FROM THE DESK OF THE VICE-CHANCELLOR

Dr B.R. Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD), is a public university, established by the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi in 2008. Mandated to focus on research and teaching in the Social Sciences and Humanities and guided by Dr Ambedkar's vision of bridging equality and social justice with excellence, AUD considers it to be its mission to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in higher education.

The university aspires to pioneer an institutional culture of non-hierarchical functioning, team work and creativity. The university strongly believes that no knowledge becomes socially productive unless it spreads across society, transcending barriers of caste, gender and class. Only then can teaching and learning become liberating.

AUD is one among just a few universities in India to cater exclusively to research and higher learning in the Humanities and Social Sciences. In today's polarised world, the study of these streams, we strongly believe, will not only play a pivotal role in improving understanding amongst cultures but also transform human experiences into lessons for the future. The university aspires to mould its students into informed and competent as well as sensitive and compassionate professionals and citizens who will engage with their social responsibilities and will react to the needs of the marginalised sections of our society.

At present AUD is functioning with 13 Schools and 12 Centres spread across 3 three campuses. AUD has emerged as a City university catering to the needs of students in NCT. Students from other parts of the country and overseas have also been choosing AUD because of its distinctive pedagogic practices in teaching-learning processes.

This AUD Newsletter, covering activities and events from January to October 2019 provides a glimpse of vibrant life at AUD. In keeping with the broader objectives of the university; the newsletter showcases the multiple activities that are initiated at AUD in its attempts to create a socially aware and committed set of students and faculty. The university has reached new milestones in the last few months, undoubtedly the most important being the

inauguration of the permanent campuses of this university by the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Delhi, Shri Arvind Kejriwal. The Hon'ble Chancellor Shri Anil Baijal presided over the eighth and ninth Annual Court meeting of the university. The Academic Council met twice and Board of Management once over the last one year at AUD. AUD now has a refurbished website, an official Facebook page as well as its own Twitter handle.

The Newsletter is also, along with these, part of the efforts being made at AUD to reach out to those interested in excellent higher education pursued with the aim of equity and social transformation. Facilities like crèche and day care, sports centre and students common room have been initiated in the last months establishing our commitment to all sections of the university community. New units like Research and Consultancy, International Affairs Divisions, Proctor's office with a Proctorial Board, Equal Opportunities Office with SC/ST/OBC Cell within it, and a Career Cell have commenced from 2019. These expansions are keeping in mind the growing needs of the university as well as consolidating and formalising work done through erstwhile Academic Committee for Research and Project Management (ACRPM) or Academic Committee for International Partnerships (ACIP) or Proctoral Committee. These efforts shall and help in boost research, internationalization of the university.

The Newsletter highlights only some and not all events, pedagogic experiments, outreach initiatives of 2019 to communicate the diversity and vibrancy of the university. Over the next few months, we are commemorating 150th year of Mahatma Gandhi's birthday and 70th year of adoption of Indian Constitution through a range of academic and innovative activities. The university is due for NAAC accreditation beginning next year. A team of dedicated faculty and staff are working round the clock preparing for the NAAC visit. Encouraging more research among faculty, facilitating JRF scholars to join AUD, increasing financial support to our research scholars doing research without UGC fellowships, creating an environment wherein more faculty members can represent the university nationally and internationally are some of the future plans. AUD has been and will continue to network with other institutions of higher learning, civil society organizations, industry bodies, government departments, professional associations in and outside the city of Delhi in order to take academics beyond the university space while also making the university accessible to people from all sections of the society.

As this year comes to an end, I look forward to another invigorating and exciting year of working with all of you. I would like to sign off by wishing everyone a festive and joyous seasons' greeting.

SPIRIT that IMBUES AUD

This section will become a regular feature in the AUD NEWSLETTER—characterising the spirit that adorns Ambedkar University Delhi—a city University, a Delhi State government University, a university carrying the name of Dr BR Ambedkar, a University with a difference—daring to dream and create an engaged scholarship on social sciences and humanities. The imagination and setting up of the university has been a dedicated work of many individuals cutting across the administrative, academic and everyday maintenance aspects. This section will act as a cornerstone—reflections from, interviews with, reminiscence of members of the AUD community from when it began—some of whom continue to be a part of the University, some have moved beyond it. For the first issue, we have Professor Salil Misra, a historian with a penchant for Urdu nazms writing on the morning raga called AUD.

