6.4 Extension of Medical Attendance and Treatment (MAT)
Regulations, 2016 to temporary/ contractual (teaching and nonacademic) employees who have completed one year continuous
services in AUD

While approving the MAT Regulations, 2016 for the regular employees of the University, the BoM in its 19<sup>th</sup> Meeting held on 19.04.2016 had also approved the recommendations of the Finance Committee to extend the scheme to the contractual employees once their service conditions are suitably modified on the recommendations of the Establishment Committee.

The BoM noted that at present the short-term contractual employees directly engaged by the University were being governed by the initial terms and conditions of their engagement which are broadly as under:-

- (i) That the tenure of the contractual employee shall be for a period of six months which can be extended further for similar tenures.
- (ii) That the contractual employee shall receive a fixed consolidated remuneration/ salary without any additional allowances.
- (iii) That the contractual employee during the tenure of contract shall be eligible for one day casual leave for each completed month.

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- That the contractual employee is entitled for non-contributory (iv) Group Insurance Scheme as applicable to similarly situated regular employees of the University.
- That in case the University requires the services of the (v) contractual employee on closed days, he/she would be entitled for conveyance charges as per approved norms of the University.
- That the contractual employee shall not be entitled to any claim (vi) for regular appointment in the University.
- That the contractual term can be terminated at any time without (vii) assigning any reason and notice.

After deliberations, the Board resolved to approve the extension of Medical Attendance and Treatment (MAT) Regulations, 2016 to temporary/ contractual (teaching and non-academic) employees who have completed one year continuous services in AUD, as recommended by the Establishment Committee

#### 6.5 Upgradation of two posts of Lab Technician, School of Design

The Board considered and approved the recommendations of the Establishment Committee to prescribe the higher Grade Pay of the existing two posts of Lab Technician meant for Mechanical & Material Workshop and Leather & Soft Materials Workshop, School of Design from PB-1 + GP Rs.1800 to GP Rs.2800 at par with Technical Assistant (IT) in AUD.

The BoM also approved the recommendation of the Establishment Committee to fill these two posts on regular basis instead of contract mode.

#### Conversion of one post of Assistant Registrar into Executive 6.6 Engineer (Civil) to look after the civil maintenance work of the University and approval of draft recruitment rules

The BoM noted that a senior person was needed to coordinate civil maintenance work of main campus and other campuses of the University. Further eventually, the work of campus development would be transferred to the administration once the new campuses are ready. The University has been asked by the Govt. of NCT of Delhi to establish more small campuses across the city. The University has at present two posts of engineering staff at the level of junior engineer (one each for civil and electrical) which have been advertised to be filled on a regular basis after approval of the BoM. Hence, it has been felt that one senior level person at the level of Executive Engineer became necessary to

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oversee and coordinate the functioning of day-to-day maintenance work in the University.

The broad responsibilities of the Executive Engineer (Civil) as identified and recommended by the Establishment Committee (EC) and the minimum qualification and other eligibility conditions required for the post as recommended by the EC and approved by the BoM are at **Appendix-10**.

### 7. Matters from the Campus Development Division

# 7.1 Progress in the implementation of revised methodology for Project Management Consultant (PMC)- Appointment of PMC & Architect for new AUD campuses at Dheerpur, Phase-I and Rohini

The Board took note of the progress as regards to the appointment of PMC and Architects for the new campuses at Dheerpur – Phase 1 and Rohini, vide **Appendix-11**. In pursuance of the earlier resolution of the Board dated 19.04.16 (Resolution No. 11.1), it was further **resolved** as under:

- (i) In-principle approval to the tentative cost of Rs.1350 crore (Rs.750 crore for Dheerpur, Phase-I and Rs.600 crore for Rohini) as certified by Public Works Department (PWD), Govt of NCT of Delhi for preparing the Request for Proposal (RFP)/ Notice Inviting Tender (NIT) for selection of the Architect(s).
- (ii) AUD will approve the RFP/Tender Document for selection of Architect.
- (iii) AUD will constitute the Jury and approve its evaluation of the design concepts. The Jury would also have a representative of the PWD.
- (iv) AUD will approve the selection of the Architect(s).

The Board took note that an MoU was being drafted to be signed by the University and the PWD. It was also noted that the MoU, the RFP document / tender document, inviting bids from architects would be presented to the Board for its consideration, if required in a special meeting.

