राज्य ब्यूरो, नई दिल्ली : दिल्ली सरकार दिल्ली में अत्याधुनिक सुविधाओं से लैस अंबेडकर विश्वविद्यालय के दो नए परिसर (कैंपस) बनाएगी। विभिन्न पाद्यक्रमों में वहां 26 हजार से अधिक विद्यार्थियों को व्यक्तिला मिल सकेगा। वे नए परिसर 2306.58 करोड़ रूपमें की लाता सं सं रोहिणों और धीरपुर में बनाए जाएंगे। सरकार की व्यव एवं वित्त समिति ने इन वे नए परिसरों के नियोण के लिए विश्तीय मंजूरी ची है। अभी इस विश्वविद्यालय में चार हजार छात्र हैं। वाली, अगेने वाले वार्ष में कुल मिलाकर 30 हजार छात्र वार्विला सं स्वीते उपसुख्यमंत्री मनीप रिससीटिया ने करा के कि नियोग्या दाखिला मिल सकेगा। ये नए परिसर

रेजिडेंशियल यूनिट भी बनाई जाएंगी नए परिसरों की खासियत : विवि वे संटर, रिसर्च सेंटर, लाइब्रेरी, कैंटीन छात्र सेंटर, खेल सुविधाएं, गेस हाउस और हेल्थ सेंटर होगा।



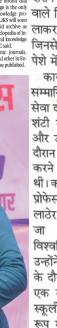
AUD unveils centre on Indian languages

RENDEZVOUS WITH VICE CHANCELLOR

Professor Anu Singh Lather



The University had taken many community-based initiatives towards COVID care, it has also made academic and outreach interventions around the pandemic, kindly share your thoughts on why you felt this was important?

Pandemic times needed concerted efforts by everyone. The University played an active role in conducting vaccination drives, procuring oxygen cylinders, offering psychological support through Ehsaas Clinic—psychotherapy based counseling during and beyond the peak covid times.

In addition to these, the University has also taken a lead role in generating social science based knowledge around the pandemic. The Outreach and Extension Division organised an online Faculty Development Program titled 'Pandemic: Experiences and Implications' (28th February to 29th April 2022, sessions were held for four hours every weekend) . The aim of the FDP was to bring together professionals from various backgrounds to share and reflect upon their experiences during the pandemic and to discuss their implications on society. Resource persons were called upon representing various government offices, corporate enterprises and civil society organisations to share their strategies, challenges and coping mechanisms during the pandemic. This was a first of its kind programme done by the University, through which roles and responsibilities of frontline workers like doctors and nurses, professionals involved with essential services, agencies like post and telegraph, food delivery, those providing psychosocial care, faith based associations or theatre professionals were discussed with the participants. 22 participants successfully completed the programme and were awarded certificates. Most participants took important lessons from these sessions and shared positive feedback about the initiative. Padamshri awardee Shri Jitender Singh Shunty delivered the valedictory lecture at the event. A Manual on the lessons learnt from the professionals will be published by the Division to be disseminated to communities outside of the University.

Research and Consultancy Division of the University organised *Shodhotsav* 2022, a National Young Researchers' Conference (1-3 June 2022) with the theme 'Researching (in) the Pandemic'. Prof. (Dr.) Randeep Guleria, Director, All India Institute of Medical Sciences, New Delhi delivered the keynote address for the event. The event gave an opportunity to various scholars to present their papers, participate in panel discussions and photo essay exhibitions. It was an enriching event which saw enthusiastic participation by both faculty and research scholars across eminent institutions of higher education across the country. Locating marginalities, Narrating the Past, Children in the Pandemic, Sufferings and Survival, Pandemic and Intersectionalities, Indian Education and Pandemic, Health and Livelihood, Mental Health and Disability in the Pandemic were the themes of academic sessions and panel discussions held during these three days. The valedictory address was delivered by Prof. Virendra Kumar Malhotra, Member Secretary, Indian Council of Social Science Research, New Delhi.

The Centre for Publishing of the University has created a publication space for the students of the University through 'Reflexive Essays'. Six students from BA, MA and PhD programmes wrote reflections on the lessons learnt from a panel discussion organised by the Centre titled 'Caring for Children, Responding to Vulnerability'.

The University has established the International Affairs Division with an aim towards internationalisation. What are the future activities that you think this Division needs to perform?

The International Affairs Division (IAD) takes the mission of internationalisation of higher education as envisaged in the NEP 2020 very seriously. It actively seeks collaboration opportunities that would benefit the students and faculty of the university. Currently, IAD has projects underway or being negotiated with University of Guelph, University of Toronto, Indiana University Bloomington, and George Mason University. In the past students and faculty have also been participating in various programmes under the auspices of Erasmus, DAAD, and Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute. The division has also worked with the United States India Education Foundation to place a substantial number of Fulbright student and faculty fellows from various universities in the United States of America at the University. The IAD also supports the international student population at the University with various initiatives like the monthly International Students Coffee hourand welcome reception for international scholars over the course of an academic year. Currently the number of international students enrolled are fourteen with representations from Bangladesh, Maputo-Mozambique, Tibet, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Malawi, Ethiopia, Afghanistan, Myanmar, Canada, and the USA. Students are enrolled in Sociology, Development Studies, Public Health, Hindi, English, Psychology, Public Health, Sustainable Urbanism, Law, Politics and Society. We are committed to increase this number and facilitate regular interaction with different international embassies.

