# 63% of those graduating from AUD this year are women

New Delhi: Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD) held its 10th convocation ceremony on Tuesday where degrees were conferred upon 1,042 students. Over 63% of those graduating this year are women.

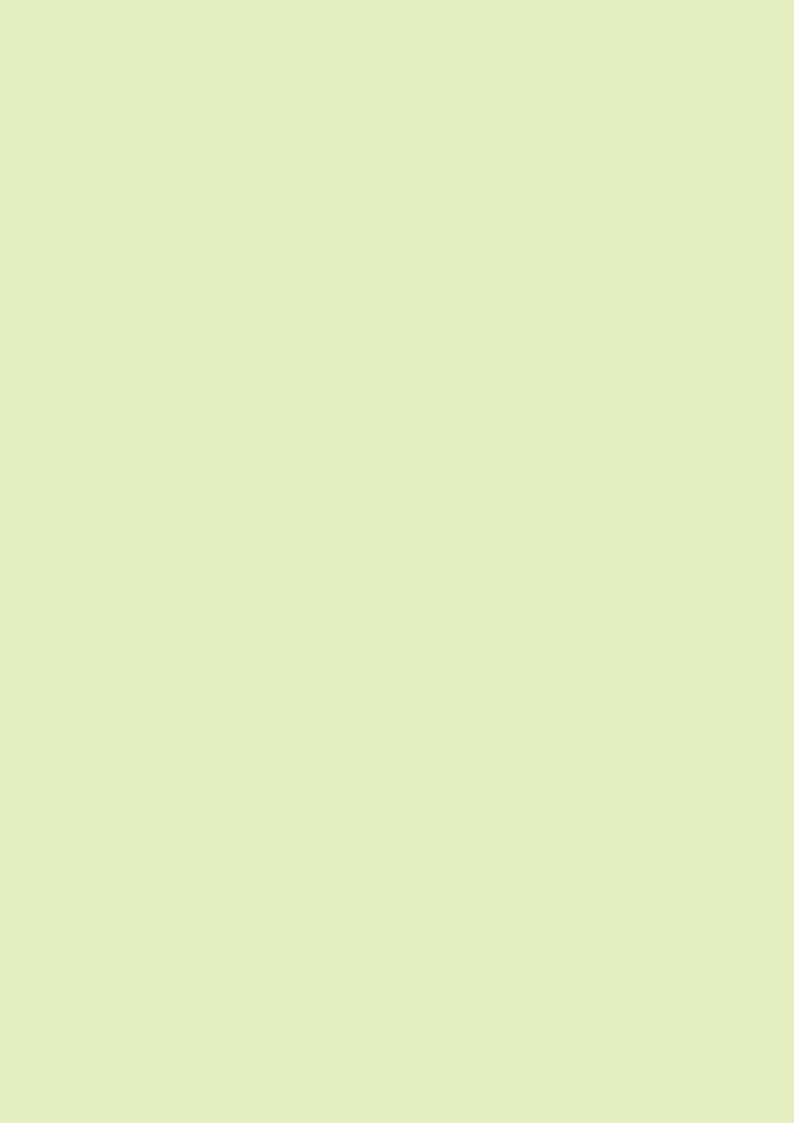
Speaking at the ceremony, deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia said that while two new campuses would be added under AUD, the College of Arts will also be attached to the university soon and that a few formalities pertaining to the latter were pending.

Urging the graduates to become ambassadors of social justice and equality, Sisodia said, "Wherever Babasaheb is mentioned across India, equality and social justice permeate the atmosphere. Therefore, it becomes the responsibility of every student who graduates to use their knowledge and skills towards bringing equality and social justice."

Sisodia also urged students to join the "Desh Ke Mentor" programme and guide students of Delhi government schools who are unable to turn to their families for guidance.

AUD vice-chancellor Anu Singh Lather stated that in the current academic year, the university saw an increase in the student intake. LG Anil Baijal presided over the ceremony and Dr K Kasturirangan, former IS-RO chairman, was the chief guest.