#### 10. ADDITIONAL AGENDA ITEMS

10.1 Proposal submitted by the University to the Government of NCT of Delhi (Directorate of Higher Education) for the use of vacant school building at Lodhi Road (near Khanna Market) under its expansion programme

The Board took note of the proposal submitted by the University to the GNCTD for the use of vacant school building near Lodhi Road for the purpose of housing the School of Education Studies (SES) of the University and to run new programmes, viz., a four-year integrated BABEd, a three-year integrated BEd-MEd, a PhD programme and Inservice and Credit-based (including part-time and modular) courses for teachers of the Dethi School systems and other professionals in education, in addition to the existing MA and PG Diploma programmes of SES. The concept note prepared in this connection by SES is at Appendix-18.

The Board authorized the Vice Chancellor to take all further steps in this regard.

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### 10.2 Revision of the consolidated monthly pay structure of the Research Assistants in AUD

The Board considered the proposal for revision of pay structure of Research Assistants in AUD

During the deliberations, the Board took note that the remuneration for Research Assistants at AUD had originally been tagged with the amount equivalent to the UGC Junior and Senior Research Fellowships (JRF and SRF). The Board further took note that the UGC had since effected enhancements in the compensations for JRF and SRF.

In the light of this, it was resolved that the pay structure for Research Assistants at AUD be tagged with the compensation for JRF and SRF and the revisions thereof that UGC would effect from time to time be adopted. The Board resolved that appointment of Research Assistants should be as per the standard operating procedures for project appointments as approved by it on 19.04.16 (Resolution No. 3.3). It was further resolved that appointments to such positions be done through based on advertisements on the web as well as in journals like the EPW to enable wider publicity.

As per the composition of the selection committee approved by the Board, it includes one expert from a school or centre outside of the one where the project is located. The Board resolved that such an expert should be from among a panel approved by the Vice Chancellor on the recommendation of the ACRPM.

### 10.3 Opening of facilities and services of ACIIE to external candidates outside AUD

The BoM took note of the contents of the Note dated 31.10.2016, received from the Executive Chairperson, AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship (ACIIE) regarding opening the facilities of ACIIE to the graduating batch of School for Social Entrepreneurs (a not-for-profit organization funded by Price waterhouse Cooper (PwC) Charitable Foundation and the British Council). According to the proposal, three out of the five seats envisaged by ACIIE at this stage will be open to applicants outside AUD.

### 11.1 Tenure of appointments of visiting Faculty

The Board took note that a few very senior professionals and scholars were on short-term engagements as visiting or temporary faculty in the various Schools and/or Centres of AUD, and that they were being appointed for periods of six months as the Vice Chancellor had been authorized by the Board to make only six months' appointments. It was noted that this situation caused inconvenience to such senior appointees.

After due deliberations, the Board resolved that in the case of visiting or temporary appointments, particularly to senior faculty positions, in the interest of facilitating the participation of competent and/or senior scholars and professionals in the University's academic programmes, the Vice Chancellor be authorized to make longer term appointments, i.e., ordinarily of one year and for a maximum of three years, on the recommendation of a committee of senior faculty and experts constituted by him, subject to ratification by the Board of Management.

#### 11.2 Fifth Annual Convocation of the University

The Vice Chancellor informed the Board of Management that the University is holding its Fifth Annual Convocation on Friday, the 9th of December 2016 and His Holiness the Dalai Lama has kindly consented to be the Chief Guest at the Convocation and also agreed to deliver the Convocation address. The Vice Chancellor also informed the members that the Honble Lt Governor of Delhl in his capacity as the Chancellor of the University has consented to preside over the Convocation. Members appreciated the efforts of the University In Inviting His Holiness the Dalai Lama.

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### 11.3 Constitution of the Planning Board

The Vice Chancellor briefed the members that the University was required to constitute a Planning Board (as provided under Section 25 of the University Act). The Planning Board of the University was envisaged as one of the Authority bodies of the University and it would be the principal authority body of the University as regards planning. It shall also be responsible for monitoring and evaluating the development of the University in the perspective of its vision and mission. The constitution of the Planning Board, the terms of office of its Members and its powers and functions, etc., shall be such as prescribed by a statute. The Board of Management has hitherto been discharging these functions. Now the Vice Chancellor is in the process of constituting a Committee to frame a suitable draft Statute for creating the Planning Board.