The University did a local history exhibition with the villagers of Gummanhera, tell us about the initiative and any future plans there?

The university has been working towards establishing a sustained relationship with the village of *Gummanhera*. One of these has been the Centre for Community Knowledge's (CCK) documentation of village life through oral history research. This work was exhibited in the village in May 2022. It was fascinating how one site enabled us to understand a range of issues around rural-urban relations, periurban changes and unique architectural forms as well. The opening of the exhibition had many community members, including the local MLA Mr Gulab Singh in attendance. Multiple conversations about the themes of the exhibition took place during the event. CCK is also bringing out an illustrated publication on the village. The university aims to carry out outreach activities in *Gummanhera* in the near future, especially related to young people's education and career development.

Field activities and internships are important pedagogic components in different academic programmes of the University, how do you think that the NEP adoption will further impact these activities?

The University has always adopted a holistic approach towards education and there is substantive initiative taken towards field engagement as a pedagogic component of different courses that are transacted. Field exposure visits to various sites connected with the academic programme, industrial training, internships, exchange and outreach programmes with the community, have been an integral part of our academic programmes and continue to increase in vigour and emphasis in the current times. It helps to create a grounded understanding of issues discussed in the classroom as well as creates opportunities for networking with offices of government, industry, civil society and business professionals. We are confident of taking the NEP provisions ahead with our practices of engaged scholarship and inter-disciplinary education model. The three-fold focus of the University towards research, field-based engagement and internship will make us leaders of Multidisciplinary Education and Research University (MERU) as envisaged in the NEP.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

As the world begun 2022, with some more hope and endurance, the community at Dr B. R. Ambedkar University Delhi continued with hybrid modes of functioning, before welcoming everyone back on campus. This Newsletter, Issue 6, charts the activities of the University between January to June of 2022 to demonstrate the continued academic engagement with the impact and lessons from the pandemic while reaching out to multiple community outreach activities.

In these six months, the University organized a few events for the first time:

- Launched the International Summer School, by the School of Education Studies, 'Experiencing Diversity: Schools of Education in Project-based Collaborations' in association with the Ludwigsburg University of Education, Germany
- Conducted a Faculty Development Programme 'Pandemic: Experiences and Implications' organized by the Outreach and Extension Division
- Created Humara Gummanhera: Local History Exhibition organized by the Centre for Community Knowledge
- Celebrated International Women's Day and distributed books and stationery among students of the adopted clusters of the University, organized by the Outreach and Extension Division
- Celebrated World Creative and Innovation Day, organized by Atal Incubation Centre-Ambedkar University Development Fund

The University continued with its commitment to facilitating research by organizing the second

Annual Research Festival *Shodatsav*. This time a National Young Researchers' Conference, 'Researching (in) the Pandemic' was organized by Research and Consultancy Division. Nearly sixty papers and photo essay presentations by research scholars from across higher education institutions in India were part of the deliberations.

The Training and Placement Cell of the University arranged for 18 organizations to come for placement and internship opportunities for our students. 54 students, mostly from different postgraduate programmes were offered campus placement during this time period.

In this Newsletter many of the Schools have reported about their field based engagement as part of their programmes. School of Heritage Research and Management have conducted multiple museum and archaeological site visits for its students. School of



Vocational Studies did field based immersion with mobile creches in different communities of Delhi.

As the University community returned to campus; sports, dance and music, yoga all came back with renewed enthusiasm and brightened up the spaces with a refreshed rhythm. It is this spirit of collective celebration and sustained handholding that the University espouses for the community within and the wider public in the city.

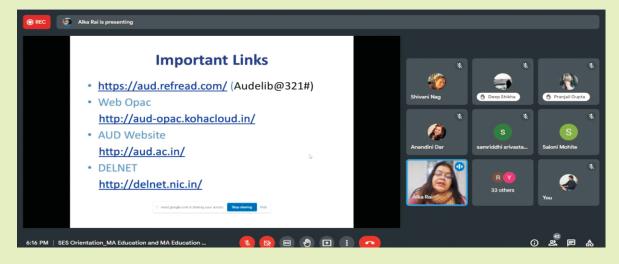
holding Gandhi Katha and has established many organizations to work for Sarvodaya, Gram Swaraj, and constructive programs.