Meanwhile, the varsity is planning to reopen the campus for students after the winter break. Officials said that libraries and computer centres would be made accessible to students from Friday. TNN

# RENDEZVOUS WITH VICE CHANCELLOR

Professor Anu Singh Lather



The University inaugurated AIC-AUDF, Skill Development Centre and Outreach and Extension Division. What role do you imagine of these three in the future of the University and how will they contribute to the city of Delhi?

Ambedkar University Delhi Foundation (AIC – AUDF) is an Incubation Centre established by Ambedkar University Delhi to implement the Atal Incubation Centre (AIC) supported by NITI Aayog, GoI. This is the only Social Sciences university that was shortlisted for prestigious Atal Incubation Centre by AIM, NITI Aayog, GoI.

The Centre's endeavor is to create an ecosystem of innovation and entrepreneurship within the university and also for the city of Delhi. The interdisciplinary space of AUD, especially in applied fields such as business, design, development practice, education, ecology, mental health etc., is seen as an appropriate location for setting up the AIC-AUDF.AIC-AUDF has always maintain the highest standards to dispense provisions in last mile connectivity, energy, health, education, agriculture, water, and sanitation with the aim to impact society at large.

At the incubation centre we have created 10,000 sq. feet world class incubation facilities with with plug-n-play facilities, an array of expert members, researchers, and academicians to provide the best quality mentorship; easy access to seed funding along with extraordinary opportunities to get access of investments from our pool of valuable investors. The facilities was inaugurated by Sh. Manish Sisodia, Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister, Delhi on 29thOctober, 2021. Since October, 21 AIC-AUDF has impacted about 3500 students by conducting several successful and engaging boot camps and workshops, "Idea to I am," "Dastan-e-Startup," "InQuizzBee," to namesome.

To carry forward the University's vision for reaching out the masses in Delhi & NCR region, a Skill Development Centre (SDC) is established with a mission to reach out different stakeholders, including the students of AUD, to equip them with required skill set for meaningful employment as per demands of the industries and also facilitate them to become entrepreneurs in generating job opportunities. The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 has strongly articulated that the incubation of skill development centers (SDC) will be set up in higher education institutions in partnership with industries. The SDC is supposed to groom and train the workforce by offering short-term skill certificate courses and performing entrepreneurial activities to benefit all the stakeholders.

The centre would take-up the vocational/skill education to new levels with adequately aligned to the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) levels. All the skill training programmes will be in sync with the 'Skills India Programme' of Govt. of India for imparting knowledge on vital job skills to the students and workforce, thus enabling them to acquire anadditional certificate along with their degree certificates. These add-on courses would supplement the core education practices and take the university benchmark for education to the next level. Through this imitative, the students will be able to pursue these

certificate programmes along with their regular degree programmes.

The skill training programmes offered by the SDC will also form the integral part of the outreach and extension activities of the University through the Outreach and Extension Division, where in such skill training programmes can find a place in the adopted villages for enhancing their livelihood through education and training. This will lead to the empowerment of population, especially women in the adopted villages in the areas of health, sanitation, education and economic conditions through continuous earning.

The Outreach and Extension Division was formally launched on 30th September 2021 with the mandate of access, equity, inclusion and collaboration. The Outreach and Extension Division, the Skill Development Centre, the Incubation Centre have been imagined to work in interconnected ways. The Division has adopted three clusters in the Kirti Nagar area of West Delhi—Jawahar camp, Chuna Bhatti and Kirti Nagar 5/35. The Division will soon have a mobile van which will organise digital literacy andc legal awareness programmes for the people in the adopted clusters through the 'Aademics on Wheels' programme. The Division will also work in villages of Ghumanhera. Talks are already on to adopt more clusters in the Kashmere Gate area. Leadership building training, JanoApnaSamvidhan, coaching for civil services and other government jobs, Know your City walking tours will all be rolled out through this division in the months to come. The main idea is that as a social science and humanities university how is it that we connect with our community/neighbourhood and people.

# The University inaugurated new building and auditorium at Karampura campus. How will the academic activities of the University benefit from this infrastructural expansion?