The Bliss of Dawn...

Salil Misra, Pro Vice Chancellor and Professor in History



The opening decade of the 21st century was an appropriate time to start a social science and humanities university. The project was extremely necessary. The objective forces were crying out for such a venture. But its subjective cognition took some time.

The last three decades in India had been truly revolutionary. Never before had such monumental changes been ushered into the social structure in such a short time. The changes that emanated from economic policies soon reached out to influence the social and political structures. A phase of rapid economic growth was accompanied by new anxieties, dislocation, disparities and a new spurt in identitarian pressures. All these changes were crying out for a comprehensive social science intervention. Objectively the society needed a substantial body of young and trained social scientists, ready to explore and unravel the mysteries and intricacies of the new changes. The huge phenomenon of social change was generally being codified in three different languages - the language of the Media, the bureaucrat and the NGOs. The Media was concerned more about here-and-now and not very interested in connecting different social events in time and space. The gaze of the Media was essentially a shortterm gaze. The language of the bureaucrat was confined to problem solving without much of an attempt at a systematic and comprehensive scrutiny. The language of the NGOs was either that of total denigration or that of total endorsement, depending on the ideological location of the NGO. The great need of the hour was to produce a generation of trained, skilled and competent social scientists who would undertake their social investigation with both compassion and moral detachment, without endorsement or denigration, and who would not succumb either to identitarian and populist pressures or to the seductive charms of the ivory towers of Olympian aloofness, so characteristic of our mainstream social sciences. Only a university exclusively committed to social sciences and humanities could produce such a generation of young and dynamic social science scholars, who would eventually take their place in the world of academia, Media, civil services, or the world of NGOs. These young and trained social scientists would certainly transform these institutions with their active presence and also change their languages.

It was in this kind of a milieu that a new social science and humanities created in 2008 and given the name of Ambedkar.

The choice of the name played some role in shaping the contours of the roadmap that was to be charted for the new university. It was to combine excellence, equity and access in such a way that no major value was unduly compromised. With this mandate, Prof. Shyam Menon, the founding Vice Chancellor, along with a small team of like-minded colleagues, set about creating the blueprint and also operationalizing some part of it. Three different kinds of academic programmes were envisaged and set in motion. In the first place, there were the conventional social science disciplines – Economics, History, Sociology, English and Psychology. Then there were some new areas that had emerged in the recent past and lent themselves eminently to an interdisciplinary treatment, such as Development Studies, Environmental Studies, and Gender Studies, among others. Then there was a third direction in which the boundaries of social sciences were to be extended in such a manner so as to bring various other fields into its orbit, such as Business Studies, Entrepreneurship, Social Design, Culture and Creative Expressions, Public Policy, and Incubation, among others. A research programme in Development Practice was meant to straddle through the worlds of theory and practice in such a way as to bring them closer to each other. A number of Centres were created which would incubate and nurture new areas and themes. These themes would then be translated into academic programmes, which would be transacted from Schools. For example, the Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development (CECED) started out with some important intellectual engagements with the theme of early childhood education and development. And then the School of Education Studies (SES) offered it as a Masters programme. With this end in view a network of Centres was created. All this was extremely ambitious and, given the constraints of space and other resources, only a small part of the blueprint could be initiated during the early years.

Prof. Anu Singh Lather, who joined AUD as its Vice Chancellor in February 2019, has thus inherited some advantages, some constraints and some challenges. The advantage is that a great beginning has already been made and a vibrant and committed community of teachers and students is in place. The original commitment to the University vision must evolve to nurture and develop the Indian society at large.

Bhabha.