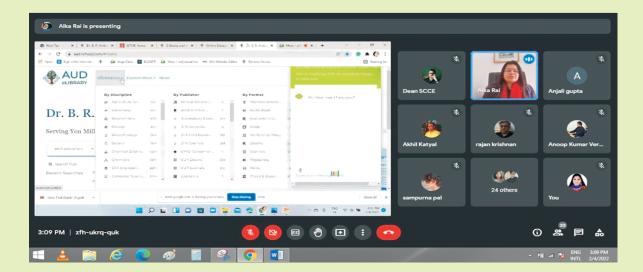

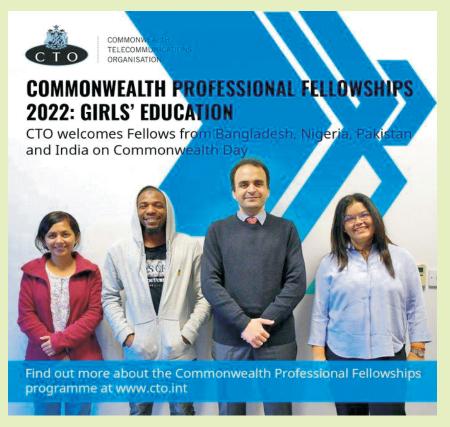

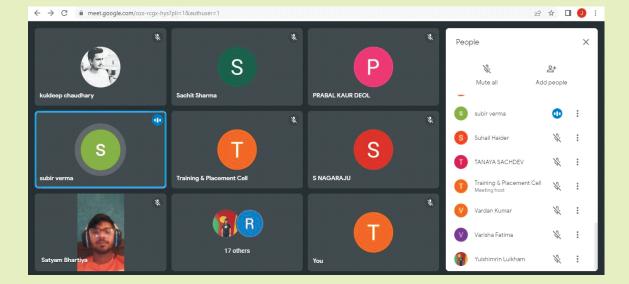

Ambedkar University has launched a Centre for Research and Archiving in Indian Languages and Indic Knowledge Systems (CRA-ILIKS) under the School of Letters to investigate into the working of myriad knowledge systems of pre-colonial

The university said that the centre has been started

with a financial grant of ₹6 crore from the Art, Culture and Languages Department of the Delhi government.

The university said CRA-ILIKS will have four components. It will build a bhasha archive, a vast, multipronged and constantly growing digital collection propelled by a multilingual search engine and userfriendly interface on the web. It will be accompanied

by a substantial programme of translation, transcription and curation. The multidisciplinary academic research and a publication programme will make the other two necessary components.

Professor Anu Singh Lather, Vice-Chancellor of AUD, said the centre had been launched in line with the emphasis by the National Education Policy on Indian knowledge systems. She added that the research is intended to challenge the dominance of western social theory and the notion that English language is the only medium of knowledge production. CRA-ILIKS will soon launch aforesaid archive as well as an encyclopedia of Indian thought and knowledge systems, the V-C said.

Two academic journals, one in Hindi and other in English, will also be published.

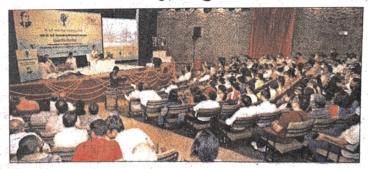

Media studies, stats among new courses to be launched at AUD

New Delhi: Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD) is planning to launch a host of new courses and programmes, including media studies, mathematics, statistics, data, philosophy and religious study.

Officials said that master's programmes in public policy and criminology were also likely to be launched soon. "A school of mathematics, statistics and data sciences may be launched

next year," they said.

The university expects to increase its student intake from the current 4,000 to 30,000 once the new campuses in Dheerpur and Rohini are functional, AUD vice-chancellor Anu Singh Lather said. "We have a mission to create AUD as a research university. As per the National Education Policy, our focus will be in multidisciplinary aspects. We would like to venture into many more ideas within the aspects of NEP. We are also planning to introduce certificate courses in artificial intelligence with online or blended teaching," the VC said.

Apart from an aim of certifying at least 500 students on the various certificate courses this year, the varsity also plans to link the skill centres with outreach and extension work.

Lather further said that once the new campuses are ready, the varsity would have to vacate its Kashmere Gate and Lodhi Road campuses.

AUD applications increase nine-fold

UNDER THE Common University Entrance Test (CUET) umbrella. Ambedkar University has drawn more

than nine times the number of applications it received last year, university authorities report.

AUD is one of 12 state governmentrun universities which have opted to conduct their undergraduate admissions through the CUET this year, along

with 44 central universities, 11 deemed and 19 private universities.

University officials have stated that they have received 3.03.413 registrations for which payments have been made on the National Testing Agency portal. This is a massive jump from the registrations that it had received last year when applicants had to apply individually on the university's website - approximately 32,000 paid registrations in 2021-2022.

Vice-Chancellor Anu Lather said opting for the CUET has likely increased the national visibility of the university leading to the huge jump in registrations.

'It is a matter of great pride and satisfaction for us as a university. We have taken the right decision to subscribe to CUET. The participation in CUET has increased the visibility of the university at the national level," she said. The last date to make payments against registrations for CUET was May 22. According to registration data of all universities, as of May 19, AUD had the sixth highest number of paid registrations at the time, only behind large central universities such as DU, Banaras Hindu University, Allahabad University, and Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University and the private IIMT University in Meerut. It has 17 UG programmes for which it is conducting admissions through CUET and 85% seats are reserved for candidates from Delhi.

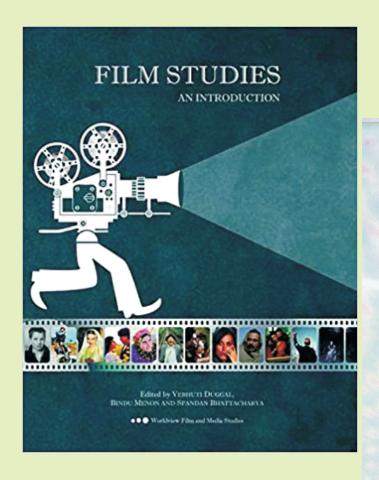

Hunger in India likely to grow again

COVID-19 lockdowns aggravated food deprivation in India. The pandemic also revealed opportunities to expand the country's food subsidy programs.