Recently, a multi-purpose building and an auditorium has been set up at the KP Campus. The Multi-purpose Building has guest house, staff quarters, a space for crèche etc. The auditorium has about 300 sitting capacity with all modern A/V system. While the guest house will be used to accommodate visiting professors engaged by different schools the auditorium will support for organising conferences, seminars, workshops and symposium etc., including the lecture for students. In today's competitive era, such facilities are highly crucial in preparing students at an international level.

#### What concrete steps are you taking towards implementation of NEP 2020 at AUD?

The University has been working on the implementation of NEP 2020 from July 2020. Collectively we have been closely following its previous drafts and had begun the preparation for the implementation even before the Policy was released. There have been series of internal and external discussions where each School has submitted its plan for NEP implementation. The University constituted a committee with Professor K. Ramachandran as its Chairperson to develop a roadmap for the implementation. Based on the outcomes of the deliberations five new Schools are being constituted in the areas of:

- a. Philosophy and Religion Studies
- b. Indigenous Knowledge Systems and Tribal Studies
- c. Public Policy
- d. Media Studies
- e. Mathematics, Statistics and Data Science.
  - We have already launched three Centres in the areas recommended by the NEP 2020:
- a. Centre for Research and Archiving in India and Indigenous Language & Knowledge System (CRA-IILKS) for research and development of resources in the Indian languages.
- b. AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE) that aims to create an ecosystem of innovation and entrepreneurship within the university. The Centre has been awarded under the Atal Innovation Mission, NITI Aayog, Government of India with financial support of Rs. 10 crores.
- c. Skill Development Centre (SDC) for development of entrepreneurial skills and providing resource and incubation support to students' ideas.

The School of Letters has started a four-year BA (Hons.) Programme in Hindi. All undergraduate programmes are shifting to four-years model. The School of Education Studies has successfully applied to the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) for the launch of the 4-year BABEd programme in the arts stream from 2023. The Student Services Division is set to begin admissions through CUETs from

this year onwards – as a State University this is a significant achievement. The AES Division is working towards implementing the Academic Bank of Credits system.

The University has ICT integrated in the mainstream from its inception. Now with support of the IT Services, the implementation SAMARTH (Smarter Automation Engine for Higher Education Institutes) is ongoing. It is a University Information Management System developed by Delhi University in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Government of India. This will support paperless and swift administrative process across different areas of the university life including student and human resource management, financial management, academic governance and planning, as well as evaluation.

# The tenth Convocation was held this year with 1042 students graduating. What are your future plans of student expansion and what are the ways in which the Delhi government will support on the plans?

The collective ambition of the University is to become a MERU (Multidisciplinary Education and Research University) as envisioned by NEP 2020. We want to cater to a much larger number of students and be the best in the region and the country. We have two new Campuses coming-up in Dheerpur and Rohini. These campuses would be able to host more than the enrolment target of 10,000 students set by the NEP 2020 for 2030. The University has always had the support of the Government of NCT of Delhi in all its endeavours. The Government's support for the development of the two campuses is a fine example of this.

# The Delhi Institute of Heritage Research and Management has merged with AUD and become School of Heritage Research and Management. What are the ways in which you think that the academic flavor of the institute can merge with AUD's existing vision and mission?

This is the fourteenth school of Dr B R Ambedkar University Delhi. The vision of the School is in consonance with the interdisciplinary flavour of the university. There are two MA programmes already in place--MA in Conservation, Preservation and Heritage Management and MA in Archaeology and Heritage Management. There are plans to start a PhD programme in Heritage Studies and Management, a diploma programme in Folklore Studies as well as short term certificate courses for professionals on diversity and heritage of India. A basket of courses for undergraduate students will also be prepared by the School so that from that stage itself students have exposure to heritage studies, issues related to conservation of monuments and other heritage sites. This will also be in line with the interdisciplinary focus of undergraduate teaching as per NEP. The School will also enter into MOUs with various museums and conservation agencies in Delhi and outside and undertake research and policy based work contributing towards the cultural policy of the government.

# The pandemic continued through the entire year, as the head of a social science and humanities institution what message do you have towards the role of these institutions in assessing the impacts of the pandemic and propose long term recommendations for the future?