#### **NOTES TO ACCOUNT**

- 1. The financial year for the purpose of salary is determined for a period of twelve months from March 2015 to February 2016. Hence no provision is made towards salary for the month of March 2016.
- 2. Fixed Asset Registers have been prepared for the first time since the inception of the University duly supported by the vouchers. Proper classification / grouping of assets have been given effect to duly making corrections wherever necessary.
- 2.1 Depreciation has been calculated for the first time on straight line method at prescribed rates as per format of financial statement for Central Higher Education Institutitions.
- 2.2 The total amount of depreciation calculated / worked out from 2008-09 to 2014-15 is Rs. 6,76,30,686 and that of for the current year i.e. 2015-16 is worth Rs.1,92,82,065/-
- 2.3 Since University Grant Commission has provided the funds to AUD for the first time during in 2013-14 first time, the depreciation on the Assets procured out of UGC funds to the tune of Rs. 45,71,811/- has been provided for the year 2013-14 and 2014-15 on straight line method. The depreciation for the current year worth amounting to Rs. 41,51,139 has been charged to GIA-General fund which is included in the value of Rs. 1,92,82,065/- (2,2 above).
- 2.4 The Assets acquired out of project fund have not been accounted for under Fixed Assets of AUD. These Assets will be considered after the completion of the projects and on physically handing over to AUD.
- 3. The liabilities towards death/ retirement Gratuity and Pension have been provided first time based on the calculation of actuarian i.e. LIC of India as works out to Rs.149,91,823.
- Similarly total liabilities worth Rs.140,00,262/- have been created for accumulated leave encashment as valued by Life Insurance Corporation of India.
- On receipt of the approval of National Pension Scheme from DHE on 21.09.2015, Employees contribution along with matching contribution of University was remitted to NSDL against their respective PRAN numbers. The interest at the rate of 8 percent on the amount of NPS subscription lying with AUD from the deduction to the date of deposit with NSDL has been worked out to Rs.89,98,103/-. There are sufficient funds to accommodate this liability.

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- 6. As per the decision of Board of Management taken in its meeting held on 08-10-2015 & 02-11-2015 University has created "University Development Funds" (UDF) out of surplus income from fee and other income. Accordingly, an amount totalling to 18,75,47,675/- has been kept under Earmarked / Endowment Fund towards UDF..
- 7. Separate funds have been created for the first time out of fee account after segregating from 2008-09 as under.

- 8. Electricity and water charges of Rs. 89,68,653/-has been paid to Indira Gandhi Institute of Technology Kashmere Gate Campus for the year 2015-16 which is calculated based on the ratio of 60:40 as both the connections i.e. electricity & water, are in the name of IGIT and AUD is sharing with the same based on area occupied as calculated by public works department.
- 9. Discrepancy was noticed in Utilization Certificate submitted earlier to DHE. A scrutiny was conducted from 2008-09 and a liability to the tune of Rs. 1,24,34,717/- has been provided and revised utilization certificate got prepared form the CA for the years 2008-09 to 2014-2015.
- 10. Stale cheques have also has been taken/accounted for under the liabilities of the balance sheet.
- During the year AUD has received grants / financial support for CECED and other projects from Government and other organisations. The bank interest earned on the unspent balance of grant / support is taken as a part of respective project fund.
- 12. Rs.28,58,45,886/- paid to DDA towards cost of 3.76 Hect. additional /balance land cost at Dheerpur Phase-1 has been capitalized in Accounts of 2015-16. However, the total area of plot at Dheerpur Phase-1 is 20 Hect.(approximate) The payment of Rs.111, 63,57,590/- towards cost of 17.1956 Hect was made by DHE directly and hence no book entry has been made.
- 13. Previous year's figures have been rearranged and regrouped wherever necessary, as per Accounting Standards/Policy.



#### SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE FY 2015-16

- 1. The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and generally on the accrual method of accounting unless otherwise stated.
- 2. Fee from the students and interest on saving banks accounts are accounted on cash basis.
- Interest on FDR is accounted on accrual basis.
- 4. Fixed assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on Straight line method, at the following rates, as prescribed by Ministry of HRD letter No.29-4/2012-IFD dated 17<sup>th</sup> April 2015:

- 4.1 Depreciation is provided for the entire period of one year on the additions made during the year.
- 4.2 Assets acquired from Project is not taken into fixed asset of AUD, the same will be taken into AUD stock after the completion of the project and on physically handing over to AUD. This will be however subject to the Project Terms and Conditions. At present, no such Assets are taken into the Asset Register which were purchased out of Project Funds.
- Unutilized grants (including advances paid out of such grants) are carried forward and exhibited as a liability in the Balance Sheet accordingly provisions are made to the tune of Rs.13,90,27,010/-.
- 6. Government Grants and UGC grants are accounted on realization basis. However, where a sanction for release of grant pertaining to the financial year is received before 31<sup>st</sup> March and the grant is actually received in the next financial year, the amount is considered as grant received.