India's Public Distribution System (PDS) offers subsidised food grains to eligible households. Public pressure during COVID-19 lockdowns led to a brief expansion in the number of beneficiaries in states such as Delhi. Though temporary, the expansion covered groups who were particularly hard hit by the unforeseen and severe lockdown, such as migrant workers who were suddenly unemployed.

Despite continuing hunger and food deprivation, allocation under the distribution scheme has returned to levels for 'normal' times. The scheme is now limited to those who were eligible for it before the pandemic, jeopardising the food security of a large number of impoverished people. A reading of the food security laws that does not factor in yearly population growth has prevented the government from expanding the pool of eligible beneficiaries.

Engaging Young Children with Science Concepts in a Community-Based Book Distribution and Animal-Themed Literacy **Intervention Program**

This descriptive case study presents findings from a 2 year research study on an intervention program, Reading with Animals, launched in a linguistically, ethnically, and racially diverse Central New York community. The local literacy coalition implemented the Dolly Parton's Imagination Library (IL) program in two low-income zip codes as one of the initiatives to foster literacy development across the lifespan. The program mailed a free book to families with children under the age of five once a month in an effort to increase access to books in the community. Reading with Animals was launched by the coalition with the specific aim of encouraging read-alouds with children's literature focused on animal-themes received coalition with the specific aim of encouraging read-alouds with children's literature focused on animal-themes received from the IL to increase content area literacy, especially related to science. All program participants were enrolled in both programs. The Reading with Animals program was organised around active modeling of animal-themed books, interaction with live animals, and strategies woven across use of biofacts, music and movement, arts and crafts, and snack time. Data from observations, interviews, and artifacts indicated active participation of families and children in the program and engagement with science concepts. The study also pointed to implications for introducing more content-based literacy strategies for preschool children, for developing inclusive strategies for diverse classrooms, and the need for strengthening the same in teacher education programs.

Chapter 5 **COVID-19 and Early Childhood Care** and Education in India

Introduction

The coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic ravaged across nations and affected all walks of life in different ways. The impact has been especially severe for countries with underfunded, overburdened and fragile support systems for young children and families. The pandemic has left almost half of the children across the world with low levels of literacy along with poor health conditions (UNESCO, 2021). With job losses and consequent social and economic changes, it sharply divided the academic, social and political world in India-especially more so for the already marginalized in the country. The pandemic acutely affected lives of young children and families with closure of preschools and schools. It has been more than a year since the pandemic hit the world in March 2020 and the turmoil has continued across all walks of life and generations. As far as the education of young children in India is concerned, aside from the obvious (i.e., the closure of schools and preschools) information regarding the changes brought about in the education system and access to education during the pandemic is scarce and scattered. This chapter will present an analysis of the impact of COVID-19 pandemic on the landscape of early childhood care and education (ECCE) in India while also serving as a tool for reflection for those from other countries. It will provide an overview of the effects on the academic aspects, social, emotional and physical development, family-school relationships, and the reach of technology across homes of young children. It will weave in the policy context vis-à-vis the functioning of the institutions that provide ECCE services for children and families and how the pandemic has deepened the already existing gap in access to support.

Unfortunately, even as new research trajectories are long forged, several studies continue to frame young people in the global South as either victims or heroes, limiting their contributions to the empirical / field informant domain, rather than producers or sources of knowledge in and of themselves. Against this backdrop, the growth of dedicated university departments and research funding for scholars, especially in Europe and the USA, reiterates and demonstrates the pressing need for a more inclusive dialogue among scholars spread across various political and cultural contexts, especially those working in, on, and among young people in the regions of the global South, which constitute major sites of research enquiry. In fact, the ongoing global COVID-19 pandemic has aggravated these disparities.





Institutional Norms as Hindrance to Participation of Women as Members of Academic Community

As an undergraduate student in an all-girls college in Delhi, I had to commute nearly two hours one way daily in public transport (which meant only buses in the pre-metro days) to travel the distance between my home and the college which were at the two near opposite ends of the city. Co-Designing Urban Play Spaces to Improve Migrant Children's Wellbeing

Between 2001 and 2011, India's urban population inc almost 28 per cent to just over 31 per cent. Almost 139 million pe migrated to cities (mainly Delhi and Mumbai), often bringing their children with them. Most live in poverty in informal settlements that lack basic infrastructure and services. Their children are often out of school and have no safe spaces to play. The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), ratified by India in 1989, recognises children's right to play as fundamental to their social, emotional, and physical wellbeing. Urban planners need to involve children in co-designing better neighbourhoods that accommodate children's right to play.

Key messages

- Children need access to safe and age-appropriate play spaces for their healthy development and wellbeing.
- Urban planning and development processes need to be more childfriendly to design safe, sustainable, and inclusive cities for everyone.
- Urban policy frameworks and planning processes should recognise the needs of children of migrants and other disadvantaged groups, and involve them as co-designers of public spaces.
- State-level organisations and departments tasked with providing services for slum dwellers (such as the Delhi Urban Shelter Improv Board) should prioritise designated play and childcare spaces.