School of Education Studies

Launch of Continuing Professional Development for Educators at the School of Education Studies

In Winter Semester 2019, the School of Education Studies (SES), AUD, launched Continuing Professional Development (CPD) for practicing professionals in education especially schoolteachers. The launch of the CPD opportunities is situated in the current context of school education and specifically in-service teacher education in the country.

The idea of starting CPD for educators at SES has been active since the inception of the School. It is an integral part of SES's vision of bridging the gap between the theory and practice of education and fostering greater dialogue and interface between the University and schools. SES planned six CPD certificate courses for practicing and aspiring educators in the following areas: Teachers as Researchers, English for Teachers, Language and Literacy Instruction for Inclusive Classrooms, Leading Change in Educational Institutions, and ICT in Education. Designed collaboratively with faculty members from other units of AUD (Centre for English Language Education and School of Vocational Studies), these courses aim at making quality education accessible to practitioners, especially for those in the public system of education.


Collaboration of School of Education Studies, Ambedkar University Delhi with Ludwigsburg University of Education, Germany

The School of Education Studies, AUD signed two mobility grants namely, ERASMUS+ Project and BWS+ Project in collaboration with the Ludwigsburg University of Education, Germany in 2017. These grants involve mobility of students, faculty and staff from the two institutions to develop and offer jointly-taught online seminars, workshops/seminars and summer schools for enriching the learning environment and developing professional capacities for social inclusion and diversity.


The year 2019 has seen a host of mobilities for students, faculty and staff. In February-March, three faculty and two staff members from LUE visited AUD and participated in seminars and consultations on multilingualism, disability and teacher education and discussed programme planning and staff and student selection. In May-June four faculty members visited LUE and taught seminars on themes related to language and literacy education, inclusion, gender and education, educational policy and curriculum. In addition, two SES students spent a semester at LUE as a part of student mobility from April to July.

From September 30 to October 11, LUE-AUD organised a Summer School on "Resilience in Education" at LUE in which eight AUD and eight LUE participated along with three faculty and nine faculty members from LUE.








RC 21 Annual Conference 18th-21st September 2019

Centre for Community Knowledge

CCK organised the Oral History Conference-Community, Place and Identity: Possibilities of Oral History on 1st and 2nd February 2019. The conference papers explore how construction, narration and negotiation of own and other identities is seen in relation to different situations, contexts and interviewers. A sense of space and time together create the meanings invested by people about the place they occupy, elaborating socio-spatial relations of community that account for both instrumental and communicative rationality, when dealing with collective identity and collective action.

MoU has been signed between the Government of NCT of Delhi and CCK to document the Oral Histo ries of Delhi in a programme called – Dilli ki Kahani, Dilliwalon ki Zubaani. Generically called the Delhi Memory Project-Oral Histories of Delhi, it has documented and researched the lived experiences and narratives of the community based practices of a transforming Delhi, from a collection of villages and old urban centres to the metropolis of the present day. Visual Memories of Delhi have also been collected and are visible online in the Memories of Delhi website (www.delhimemories.in)

CCK is a one of the four research hubs of the first phase of the Humanities across Borders (HaB) programme, Asia and Africa in the world, (2017 to 2020), funded by the International Institute of Asian Studies, Leiden, Netherlands and A W Mellon Foundation, NY, USA. The programme's primary goal is to de-canonize and globalize the Humanities in a vastly disparate and homogenizing 21st century world. This approach aims to reconnect higher education institution with the communities around them, to embed community voices in curricula and build an alternative community based pedagogical paradigm that reflects universal themes of water, nature, land, food, livelihoods, housing, clothes and other essentials of everyday life (jal, jangal, zammeen, roti, kapda and makaan).