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

#### THE UNIVERSITY

Ambedkar University, Delhi (AUD) was established in 2007 by the Government of the National Capital Territory of Delhi (GNCTD) through an Act of Legislature and was notified in July 2008. Mandated to focus on research and teaching in the social sciences and humanities, and guided by Dr Ambedkar's vision of combining equality and justice with excellence, AUD considers it to be its mission to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in higher education. Ambedkar University is presently functioning from its campus on Lothian Road in Kashmere Gate. It shares this campus with the Indira Gandhi Delhi Technical University for Women.

Two plots of land have been allotted by the Department of Higher Education, Government of NCT of Delhi, for setting up additional campuses of AUD—one in Rohmi, Sector 3, of area 7.02 hectares and the other in Dheerpur, Phase 1, of area 20 hectares. Preparations are underway to start construction on both sites. The University also plans to start admissions to a few undergraduate programmes from the next academic year in the Karampura Campus—6.5 acres of land and buildings that has been transferred to AUD by the government of Delhi through its Directorate of Higher Education—in which the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya College had been functioning hitherto.

The University has a decentralised structure with Schools and Centres as the foci for all academic activity. The envisioning of its Schools, Centres and programmes has opened up new possibilities, the typologies for which are essentially along interdisciplinary lines. The conceptualisation of Schools is that of relatively well-structured interdisciplinary spaces within which programmes are located. Centres of studies and research on the other hand, are conceived as platforms for project research, policy advocacy, training, networking and clearing-house functions and address the more fluid areas of contemporary significance.

#### Vision

The University is committed to the promotion of studies, research and extension work in higher education with a focus on liberal arts, humanities and the social sciences. It strives to analyse the forces contributing to social stability as well as social disequilibrium and to visualise how societal evolution can lead to a condition in which all sections of the people can achieve their full human potential.

#### Philosophy

A commitment to equity, social justice and excellence forms the bedrock of the philosophy and values of Ambedkar University Delhi. As a public institution, AUD sees itself as an instrument of social transformation, focusing on social action at the interface of civil society and the State.

#### Goals

The University strives for excellence in higher education in the social sciences and humanities. AUD's main goal is to create sustainable and effective linkages between access to and success in

higher education. AUD is committed to creating an institutional culture characterised by humanism, non-hierarchical and collegial functioning, teamwork and nurturance of creativity.

### Objectives


The University has been entrusted with the task of evolving and imparting comprehensive higher education of excellence with focus on the liberal arts, humanities and the social sciences. It is mandated to engage in both distance and continuing education. Like any other university pursuing excellence, it is expected to organise advanced studies and promote research, to disseminate knowledge and processes by organising fectures, seminars, symposia, workshops and conferences, and to liaise with institutions of higher learning and research in India and overseas. It is expected to publish research monographs, treatises, books, reports and journals. While furthering these objectives, it is also expected to promote cultural and ethical values.

#### Academic Structure

AUD has a faculty structure that allows for full-time, regular, core faculty, and for part-time, adjunct, visiting and emeritus faculty. The extended faculty also includes senior postgraduate and research students working as Teaching Assistants. The University's academic personnel policy has been designed to reflect the concerns embodied in the vision statement more effectively than the structures and processes of many Indian universities. It shall be the endeavour of the University to ensure that its functions are conducted in a transparent, orderly, fair and just manner, in order to promote a sense of shared governance among all its personnel and develop a new work culture that strengthens and sustains the University's core values and philosophy. While adhering to all constitutionally mandated provisions for reservations, it will also endeavour to ensure equal opportunities for all, and in particular, to implement a pro-active gender-sensitive policy in recruitment.

# Organogram of University Authorities





### SCHOOLS

#### SCHOOL OF BUSINESS, PUBLIC POLICY AND SOCIAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship (SBPPSE) was set up in 2011 to promote research and to provide professional education and training in the field of management, public policy and social entrepreneurship. SBPPSE's attempt has been to develop a holistic approach to business and profit within the larger context of society and the economy. In July 2012, the School started a two-year (full-time) Masters in Business Administration (MBA) and in 2013 it launched a one-year Postgraduate Diploma in Publishing (PGDP); in 2014 the School initiated a two-year (full-time) MA programme in Social Entrepreneurship (MASE). Along with the School of Design, SBPPSE took initiative to set up the AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship (ACHE), which has been registered in January 2016 as a not-for-profit company under the Companies Act 2013.