Children need access to safe and ageappropriate play spaces for their healthy development wellbeing.

Abstract

This special issue contributes insights into ongoing debates on the politics and ethics of knowledge production in "global" childhood studies by decentering dominant, northerncentric models of childhood and using southern epistemologies. We contest the ways in which most of the world's children have their experiences and contexts interpreted through the theoretical canons, vernaculars and institutions of northern academia. Drawing on studies that deploy indigenous, decolonial and postcolonial perspectives on the study of childhood and children in different temporal moments and spatial contexts of Africa, Latin America and South Asia, authors of papers aim to push the boundaries for ways of knowing children and doing childhood studies through cross-disciplinary, generative south-north and south-south encounters. The special issue critically engages with questions of epistemic plurality and bottom-up theorization of research with globally southern children, to both rectify the onto-epistemological imbalance in childhood studies and reinscribe indigenous knowledge systems that have received limited attention in this field thus far.

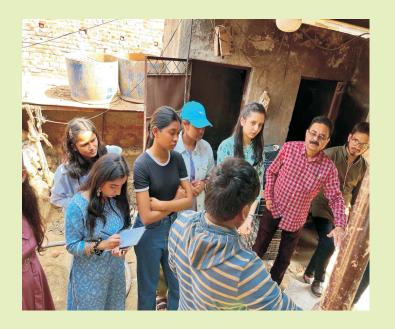

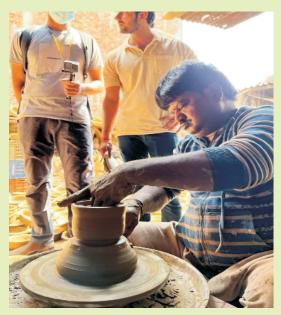

Potter's Workshop

As part of teaching-learning exercise for students of MA in Archaeology 1st semester—'Archaeology: Method and Theory Course', a one-day on-site workshop was organized on March 10, 2022. The potter's workshop is located in Vikas Nagar, Uttam Nagar, where Mr. Ramjeet Khoeya prepares a variety of earthen wares at his work-place as per the order he gets from different parts of Delhi and its neighborhood. Students learnt about the entire process of clay preparation—from the procurement of raw clay to making it into soft malleable plastic clay, suitable for working on fast-wheel. Mr. Khoeya informed how, with the passage of time, the shape and size of the wheel changed—from simple cross-bar wooden wheel which was rotated manually using stick to the present day motorized wheel.

The students learnt the method of making pots on wheel and also various decorations/designs on it. They also tried themselves to make pots on wheel to get a feel of clay and coordination while working on the wheel. The workshop was very interactive and students asked a number of questions such as the achievement of plasticity in clay, kneading, workability of clay, leather-hard condition of clay. The potter also showed different tools and helping appliances useful for carrying out certain works, especially for making hand-made pots and luting additional parts such as handle of pots and spouts of vases, etc. At the end Mr. Ramjeet demonstrated how the kiln is prepared and made ready for baking the dried-up pots.

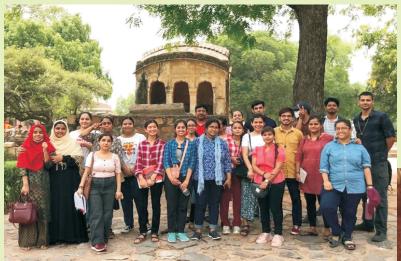




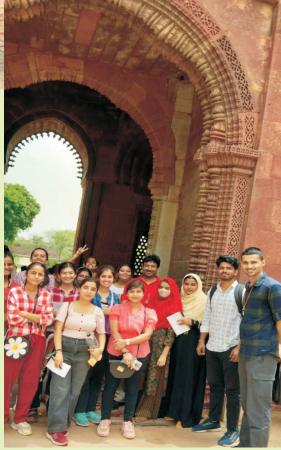

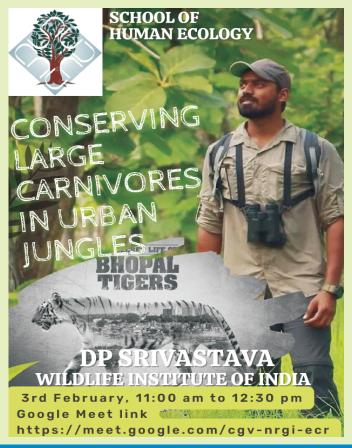

Rangeland Conservation, Pastoralist Displacement, and Long-term Implications of a Grazing Ban in the Indian Himalaya