Centre for Development Practice

Community Outreach

The Centre was envisaged as a platform for the much-needed dialogue between theories of development and practices of development. CDP fellows have undertaken multiple projects across the country. Eka Nari Sanghathan (Single Women's Collective) was formed in a village named Emaliguda in the Rayagada district of South Odisha. This was extended to four villages in the Sikarpai panchayat of the district. Women in 5 different villages would meet once a month at the village level and once every year under a mangrove where discussions around experiences of gendered violence, division of labour, health, questions of body and sexuality. Pahadi Padhai in Kullu valley, Himachal Pradesh is an art and linguistic based education program that weaves language learning with local knowledge to provide children between 10 to 16 years ground to practice English and at the same time debate key developmental ideas of their times. Local heritage, work, culture, and tradition is understood through painting, nature walks and group discussions. As part of ongoing 'action research' work, the centre is working closely in/with a (mostly Santhali) school in a small Santhali village in Bankura district of WB, attempting a re-imagination of the content and methods used in contemporary education, particularly primary education in an adivasi space. Project 'Kinare', supported by Price Water House Coopers works with farmers practicing agriculture along the river Yamuna in Delhi and focuses on building community collectives, thereby, generating holistic perspectives towards development. 'The River and the City' is a collaborative project between Centre for Development Practice and Centre for Community Knowledge at AUD, which envision to bring out narratives of the communities living along River Yamuna in Delhi and through these narratives understand various perspectives around the river. With the support of AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE), the centre is working on a low cost rooftop farming model which can in some way contribute to the food security for the population of Delhi.

Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development

Best of UNICEF Research 2019 Award

CECED conducted a flagship longitudinal research study called IECEI in three states- Rajasthan, Telangana, and Assam. This longitudinal research was done to study trends in participation and impact of quality variations in ECE on school readiness levels and primary school performance. The study was coordinated by CECED in partnership with Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) Centre. It is multi donor study, funded by UNICEF, The World Bank, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India (MHRD, GoI), Children's Investment Fund Foundation, Bernard van Leer Foundation and Society for Elimination of Rural Poverty, Government of Andhra Pradesh (SERP, GoAP). The study covered around 14607 children in two districts each of the three states and the duration of the study was 6 years.

This study has been acknowledged as one of the three research projects for special recognition among the 10 finalists in the 'Best of UNICEF Research 2019' awards. Rigorous international selection process is followed to identify three top studies from among ten finalists.





Centre for Psychotherapy and Clinical Research

CPCR and CSCS Workshop 12th-13th April, 2019

The Centre for Studies in Culture and Society (CSCS), Bangalore, and Centre for Psychotherapy and Clinical Research (CPCR), AUD, jointly organized a two-day long intensive workshop with the aim of approaching the 'history of psychoanalysis' in India through 'case histories' written by Indian psychoanalysts and published in Samiksha- the journal of the Indian Psychoanalytic Society. The workshop saw participation from psychoanalysts and psychotherapists as well as scholars from the field from Delhi, Kolkata, Goa and Bombay. The major themes that became the focal point of discussion included - colonial influence on psychoanalytic theorisation and practice in India, questions of cross cultural validity of key psychoanalytic concepts, and developmental route of the Indian girl child in a patriarchal context as reflected in the case studies.

Community Outreach

Shine shelter Home for women is a state approved shelter which aids women who have difficulty in finding a stable home due to any circumstances. The work for the MPhil interns includes sustained conversations either individually or in small groups on how to listen to their stories in a different light, how to hold fantasies for the future while keeping difficult life situations in mind. Kilkari is a shelter in Kashmere Gate for young girls between the ages of 5-16, housing about 120 girls. Along with psychologically geared work with individual resident girls, workshops with the staff is also organized where the staff members are helped to think about the risky behaviours and psychosocial concerns specific to life stages of the children. The attempt in the workshop is to revisit memories, observations and experiences of the staff and link them to the psychological difficulties that the children in these homes were bringing forth. Geeta Ghat Shelter for Homeless Men is a home for homeless men living on the streets of Delhi. Much of the work that CPCR has been involved with has been around building connections and being a presence among the people there and allowing processes of trust and friendship unfold slowly. Sometimes, while having individual conversations, a group slowly forms as a circle and there are spontaneous discussions around religion, politics, work, native home etc. Most of the work at the shelter has been individual work with homeless men staying in the facility.

This discussion is being organised in this backdrop, with an aim to focus on meaning of research in the fields of performing arts, creative writing and design, anchored around the following set of questions.