### MBA

The two-year (full-time) MBA programme is intended to impart professional education for future managers, to upgrade and renew the knowledge and skills of the personnel already engaged in the world of work and to develop motivation, knowledge and skills to launch new enterprises. The programme has its focus on wealth creation as much as on wealth management.

The curriculum of the two-year (full-time) MBA programme is based on an innovative course structure incorporating the latest developments in management education. While imparting all the principles and concepts of modern management, the uniqueness of our MBA programme is its approach to business and profit within the holistic context of the wider society and economy. In addition to creating an environment of learning theoretical concepts and application skills, the programme focuses on the importance of soft skills (people skills).

During the summer-break, students undergo an internship for a period of 8-10 weeks. All students are expected to submit a project report based on empirical studies they undertake on a topic under the guidance of faculty members. All students of the MBA programme learn an additional (foreign) language during the course of their study. A major revision of the MBA programme has been undertaken during 2015-16 after completing three years of its launch.

### MA Social Entrepreneurship

The first year curriculum of the MA Social Entrepreneurship programme (MASE) is common with the first year of the MBA programme, while the second year of the MASE programme exclusively focuses on concepts, issues and practices of social entrepreneurship and will be linked to the activities of the AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship.

The students of the programme are provided with the core business management skills which are essential for managing all organisations. MASE will enable participants to discover specialised skills required for initiating start-up ventures, especially in the social sector by finding creative and innovative solutions. The programme is structured to build and enhance core business skills,

raise awareness about socio-political and environmental issues, and promote creative thinking, social innovation, and entrepreneurial approaches to problem solving. Theoretical components are well complemented by practicum, and students are encouraged to apply classroom learning to various real-life situations through field-based projects. Three courses in the first year will be offered as workshop/seminar courses to familiarize the students with social issues surrounding them.

Based on the past two years of experience, the School is undertaking a major revamp of the MASE and has received a grant from the British Council under social enterprise education programme for a collaborative project with the University of Northampton, UK towards developing a revised social entrepreneurship programme.

### PG Diploma in Publishing

In collaboration with the National Book Trust of India (NBT), SBPPSE launched a one-year PG Diploma in Publishing in July 2013. Given the rapidly evolving changes in the publishing industry, it is important to attract newcomers to the field of publishing in the 21st century as it is to "re-train" existing publishing professionals. It may also be noted that the rapidly changing industry has propelled into prominence the importance of the "business" element in publishing. To this end, AUD program aims to create a breed of professionals who are skilled as well as entrepreneurial. It is hoped that the program will generate added value in terms of career potentials and new business opportunities in publishing.

#### Collaboration

The School is in discussion with other universities for international collaborations. A Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between AUD and the San Francisco State University and an another MoU with Northampton University, UK, to enable exchange of faculty and students.





The School of Design (SDes) at AUD is unique in its conception—this is the first time in India that design education will be institutionally embedded in and collaborating with the humanities and social sciences. The School draws from its distinct position within a Humanities and Social Sciences University to amalgamate core attributes of design with socially complex issues, needs and sectors. By relocating the object-centred design focus to that of the "social", the School proposes to create better informed, sensitised, empowered and robust communities through new products, services, systems, interfaces and scenarios. This setting offers an opportunity to revisualise design education and practice in order to creatively meet the multiple challenges offered by a rapidly changing, deeply interconnected local and global landscape. Simultaneously, the School seeks to further, through design, AUD's mandate of creating an equitable, just and sustainable society through social action.

The School see this as an opportunity to question existing specializations within design education and practice, examine current curricular structures and pedagogies around the world and contemplate larger role and potential of design in Indian context. With a particular focus on the National Capital Region of Delhi, the Schools aims to prepare design students to engage in challenges of visualising new services, systems, interfaces, products and enterprises.

The School of Design is visualised as both, a practice and research based school for pursuit of design education from UG level to MPhil/PhD. Apart from the existing Social Design programme, the School will begin offering masters programmes in Service Design, Design Criticism, Design Theory, Design History and related areas, followed by undergraduate programmes and eventually MPhil/PhD programmes.

### MA Social Design

The MA programme in Social Design is a two-end-e-half-year full time program, an intensive, practice and application-oriented programme with a predominant social focus. It amalgamates unique methods, tools and approaches of design disciplines with that of social sciences to creatively address complex issues of inclusion, access, equity and opportunities through participatory and co-creation methods. The emphasis of the programme is on preparing students with entrepreneurial competencies and leadership essential to resolving socially complex issues (equity, access, participation, inclusion and opportunity) that may be embedded within communities, agencies, organisations and states.