Interdisciplinary knowledge networks need much strengthening if we are to study the impact of the pandemic. Sciences or Social Sciences alone can neither holistically study the impact, nor suggest sustainable reforms. The pandemic is not only a health crisis but socio-economic, cultural historic and emotional crises as well. How academic institutions learn to support each other towards the goals of holistic understanding of current and predicted issues and opportunities, will shape our future as a civilisation.

One area where we must pre-empt, and work together is the climate change. As institutions of a leading country in the Global South, our collective task is to develop a new perspective for our planet and progress.

It is also essential that academic institutions work with the governments, civil society and citizens. Easy as it may sound, it is challenging to balance the goals of different stakeholders. As a public social science academic institutions we must demonstrate that working together is not only possible, but that it is essential as we re-imagine the post-pandemic futures.

### LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

AUD Newsletter 5 is presented to its readers. This issue covers university initiatives between July to December 2021. The major University event in the month of December is the Annual Convocation. This time, maintaining COVID protocols, graduating Masters and research scholars were present in person at the Convocation. After many months the University dressed up colorfully for the occasion, and it was wonderful to see most students choosing to come to campus to collect their degrees, meet their classmates and teachers.

The University has embarked on new initiatives between this six months:

- Inauguration of the Atal Incubation Centre-AUDF
- Launch of the Outreach and Extension Division
- Establishing the Skill Development Centre
- Establishing the Centre for Research and Archiving in Indian Languages and Indic Knowledge Systems
- Launch of the E-library through Refread, a single window portal to access all eresources

Besides these, the Delhi Institute of Heritage Research and Management has merged with the university as School of Heritage Research and Management, as the fourteenth interdisciplinary School of the University with its faculty, staff and two Masters programmes Masters in Conservation, Preservation and Heritage Management and MA Archaeology and Heritage Management. This School is located at Qutb Institutional Area making this the fourth site in the city of Delhi where the University has premises.

These academic initiatives were complemented with inauguration of the Multipurpose Block at Karampura campus which has staff quarters, guest house for scholars in residence and a crèche facility. The new 200 seater auditorium was also inaugurated within this time period. The University recognized all security guards and housekeeping staff from different campuses who gave their undeterred services through the different phases of the lockdown by distributing certificates on the Independence Day of 2022 which also begun Azaadi ka Amrit Mahotsav at the University for year-long programmes.

COVID facilities like setting up vaccination centre and enabling faculty, staff, students, their families, domestic workers to avail the services was ensured by the University. All Schools, Centres and Divisions of the University carried on with their multiple academic activities, mostly in hybrid mode. In this Newsletter, reporting on (online) internships from various Schools forms an important pedagogic contribution. Despite the pandemic, various Schools, with committed student and faculty representatives, arranged for online or on site internships for the undergraduate and postgraduate students.

As the year ends, the hopes of return to campus life for all members of the University community seem a possibility. The university emerged as a community, with resilience and care for each other as the ethical framework governing not just life within the University but also as an enduring message for the society.

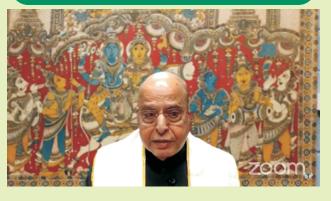

# UNIVERSITY REPORT BY VICE CHANCELLOR, PROFESSOR ANU SINGH LATHER (EXCERPTS)

The graduating students appearing in today's Convocation have completed their degrees in very difficult times. 1042 students have successfully completed their degrees in 2021. Of these, 438 students will receive undergraduate degrees, 558 will receive postgraduate degrees, 29will be awarded with MPhil degrees, 05 shall be awarded PhD degrees, and 12 students shall be awarded with diplomas. I am pleased to announce that 63.05% of our graduating students are women. University with its mission focussed on social justice, we work towards ensuring that education is accessible to all students and that no student is left behind because of financial constraints. We offer full and partial fee waivers to students based on social category and income slabs. In 202021, 1102 students availed fee waivers. 247 students benefited from the Student Welfare Fund, 643 students were awarded Merit Scholarships, and 193 availed Learning Enhancement Fund. Students were also financially supported with Internet Reimbursement to ensure that they continue their studies. Many students, who required assistance with devices to attend online classes, have also been provided with Tablets.

