other's work.

School of Law Governance and Citizenship

As part of the BA core course *Law and Civil Liberties* offered by Anushka Singh, for the final semester students of B.A in Law and Politics, one of the assessments required students to maintain diary entries in the month of February on the theme of 'Speech' as a form of civil liberty mapping out the impact of the pandemic on civil liberties. Each entry was to be briefly describe particular instances that students may have read in the news or encountered in their everyday followed by an analysis of the event from a civil liberty perspective. The aim of the assessment was to teach them to relate classroom learning with the world around them as well as train BA students in keeping self-journals.

School of Undergraduate Studies

Introduction to Human Ecology course, offered by Budhaditya Das introduces students to interdisciplinary perspectives on environment and society. The field visit component is an integral part of the course, where students get to observe and understand concepts taught in the classroom. The field visit this semester was carried out with careful planning in view of the COVID-19 pandemic and restrictions for educational institutions. Eight out of the seventeen enrolled students volunteered to go for the visit.

Students were familiarized with local flora and fauna at the Dheerpur Wetland and Park. They made field notes regarding the leaf patterns, identified tree species, birds and their habitats, and drew connections with the course syllabus. Researchers from the Center for Urban Ecology (CUES), AUD facilitated the visit and discussed the history of Dheerpur wetland, its ecological significance and the process of ecological restoration with the students. The field visit ended with light refreshments and a small picnic in the park.

Risk Society

This course introduces the concept of 'risk society' and mainly discusses how pre, during, and post-disaster situations affect society in different ways. It also outlines how the resilience of the communities can be strengthened. Teaching a course on risk society when all of us lived through the pandemic times of unprecedented nature was a learning experience in itself for both students and faculty. The sharing of personal narratives of going through suffering, witnessing the suffering of others during these pandemic times made the class discussions on concepts such as risk, vulnerability, unpredictability, and impacts on health and well-being easy to relate to. During the evaluations, the written submissions showed how the students made sense of the personal and collective suffering through the lens of academic categories and concepts.

With regard to the greenhouse gas emissions and climate change impacts, the students did an activity on the calculation of carbon footprint, which involved assessing the individual contribution to carbon footprint through energy consumption, transportation, and waste generation and disposal in daily life. It provided them an opportunity to reflect on the pre-Covid-19 and during the pandemic times daily life activities and the contribution made by individuals to the cumulative effects of the carbon footprint. The students could make sense of the contributors of carbon emissions and the importance of individual awareness in reducing the carbon footprint by doing this comparative analysis of pre and during these pandemic times. Another activity that required the students to prepare a disaster profile of one state in India provided them a chance to engage with vulnerability and risks beyond the pandemic situation and how India being demographically and geographically diverse, is vulnerable to different types of hazards.

School of Vocational Studies

Internships during a pandemic are challenging, especially for BVoc ECCME programs where the students need to work with children and childcare providers. Given the current pandemic conditions the Semester-4 students were given the opportunity to develop entrepreneurship ideas for internships. A group of three students designed an online summer camp, "Kicks and Crawls" for young children. The group members designed promotion and marketing activities, curriculum on their own and gained a lot of experience. Chhavi, one of the members of the group, said the internship helped her see her future plans to open a centre closely. The students received mentoring support from the School.

The school has successfully coordinated regardingindustry internship for BVoc (A&F) students by maintaining a healthy relationship with the mentors. On an average, these industry mentors are Chartered Accountants having an average of 15 to 20 years of experience. Some of them are rank holders in their professional qualifications. The school has also started an Account Finance Club to create awareness for current events in the field and create awareness about the job market. The school has played an active role in developing a lab with Accounting Software and a Library with books of Finance and Accounting.



The school also organized a series of online on the job training sessions for the students of Retail Management & Tourism and Hospitality. These sessions were planned to provide hand-holding to the students during the pandemic where face-to-face sessions were not possible.





Assessment of bio-medical waste before and during the emergency of novel Coronavirus disease pandemic in India: A gap analysis

Abstract

Considering the widespread transmission of Coronavirus disease (COVID-19) globally, India is also facing the same crisis. As India already has inadequate waste treatment facilities, and the sudden outbreak of the COVID-19 virus has led to significant growth of Bio-medical waste (BMW), consequently safe disposal of a large quantity of waste has become a more serious concern. This study provides a comprehensive assessment of BMW of India before and during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, this article highlights the gaps in the implementation of BMW rules in India. This study uses various government and non-government organizations, reports and data specifically from the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB). The finding of the study demonstrated that most of the States/Union Territories (UTs) of India are lacking in terms of COVID-19 waste management. India has generated over 32,996 mt of COVID-19 waste between June and December 2020. During this period, Maharashtra (789.99 mt/month) is highest average generator of COVID-19 waste, followed by Kerala (459.86 mt/month), Gujarat (434.87 mt/month), Tamil Nadu (427.23 mt/month), Uttar Pradesh (371.39 mt/month), Delhi (358.83 mt/month) and West Bengal (303.15 mt/month), and others respectively. We draw attention to the fact that many gaps were identified with compliance of BMW management rules. For example, out of all

Installation-video, mannequin head, mobile-phone, biconvex lenses, cardboard, earphones, acrylic-glass sheet, wooden stool and T LED bulb.

Head-to-Head 2019, demanded the viewer to place their forehead on the head of a mannequin, a lifeless doll, that almost tries to mimic a particular perception of a human body in this case a head, the viewer would then find herself in the totality of images that were being played inside the head through the biconvex lens which made it appear as if the participant is peeking inside a head or a brain. On the outside people's reaction on noticing a disembodied plastic human head, arose the feelings of curiosity, excitement and horror. While finding faces or head that has eyes and mouth, quickly is an adaptive trait for survival. When the participant plugs in the earphones, an arrangement of sounds can be listened that were again designed keeping in mind the behavioural as well as emotional variations induced by sounds as one looks inside the head; it tries to temporarily detach them from their surroundings, allowing to push forward the questions regarding perception and illusion, like a horse with blinders forced to look in forward direction.