The School of Development Studies at Ambedkar University, Delhi, has a mission to strengthen social science teaching and research through inter-disciplinary approaches, based on the foundations provided by the disciplines of Sociology, Anthropology, Political Science and Economics. SDS has a special link to the overall vision of the University, that is to promote broad-based, multidisciplinary higher education that links strongly to social needs. # SCHOOL OF EDUCATION STUDIES

SES has been established to understand, analyse and engage with the different challenges that education as a discipline and practice presents. SES is envisioned to evolve as a community of professionals and scholars endeavouring to understand education in its historical and contemporary contexts through engaged scholarship and practice. The School aims to bridge the gap between the theory and practice of education in its multiple locations—in that it attempts to foster greater convergence between the study of education as a social phenomenon and the preparation of professional educators. It works towards development of a rigorous praxis-based theoretical perspective for analysis and research while engaging with teacher education, pedagogy, curriculum, policy, planning and administration. The objectives of SES are to:

- locate education both as a phenomenon and as an area of knowledge within the wider contexts—structures and processes of society, culture and political economy.
- engage with the field of education through multiple theoretical perspectives, and explore ways
  of structuring the area of knowledge called Education.
- develop sustained relationships with systems of education, in particular with the public systems, and with practicing educators, to make critical and constructive interventions.

In pursuit of its vision, SES instituted its first academic programme, MA Fducation, in 2012. In collaboration with the Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development (CECED), the School launched MA Education (Early Childhood Care and Education) in 2014. In the near future, it proposes to launch MPhil/PhD, pre-service teacher education, and certificate/diploma programmes in education.

### MA Education

The MA Education programme focuses on both the liberal and professional dimensions of a Master's degree in Education. Besides an introduction to the foundational domains and different theoretical perspectives and debates, the programme structure allows students to take optional courses to specialise in the areas and trajectories of their choice within and outside SES. A unique feature is the interface that the programme builds with different sites of education that are both school and non-school. This structured exposure to the field has been acknowledged and appreciated at various teacher education policy forums. SES admitted the fourth cohort of students in its MA Education programme in August 2015, and its third cohort is graduating in the year 2016.

### MA Education (ECCE)

The two year MA Education (ECCE) programme is unique and is offered in very few institutions across India. With the implementation of National Early Childhood Care and Education Policy in 2013, there is greater realization to have trained professionals in this field who can implement good ECCE practices across the country. This programme provides an in-depth understanding of early childhood care and education using multiple disciplines—child development, sociology, history, psychoanalytic frame, anthropology, critical pedagogy, and management. The students can choose various professional trajectories like teacher education, research, curriculum

development and social entrepreneurship in the programme. The programme aims to cater to the growing demand for curriculum developers, social entrepreneurs, teacher educators in the field of ECCE, and scholars and researchers who can contribute to the indigenous body of knowledge in ECCE. The first cohort of MA Education (Early Childhood Care and Education) was admitted in 2014.

They became familiar with the early literacy program run by OELP for classes I and II in the Government schools (20–22, December 2015).

As a part of summer internship, the students of MA Education and MA Education ECCE were placed in Pratham Delhi for a three week summer internship. During this period, students conducted a household survey and an achievement test for children between the ages of 6 and 14 years of age. The ECCE students also conducted focus group discussions with children. All students were required to submit a report and share their experiences and dilemmas in a class presentation.

Students of the MA Education programme were attached to field sites outside Delhi and spent a week conducting observations in the schools run by three non-governmental organizations, Digantar, Jaipur, Adharshila. Morena; and a school in Sirohi being run by the Azim Premji Foundation, Rajasthan. Unlike previous years, where students were placed in schools of Delhi,

this experience encouraged them to observe and understand the nature of practices in NGO run schools. This shift was made with the idea that such an exposure would give students a better sense of the efforts required to run, as well as challenges and conditions of schools outside Delhi. Students focused on four themes of school ecology, classroom interaction and pedagogy, implementation of RtE related policies and teacher's work during this School FA (12–16 October 2015).

During semester II, students were placed in two early childhood education centres, Jamia Nursery School and III Nursery School for eight days (February–April 2015).

During semester III, students were placed in four schools, Heritage School, Gurgaon, Shikshantar School, Gurgaon, Santa Maria, Vasant Kunj and IIT Nursery School, Hauz Khas, for a week in October 2015.