We are the first state university to implement SAMARTH (Smarter Automation Engine for Higher Education Institutes) Project, which is a University Information Management System, developed by Delhi University in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Government of India.

The Delhi Institute for Heritage Research and Management (DIHRM) has been merged with Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University Delhi, and has been successfully integrated with the University system as School of Heritage Research and Management. The University has been included in the list of reputed National Universities recognised by the Indian Council for Cultural relations (ICCR) for participation in the Government of India scholarship scheme for foreign students seeking admission to institutions of higher education in India. In the admission cycle for 2021-22, students from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Botswana, Cambodia, Cameroon, Ethiopia, Gambia, Indonesia, Iran, Iraq, Jordan, Kazakhstan, Kenya, Malawi, Maldives, Mauritius, Magnolia, Myanmar, Namibia, Nepal, Netherlands, Nigeria, Panama, Sudan, Syria, Tajikistan, Tanzania, Vietnam, Yemen, Zambia and Zimbabwe have applied for admission to various programmes under ICCR scholarship scheme.

In 2020-21, through the Training and Placement Cell, the University organised eight training sessions in which 693 students participated. A total of 64 campus placement and internship drives were conducted in which 1780 students participated. Some of the companies invited for placement included Wipro, Tech Mahindra, Byjus, Asahi Glass Pvt. Ltd., Teach for India, Finorbit Global, Absolut Data Research & analytics Solutions Pvt. Ltd., Kotra, XL Dynamics, SBI, Rudder Soft Solutions Pvt. Ltd., Perfect Generators, Oyster Connect, Confederation of Indian Industry (CII), KaroSambhav, Planet Spark Pvt. Ltd., AzimPremji Foundation, Arabesque 2, Tata Consultancy Service, Magistral Consulting, Digiversal / ExpertGrad, Planet Spark, Athena Education, Torque Communication, HCL Foundation etc.

During the last one year, the university has expanded in diverse directions and launched the Skill Development Centre, Centre for Research and Archiving in Indian and Indigenous Languages and Knowledge System, and Outreach and Extension Division for enhancing the University's research, innovation and community engagement capacities. I am also excited to share with the esteemed guests, a significant initiative of the university, a 'Concept Bank' for students coming from Hindi Medium Schools and with Hindi as mother tongue. We realized that the maximum drop-out rate of students occurred in the first year with hindi medium background. Keeping this in mind, a committee was constituted to deliberate and work on a Concept Bank "Avdharana Kosh".

Dear graduating students, you are the ambassadors of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar University, Delhi. The University will be known by your work and conduct. So I appeal to you to show high moral values and integrity in your thoughts and deeds, love for your nation and become productive and responsible citizens of the country. We hope that you will imbibe and practice the principles of equity, social justice and excellence in your work and life spheres. We hope that while you move forward from here you will continue to be connected with your alma mater and will share your work and wellbeing with us to formalise this connection, the university has instituted an alumni office and alumni portal and will further strengthen the systems for building an all-inclusive alumni network. I congratulate all of you for successfully completing this major milestone and wish you the very best for your journey ahead

# After DU's high first cut-off list, AUD offers a ray of hope

Eligible candidates will have to get their documents verified physically on campus today and tomorrow

Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD) on Tuesday released its first cut-off list for admissions into various undergraduate programmes.

graduate programmes.

The university's cut-off is lower than that set by the University of Delhi, giving hope to many students from the NCR to secure a seat. The highest cut-off was declared for BA (Hons.) with a major in psychology for which, the university has set a cut-off for NCT candidates at 98.75%, and for candidates from outside Delhi at 99.5%.

#### Reserved seats

The university reserves 85% of its seats for candidates from the NCR and therefore, released two cut-off percentages in the general category

— one for students from the NCR and the other for students outside the NCR. The university also released a merit list of applicants who had cleared the cut-off in various categories as a "provisional admission" list based on the marks entered by the candidates while filling the application form.