Session 1: Meaning

- 1. What is the meaning of research in these fields/disciplines?
- 2. What key attributes of these fields warrant a separate treatment these researches?
- 3. How do we reconcile with the idea of 'knowledge production as the defining/ constitutive element of research'?
- 4. On unpacking the term 'research' in conjunction with creative practice, exclusively or coupled with functional objectives, is it possible to mover further to explore how do these terms overlap with and constitute each other?

Session 2: Theory

- 5. What are the theoretical perspectives, value orientations and concepts that guide research in these disciplines?
- 6. Should we differentiate research in these disciplines from 'practice based research'; for instance, from action research in development sector?
- 7. Are research practices within this set of disciplines diverse?

Session 3: Research practice

- 8. Are there unique sets of methods put into use in these disciplines? What are they?
- 9. What are the outputs of these researches creative and or functional/utilitarian? How to present these outputs?
- 10. What should be the basis of assessing and evaluating these research practices?

Experimenting with Pedagogy


AUD has been practising multiple modes of engaging with students. Pedagogic experiments have constantly enriched the teaching-learning experience. Going to the field, seeing differently, listening to people, knowing institutions and collective movements, producing or installing aesthetics, or reading/creating poetry have all been encouraged beyond the classroom.


The **MA Psychology** students of SHS program immersed themselves in field work during June-July 2019. The range of sites included NGOs working for refugee care, mental health oriented NGOs, hospitals catering to a People Living with Mental Illness, and working with severe mental illness in semi-urban open village community.


The **School of Letters** organized a fieldtrip to Bhilwara, Rajasthan, on the theme: Investigating the Epic Tradition of Pabuji, from 27-30 September 2019, as part of the MA English programme. There was a day-long workshop on Phad making, and students were introduced to the social contexts and relevance of the epic vis-avis history, sacred spaces, belief systems, rituals, etc. along with an exercise on Phad painting itself. Through this trip, students were encouraged not just to investigate the historical context, social background, revivalist and/or aspirational values of the community of performers and painters associated with this epic, but also to initiate a long-term friendship with the carriers of this fascinating tradition.

MA Urban Studies students participated in a weekend workshop entitled 'Mapping Neighbourhoods- Sohna' with B Architecture students of GD Goenka University on 24-25 Aug, 2019. The students visited Dehradun from 16-20th Oct 2019 where they visited Forest Research Institute, People's Science Institute (PSI), Rural Litigation and Entitlement Kendra, Indian Institute of Remote Sensing. The students collected data to work on the city.

As part of the 'Introduction to Law' course, 2nd year students of **BA Law and Politics** visited Moti Nagar Police Station on 21st September 2019. The visit was preceded by an interactive lecture on basic concepts & rights in criminal law & a briefing of the field visit along with a check list of aspects to be observed.









Gender Studies Program of SHS conducted a photography workshop for students on 25th January 2019 by Amudhini Ramakrishnan, who is a photojournalist and ocumentary photographer/filmmaker dealing with projects which focus on socio-political, economic and cultural issues. The Workshop focused on some fundamental technical details, theories with sample work of some photographers (Gender and Photography, Photography as activism, etc). It also included a session on editing the images to create a photo-essay.











Constitution of India Reading Group

The Constitution of India Reading Group, AUD was started in 2016, through an initiative of MA students with the objective of fostering an understanding of constitution, state and politics in contemporary India; to inform our academic, social and political engagements. In the Monsoon Semester 2019, the reading group covered the themes including, but not limited to Constitutionalism and salient features of the Indian Constitution; citizenship in relation to the National Register of Citizens and the Citizenship (Amendment) Bill, 2016; the mechanism of elections and democracy; in the context of the 2019 Lok Sabha Elections, No-Confidence Motion; and the Judiciary; judicial mechanism, collegium system, roster system, and questions of autonomy. Additionally, the reading group also held a consultation session with the newly elected AUD Students' Council, on the AUD Students' Union Constitution.




Research Scholars' Support Group