Abstract: Conservation-induced displacement has been one of the major critiques of protected area management across South Asia. While there has been a steady increase in research on physical displacement, studies on loss of mobility remain limited. In 1998, a grazing ban was implemented in the state of Sikkim in the Eastern Himalayan region of India. Livestock herding in protected areas was restricted, and pastoral evictions were carried out across the state between 2000 restricted, and pastoral evictions were carried out across the state between 20002. Fifteen years after the ban, we conducted this study to understand the long-term implications of the prohibition on grazing as well as that of the pastoral evictions in and around Khangchendzonga National Park (KNP). Ex-herders' responses to the displacement included passive acceptance, resistance and contestation, and negotiation using power and social networks. These responses were distinctly correlated with the herder's wealth class. The pastoral practices of the Dokpa herders of North Sikkim have been transforming in response to the geo-political and socio-economic changes in the region. Against the backdrop of these changes, this study aims to understand the current state of pastoralism in North Sikkim with three specific objectives. (i) to understand the current rangeland management practices of the Dokpa community; (ii) to examine the social, political and ecological stresses to con tinuity of traditional pastoral livelihoods; and (iii) to document the baseline on human-wildlife relations. We focused on one of the two subset populations of Dokpa herders of North Sikkim and, using a mixed-methods approach. on one of the two subset populations or Dokpa nergers or North Sikkim and, using a mixed-methods approach, conducted 12 semi-structured interviews, four key respondent interviews and two focused group discussions. The resource use by the Dokpas is unique, and unlike the rest of the Himalayan range, they access the high-altitude pastures in winters and the lower ones in summer. Pastures in the higher altitudes experience heavier winds, which leads to lower levels of snow deposition — thus ensuring access to dried pasture forage for livestock during the lean season. The decisions pertaining to resource management are taken by the head of the local institution Dzums, the Plpon. Primary stresses to the continuation of traditional pastoral practices are fragmentation of pastureland post-Sino-Indian war of 1962 and the consequent establishment of armed forces, livestock depredation by free-ranging sino-inain war of 1192 and the consequent establishment of armed lorces, investock depredation by three-ranging dogs followed by wild predators and continued socio-economic marginalisation of the pastoralists under a supposedly egalitarian institutional regime. Extreme climatic events in the recent past have also contributed to significant livestock loss. Dokpa transhumant practices are on an overall decline, with most members of the younger generation shifting to non-herding livelihoods. The availability of alternate livelihood options with the improved connectivity, access to education and development of the tourism industry has led to changing aspirations of the younger generations. In only two of the twelve households we surveyed, the younger generation continues herding, while the rest have moved to the cities and towns. In terms of human-wildlife relations, the respondents mostly hold a positive attitude towards wildlife and conservation actions despite livestock predation by wild predators, since the free-rang-ing dogs cause the highest livestock loss. With the inputs from the Dokpas, we provide recommendations towards a facilitative environment for the continuation of the traditional herding in the region, which is critical for the survival of pastoralism in North Sikkim, presently hinged on less than two dozen of elderly Dokpas.

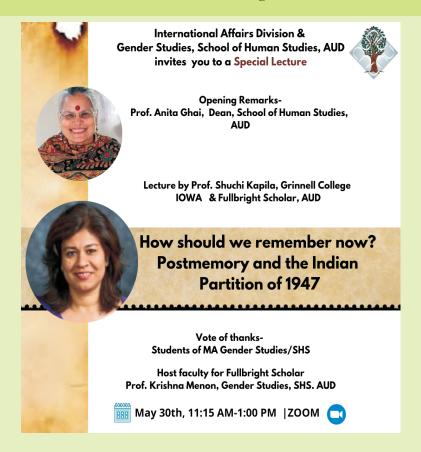

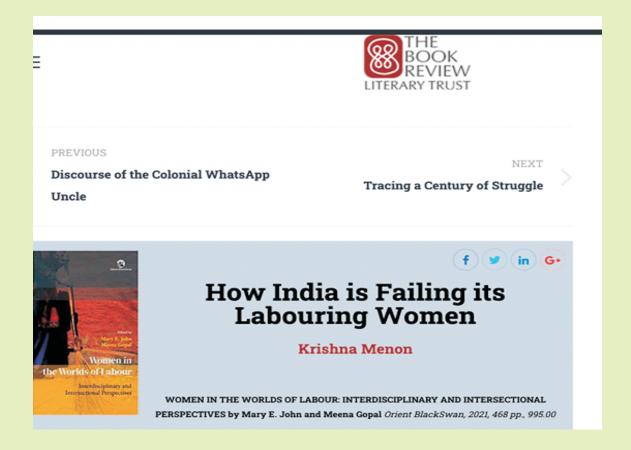


Prof. Kapila gave a very invigorating and insightful lecture into the post-memory aspect of the Partition of 1947 wherein she discussed how migration affects memory, the difference between traumatic memory and other kinds of memories amongst other things.



Professor Kapila, who reiterated the legal and political history of the USA. The country's federalist structure has provided diverse views on abortion, from being seen as a constitutional right to a customary practice only. The talk also touched upon second-wave feminism and the recent women's rights movement in the wake of previous US president Donald Trump's speeches and political affiliations. Abortion, when studied in the context of its historical existence, racism, civil rights movements, equal rights movement and racist genocidal, demonstrate a complex history that should be studied a collective and not in isolation. She concluded her talk with a need to be pro-choice to uphold women's autonomy.

Shubhra Nagalia brought the discussion to the Indian context. MTP Act of 1971 and the family planning programs were discussed to stress the importance of addressing the linguistic aspects of the laws created for women and the moral justifications provided for them. Arguing for a long-overdue women's rights movement in India for the right sets of policies and laws for women, she demonstrated how arguments of overpopulation and ambiguous definitions of critical terms in the laws have been used to continue to have control over women's bodies and choices.