For BA (Hons) Economics, the cut-off for NCT candidates is 97.25% and for candidates from outside Delhi 97.75%. For BA (Hons) English, the university has set the mark for NCT candidates at 97.50% and for candidates from outside Delhi at

97.50%. For BA (Hons) History, the cut-off is 96.75% for NCT candidates and 98.50% for candidates from outside Delhi. BA (Hons) Mathematics has cut-off at 94.25% for NCT candidates and 95.25% for candidates from outside Delhi. For BA (Hons) Hindi, the university has set the cut-off for NCT candidates at 81.75% and for candidates from outside Delhi at 82.25%.

#### Two campuses

At the Kashmere Gate campus, AUD offers BA (Hons) with a major in English, economics, history, mathematics, psychology, sociology, social science and humanities, and Hindi. It also offers a degree in Bachelor of Business administration.

At the Karampura cam-

pus, it offers BVoc in retail management, tourism and hospitality, accounting and finance, and early childhood centre management and entrepreneurship. The campus also offers BA in global studies, law and politics, social sciences and humanities and sustainable urbanism.

According to the admission process by the university, those candidates that have made it to the first list will have to get their documents verified physically on campus between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. on October 6 and 7. The last day for payment is October 7.

The second cut-off list is scheduled to be out on October 8. AUD said that it may release up to six cut-off lists depending on how many seats remain vacant.

# AUD unveils centre on Indian languages

Research will be done to challenge dominance of western social theory, says V-C

Ambedkar University has launched a Centre for Research and Archiving in Indian Languages and Indian Knowledge Systems (CRAILIKS) under the School of Letters to investigate into the working of myriad knowledge systems of pre-colonial Ladia.

The university said that the centre has been started

with a financial grant of ₹6 crore from the Art, Culture and Languages Department of the Delhi government.

The university said CRA-ILIKS will have four components. It will build a bhasha archive, a vast, multipronged and constantly growing digital collection propelled by a multilingual search engine and user-friendly interface on the web. It will be accompanied by a substantial programme of translation, transcription and curation. The multidisciplinary academic research and a publication programme will make the other two necessary components.

Professor Anu Singh Lather, Vice-Chancellor of AUD, said the centre had been launched in line with the emphasis by the National Education Policy on Indian knowledge systems. She ad-

ded that the research is intended to challenge the dominance of western social theory and the notion that English language is the only medium of knowledge production. CRA-ILIKS will soon launch aforesaid archive as well as an encyclopedia of Indian thought and knowledge systems, the V-C said.

Two academic journals, one in Hindi and other in English, will also be published.

This article reconstructs the unfolding of events in India in March—April 1919 that led to the Jallianwala Bagh massacre. It evaluates the circumstances and the administrative and military response from a legal history perspective. It argues that the Jallianwala Bagh massacre was not a unique event but culminated colonial rage against a broader anti-colonial mobilisation.

In April 2019, it was the centenary mourning of the Jallianwala Bagh massacre. The Jallianwala Bagh massacre led by a British military officer General Dyer took place in April 1919 and remains one of the most potent memories of British colonial violence and brutality in India. A quick recounting of a representative set of scholarship and observations about the Amritsar massacre of 1919 is mandatory here. In the popular imagination, it is recollected as the ultimate example of the cold-hearted character and blood-thirsty approach of the colonialists who knew nothing but oppression. #### Rural Frames: Bollywood Imagination of Village India

The village has long been a central feature of the popular Indian imagination about the nation in cinematic representations. Mainstream Hindi cinema, popularly referred to as Bollywood, has consistently used the village as a trope in its discourse regarding the nation. While the representation of the idea of the 'village' has changed considerably over the decades, as I discuss in this chapter, its metaphoric significance has continued as a thematic device in Hindi cinema. It is perhaps due to this that the idea of the village has played such a crucial role in Hindi cinema's imaginations of the nation right from its very beginnings.