During semester I students made exposure visits to four different early childhood centres, IIT Nursery School, Hauz Khas. Pratham Balwadis, Trilok puri, Shikshantar School, Gurgaon and RAK Child Study Centre, Lady Irwin College, Mandi House (September–November 2015).

### SCHOOL OF HUMAN ECOLOGY

The School of Human Ecology (SHE) is one of the oldest Schools of AUD, with a mandate of working on issues at the interface of ecology and society. The School aims to develop a deep and multifaceted understanding of environmental concerns that includes perspectives from the social and the natural sciences SHE promotes high quality teaching and research, which connects theory with praxis and links issues of sustainability with a deep concern for social justice. The School promotes interdisciplinary teaching, learning and research about issues at the intersection of human society and the biophysical environment, with perspectives grounded in the experiences of the Global South.

### MA Environment and Development

The flagship programmes of SHE are the MA in Environment and Development (MAED) and the PhD programme in Human Ecology. These programmes are unique in India in their orientation and scope, and are guided by the idea that ecological challenges such as atmospheric pollution, resource depletion, and the attendant threats to ecosystems and biodiversity result from a complex interaction of socio-political and biophysical factors.

The School expects its students to graduate with the knowledge and skills necessary to analyse and address environmental concerns keeping in mind social equity, academic rigour and ecological sustainability. The unique features of SHE's pedagogy include a strong emphasis on field-based learning, individual mentoring of students and regular assessment of curriculum based on consultation with experts and student feedback.



## Placement Support

The School does not have a formal placement cell, but graduates of MAED have been highly successful in securing employment in academic research projects, government agencies, teaching, non-governmental organisations, consultancy firms, civil society initiatives and the media. The placement rate of MAED graduates has been close to 100 per cent. Field-based learning experiences and independent researches during internship and dissertation have contributed strongly to the success of MAED graduates in the workplace.

### SCHOOL OF HUMAN STUDIES

The School of Human Studies (SHS) has brought together, perhaps for the first time in the history of Indian academia, an interdisciplinary group of psychologists, social anthropologists, sociologists, political scientists, feminist scholars, philosophers and to address, through teaching, issues related to the individual-'of and 'about' lives, to her environment-family, community, changing lifestyles, relationships, sexuality, the changing character of workplaces, the stages of life (particularly old age), etc. SHS seeks to foster deliberate and critical engagement with particular realities that belong to our times even as it preserves and privileges human experience, thinking and dreaming. The School, has been envisioned on a set of conceptual axes and associated practices which inform the thrust of its programmes as well as the processes of teaching, mentorship, assessment, research and engagement with the fields of practice in society. Currently, the school offers MA Psychology (Psychosocial Clinical Studies), MPhil Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking, MA Gender Studies, MPhil/PhD Women's and Gender -Studies, PhD Psychology and MPhil Development Practice to engage with some crucial issues about human lives and life stories with a playfulness not ordinarily associated with higher education. In addition, SHS hosts the Centre for Development Practice, Centre of Psychotherapy and Clinical Research and Ehsaar, a psychotherapy and counselling clinic. ...

### MPhlt/PhD in Women's and Gender Studies

The MPhil/PhD in Women's and Gender Studies were launched on 27 August 2012. These programmes are a unique effort borne out of collaboration between AUD and the Centre for Women's Development Studies (CWDS). This collaboration is premised on the coming together of a research space, CWDS, and a primarily teaching space, AUD, experimenting with new kinds of courses and pedagogies. The programme draws on the pioneering and rich work produced by Women's Studies programmes across the country. The uniqueness of this MPhil/PhD programme is also marked by it being housed within the School of Human Studies with its own focus on the complexity of the (gendered) subject in its intra-psychic and inter-subjective dimension. The programme assimilates analytical understandings of the significance of gender (relations) as an object of inquiry, and the necessity of studying conduits and configurations of power, in addition to the causes, contexts and consequences of women's subordination. Because the research programme is linked to the already existing MA Gender Studies at AUD, the MPhil and PhD programmes would have a jump start in having an internal source of applicants for the research degree as well as an institutional infrastructure vis-à-vis existing faculty and administrative support. Furthermore, the MA programmes also serve as a bridge for those incoming research students who feel that they require some refresher courses in the field. As AUD expands its Women's and Gender Studies perspective into undergraduate and postgraduate curricula, it will be uniquely positioned to develop the field and to train practitioners at the broadest levels—from the undergraduate to the postgraduate.