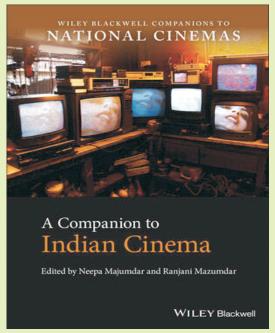

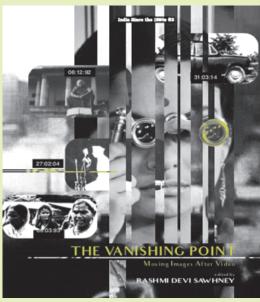

This is as true for the "situation" of media as it is for media research and scholarship. In film studies, for instance, we know that what is available has more or less determined what is studied, but what we think less about its how the medium in which films are available laso determines what can be said about films. Changes brought about by technology do not just alter the way we watch films but also how we study it. In this article I focus on one crucial infrastructure — archives of cinema — and examine how the digital moment and the emergence of collaborative knowledge and infrastructure on the Internet enables us to reimagine film archives and consequently the way that films are studied. In particular, I will look at the specific challenges of film archives in India in the context of the possibilities opened out by the digital movement.

We write this introduction in February 2022 just as the Canadian truckers' protest, demanding an end to all government pandemic measures, has been brought to an end at the behest of the executive by powers enabled through the Emergencies Act of 1988. Beginning in Ottawa in late January as demonstrations challenging vaccine requirements for cross-border truckers, and then spreading to a blockade of Detroit's Ambassador Bridge, the mobilising sentiment had been COVID-related restrictions that are imposed and taken away in ways that do not always make sense to the public for whom they are intended (Alden 2022). The protest had become a form of economic blockade, which hit auto industry supply chains in Canada, and appeared in both France and New Zealand (BBC News 2022). By now it is well known that the Canadian Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, had threatened to arrest the truckers; have their licences cancelled; suspend vehicle insurance; seize bank accounts of anyone donating to the protestors; and crack down on crowdfunding and cryptocurrency sites that had enabled the protestors to raise more than CAD\$10 million in three weeks in order to protect the 'sovereignty, security and territorial integrity of Canada. The analysis of the protests has only just begun, and the political frames being deployed, including: amorphous, siege, and a carnival of chaos (Coletta et al. 2022); nonviolent civil disobedience (Thiessen 2022); right-wing extremism and violence (Bresge 2022); illegal occupation (Washington Post 2022); and a lucky fringe movement (Kitroeff and Austen 2022)-suggest that we are at some distance from understanding the political momentum that the protest has generated in the world's tenth largest democracy, which has seen one of the strictest restriction regimes since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic.

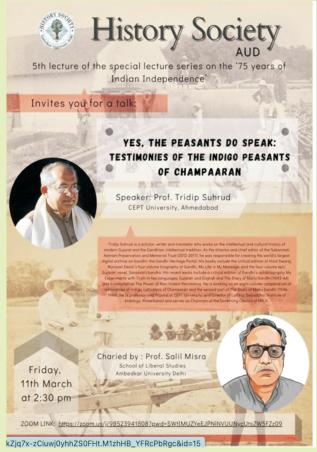

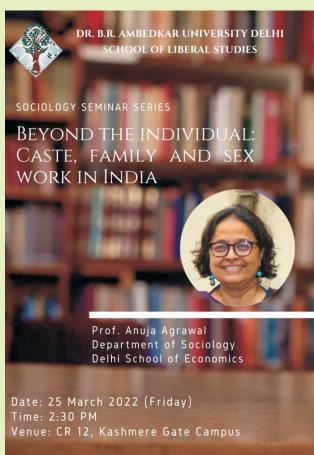

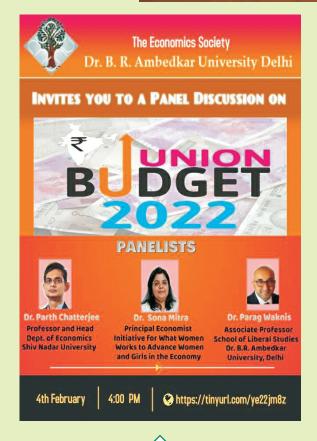

To engage with the dynamics and responses to #MeToo in higher education in India, as this chapter does, we must first examine the increasing presence of women students and a rhetoric of gender equality promoted within institutions of higher learning. The higher-education landscape in India is rapidly and vastly transforming. In postcolonial societies such as India, education and law are two major sites through which social emancipation is expected and possible, if one is able to access them. According to the sociologist Satish Deshpande, formal access to higher education has expanded exponentially (Deshpande 2011). Between 1991 and 2013-2014, total enrollment in higher education increased 6.5 times (from 49 million to 323 million); the number of universities nearly quadrupled (184 to 723); and the gross enrollment ratio for the 18-23 age group almost tripled (from 8.1 percent to 23.9 percent). Women now account for almost 42 percent of total enrollment but still comprise only around 18 percent in the technical-professional fields (Kapur and Mehta 2017). The lower castes are also increasing their share in enrollment but are still below their share with respect to their percentage of the overall population. There are also important differences by gender, field of study, and region. Yet by all indications Hindu upper-caste males, who comprised more than two-thirds of all graduates in the not-too-distant past, are now a minority among currently enrolled students even as they are still overrepresented relative to their share of the overall population (Kapur and Mehta 2017). 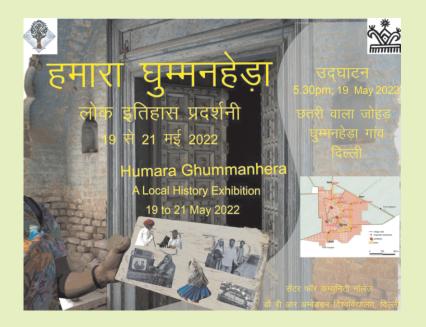