For the British colonial establishment, understanding the Indian village held the key to dealing with Indian society (Inden, 1990: 131). This view was further reinforced by scholars like Karl Marx who considered the Indian village as 'little republics' (Gupta, 2005). Gandhi, as the leading figure of the Indian independence movement

#### Sexuality, Development and Governance – A Transnational Queer Feminist Critique

ow do development discourses and practices imagine sexuality? There is well-established literature that has brought to light the neglect of sexuality and silence within development that is hinged on a particular sexual and gendered subject. While the particulars of this subject are engendered through context-specific development agendas, still it is universalization of nature which is the common belief, and thus is an abiding concern for feminist politics in general and queer feminist politics in particular. In the context of India, and able heteronormative middle class Hindus, an upper caste Hindu is the ideal citizen subject around which revolve policies, programmes and laws. One obvious consequence of this is that development agendas exclude abject people who deviate from the ideal citizen subject as J. Devika in her interrogation of the development discourse in Kerala argues. She says that the abjects who are the constitutive outside of development discourses are the impossible, abnormal, deviant subjects relegated to the unliveable spheres of life. Therefore, there are increasing demands on theorists and practitioners to critically engage with sexual norms and morals that underpin the ideal subject of development. Sex workers and LGBTIQ persons among others have been at the forefront of these demands. Much of these demands revolve around rights which, while being framed within the politics of recognition and inclusion, are also about questioning the optimists of international development efforts that trivialize and/or silence the value of pleasure, non-procreative sexual acts and non-normative desires. Today I will briefly review how the sex workers movement and queer politics are fracturing the narrative of the subject of development even when they claim inclusion within the Nation-State. But before I move on, here are some necessary words about one: the linkage between sexuality development and governance and two: a transnational queer feminist critic of this linkage.

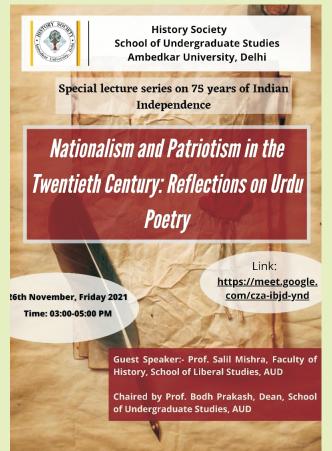

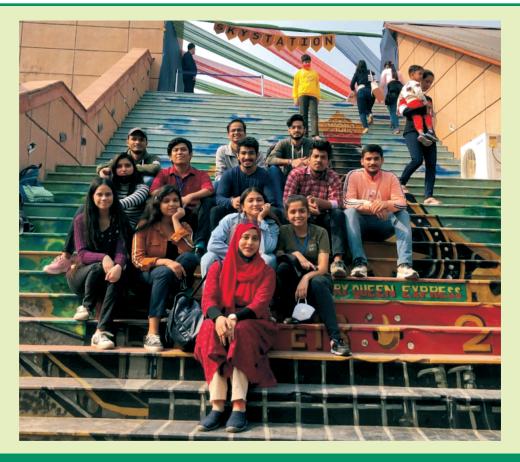

#### Abstract

The impact of COVID-19 on poverty estimates is humongous. The economic tumult caused by the pandemic over the past two years has the potential to double the nation's poverty, erasing the decade-long gains from the fight against poverty and inequality. Our calculations show that around 150–199 million additional people will fall under poverty in 2021–2022; a majority of which are from rural areas, owing to the immiserate nature of the rural economy. Further disaggregation reveals that the SC/ST, casual labour and the self-employed are the most impacted groups. Bihar, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh and Odisha are the most affected states facing poverty ranging from 50% to 80% in the rural area and 40% to 70% in the urban area. Our analysis also identifies the rippling effect of poverty on the inter-group disparities in India.

# SCHOOL OF EDUCATION STUDIES: LOCATING EDUCATION IN THE FIELD



During the summer break, students of SES are required to undertake a field attachment/internship of three weeks. This field component has been designed to deepen students' engagement with education – as praxis and to develop professionals who understand both theory and practice in the 'field'. It enables students to make sense of educational phenomena in the field, using the frames offered by the various taught courses in the MA programmes. During the COVID-19 context, students have also been attempting to understanding the implications of the pandemic on educational practice, especially the transition of institutional work to online mode. In September-October 2021, students of the MA Education and MA Education (Early Childhood Care and Education) programmes completed their non-school field attachment/internship at eight different sites including, ActSmart India, Centre for Education & Health Research Organization, Centre for Teaching/Learning of Mathematics, CSRBox, Eduweave Foundation, Farm2Food Foundation, The Critical Childhoods & Youth Studies Collective, and Vikramshila.



#### SCHOOL OF HUMAN STUDIES: MA GENDER STUDIES

The pandemic posed a variety of challenges for the students in securing and completing internships. Since most of the organisations had closed down briefly because of the second wave of the pandemic, the internship opportunities available were limited. The overall health condition of the students and their families also delayed the process considerably.

And yet, Gender Studies among some of the other programmes in the university that in this period managed to complete the requirements for the Internship, with very few exceptions (2 students).

This was possible because of the determined efforts of the Internship Committee constituted for the purpose of locating, internships, sharing information, liasoning with the faculty member and coordinating in case of any specific challenges. The committee worked tirelessly.

The positive thing, however, was that most organisations agreed to convert the internships into Work From Home given the health and safety concerns. In addition to completing assignments, presentations and attending classes, the completion of internships proved to be a very tough challenge. Some students found it difficult to manage their commitment and time judiciously and this has been noted by the faculty.

Students appreciated the opportunity to learn and engage with new questions that extended their classroom learning and yet missed out on vital field experience as well as the opportunity to network and create new contacts for professional development. And yet, some of our students have been offered further opportunities. A wide range of Internships were secured by our student, e.g Anweshi, Ladli Foundation, Kracktivist, Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative, She for Change, Centre for Equity and Inclusion, Mahila Panchayat, Indian Women's Project, Prajna Trust and so on.

The Internship committee's coordination with the faculty and redressal of grievances was seamless and continuous. Despite the batch mates not having met formally in college, the class together became a safety net for one another during this time is something worth highlighting. Most of the internship opportunities came in through individual contacts of the committee, faculty coordinator and students. Internship opportunities were posted on the common classroom WhatsApp group and updates were given daily on the progress of the students.

The industry internship not only allowed students to gain key experience in a variety of departments but also, got to learn a number of new things that would prove to be helpful in future. Through this internship, students got a chance to understand the working of each department, the flow of the information, the team exercise, brainstorming, day to day operational breakdown and the procedure behind each task. Apart from understanding the functioning of a corporate giant known for its huge business empire and the legacy it carries, student got to understand in depth what a brand's identity actually means and why is it so essential for it to reflect in every major and minor aspect of the brand. Lastly, they got to learn what the brand stands for, it's USP and upon finding it how to mould themselves to work accordingly and understand the vision for a retail innovation.





Two cohorts of BVoc ECCME have completed internships in different organizations. In semester-5, the students assisted the center/organization heads in various programs for young children. During this internship, the focus was on developing skills - to set up a center, create, plan, manage, and run activities and routines as well as to provide guidance to the facilitators and supervisors. Rethinking inclusivity in Indian educational policy

Rethinking inclusivity in Indian educational policy How education policies in India are exclusionary towards children in child care institutions.

With the roll-out of the National Education Policy 2020, all heads turned towards the significant reforms that can be expected in the Indian education system. However, history repeated itself, and there was one group that did not find mention in this educational policy like several others, i.e., children in institutionalised care. A closer look at several education and child protection policies and government guidelines reveals how there are multiple chinks in the armour, which lead to huge lapses in ensuring quality education and after school educational support for these marginalised children.

As per the Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights, over 35 million children in India are classified as 'Children in Need of Care and Protection (CNCP). (35) million Children 2019) CNCD is one of the two arouns

A large number of school-goers in India rely on academic support outside the school. As per the NSSO Survey in 2017 - 2018, nearly 20% of students in pre-primary and above were taking private tuitions. In secondary level and above, 30% of students were taking private tuitions. (NSO 2018) The data shows that in states where enrolment in government schools is high, the dependence on private tuitions is also high and vice versa. This relationship directly points to the dissatisfaction of parents and students with the quality of education in government schools. On average, a family spends 12% of its education budget on private tuition for their children. Private tutors are seen as a bridge to overcome the gap in the quality of school education and help students compete better with

their peers and competitive exams. For institutionalised children in shelter homes, the access to such support is limited and often dependent on private contributors