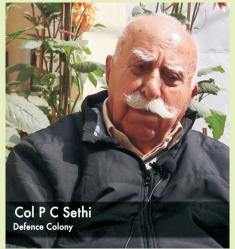

Children - The Biggest Casualty of Covid-19 Pandemic

On a global level, COVID-19 has shaken our world, causing catastrophic damage to children and families. There are a variety of stressors that affect families and children, ranging from loss of employment to supply shortages. One thing that can be reasonably said is that most people are unlikely ever to be as precise as they once were before the Covid pandemic, atime that seems far from reality today. Much of the last two years have been a blur for many, with days of the week—becoming merely "yesterday" and "tomorrow" or "just one more day." Since early 2020, the world has been plagued with fear of uncertainty, anxiety, and paranoia. Many of our life's interpretations have suddenly been turned on its head. Misinformation and speculations are born out of fear — both dystopian predictions and promises.

A Tragedy with an Opportunity

Steering Through Complicated Adoption Laws Amidst the Storm of Covid 19

National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) <u>informed</u> the Supreme Court on June 5, that as per data submitted by different states, as many as 30,071 children were orphaned, lost a parent or have been abandoned due to the pandemic. Out of the total, 26,176 children who've lost a parent, 3,621 have been orphaned and 274 have been abandoned.

Subsequently, a Supreme Court bench of Justices L. N. Rao and Aniruddha Bose on 8 June 2021 ordered, directions for care and protection of minors who have become orphans or have lost one parent or were abandoned. The court highlighted that the invitation for the adoption of orphans is contrary to law as no adoption can be permitted without the involvement of the Central Adoption Resource Authority(CARA).

Ehsaas Walk-in Clinic: As part of the initiative to make the university a mental health friendly space, the Centre started with our walk-in facility which runs from Monday to Friday 1-2.

Trained the MA students to offer a sensitive space for listening to our students who have been under crisis or other difficult life circumstances.

Ehsaas Listening Circles: As part of the same initiative, the Centre has been running Group Counselling Sessions to help students express and find a space for language for their life circumstances. Some of the group themes are: Dealing with Grief, Listening to the crisis of LGBTQ group, etc



WHAT CAN YOU EXPECT FROM THESE WALK-IN SUPPORT SESSIONS?

Our aim is to provide a safe listening space to explore thoughts and emotions that you may not be able to find space for in your daily life. In addition, if during our conversations we discover that scrape runs deeper - it is more of a wound and might require specialized work, we will work with you to identify and access other support options such as psychotherapy. Lastly, rest assured, everything that you will share with us will remain confidential.

WHO WILL YOU BE MEETING?

You will meet trainee mental health professionals (MHPs) who are currently pursuing MA Psychology at AUD. The attached presentation highlights brief profiles of the trainee MHPs.

CAN YOU HAVE MORE THAN ONE SESSION?

Yes, depending on your needs, 2-4 follow-up sessions could be arranged with the trainee MHPs.

WHAT IS THE FEE TO SIGN-UP FOR THESE SESSIONS?

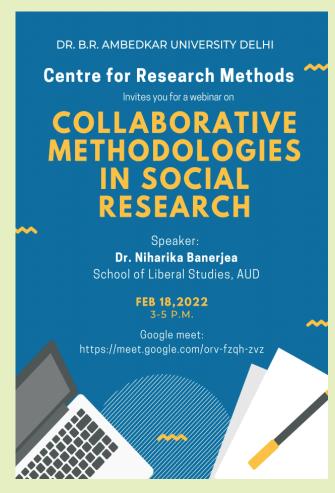

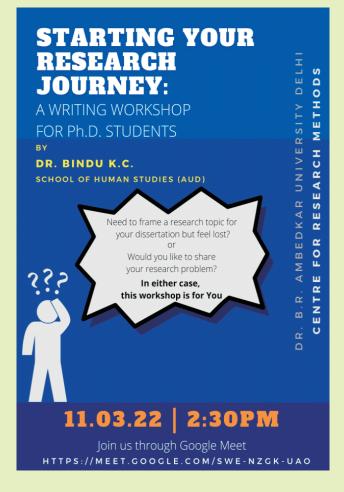

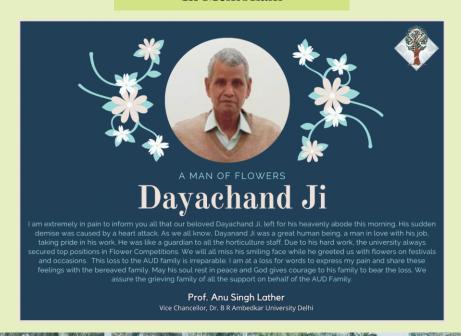