### MPhil Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking

This is a three-year programme that trains psychodynamic, psychotherapists and clinical researchers. Its major thrust is to create a mental health professional who is sensitive, competent

and open-minded, and who understands culture, history and politics, even as they emerge in the consultation room. Through relating symptoms to the life history of an individual or family, the emphasis is to understand the vicissitudes of human conflicts and struggles from an empathic position. With rigorous training in theory, supervised clinical work, personal therapy of the aspiring clinician and clinical research work, it hopes to strengthen the capacity to think clinically, which involves identification, articulation and shared expression of mental states. An engagement and reflection on this rhythmic process enables a movement towards healing, and subsequently research. The MPhil programme is vertically integrated with a PhD programme in Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking, for which there are a limited number of seats.

# MPhil Development Practice

MPhil Development Practice (co-hosted by AUD and PRADAN, a reputed development sector agent) through an examination of the unexamined 'underdevelopment of the rural' and the equally unexamined 'royal roads to development', and the setting up of a relationship with the rural through ten-month long immersion-based-learning in rural contexts, wishes to create a cohort of development sector professionals who would have the capacity to initiate transformative social action in rural India.

### PhD Psychology

The programme hopes to strengthen a self-critical version of psychological enquiry. Guided by an interdisciplinary thrust and a self-reflexive perspective, this psychosocial framework of research, seeks to constantly question both knowledge and power and thereby aspires to reclaim a psychological human science that is culturally sensitive, decolonised and socio-politically aware. It attempts to foreground an inter-subjective research sensibility within which conscious and unconscious currents, feelings and the phenomenological flow of life are given salience. Serving life and its struggles and focusing on qualitative work wherein sustained engagement is valued and the transformative potentials in the self of the researcher and the researched are opened up, the course lays the foundations for a future researcher to undertake psychodynamically inclined, critical, participatory and dialogically oriented work.

#### SCHOOL OF UNDERGRADUATE STUDIES

The School of Undergraduate Studies (SUS) is home to seven honours programmes— Economics, English, History, Mathematics, Psychology, Sociology, and Social Sciences and Humanities (SSH). The three-year Honours programmes seek to equip students with foundational skills, disciplinary and interdisciplinary knowledge via a large variety and types of courses to choose from. These Undergraduate programmes offer students a unique liberal arts education that acquaints young people with diverse approaches to knowledge.

SUS programme structure was deliberated upon in the previous academic session. A modified programme structure passed by the Academic Council was introduced from the academic year 2015–16. While the overall requirement of 96 credits and the division of courses into Foundation, Core and Elective remains, the nature of Foundation courses has been revised. Students at SUS began the study of Hindi and Environment; Issues and Challenges as part of the compulsory foundation courses. English remained a part of every student's compulsory requirements as before. Students also began their first discipline course from semester I onwards. New foundation courses like Introduction to Gender, Introduction to Drawing were also introduced in the Monsoon Semester 2015 as elective courses.

The Programme Coordinators and Joint Coordinators under the chairpersonship of Dean SUS took all the decisions through the Academic Coordination Committee (ACC) of the SUS. The three Deputy Deans of SUS namely, Satyaketu Sankrit, Dharitri Narzmy Chakravartty, and Urfat Anjem Mir, contributed generously to the streamlining of the administrative and academic activities.

232 students were admitted to SUS in the current academic year. The current strength of SUS is 598 students.

In Monsoon and Winter Semesters SUS offered 67 and 69 courses respectively for undergraduate students to choose from. With such a large number of courses on offer and faculty members drawn from all across AUD teaching these courses, coordination becomes a huge challenge. The ACC and the Programme Committees have through regular meetings tried to meet these challenges. In order to make decision-making participative and informed, the channels of communication between Programme Committees and ACC are kept open. The Minutes of the ACC meetings are shared with the AUD faculty at large.

The SUS Evaluation and Attendance Committee (EAC) chaired by Rukmini Sen certified the moderated results of the Academic Year 2015–16. Further the EAC also created the academic calendar for SUS, announced the list of candidates eligible for partial repetition in each semester, prepared the examination timetables for mid and end-semester exams and discussed and decided several issues related to fivaluation and attendance.

A small committee convened by Dr Dharitri Narzary oversaw the elections of the student members to the seven programme level Student Faculty Committees (SFCs) of the SUS. Regular meeting of the SFCs, School level SFCs, mentoring of students are all important parts in ensuring that quality academic programmes are available in SUS for both students and teachers to participate in.

SUS does not have independent permanent faculty. All faculty at AUD are expected to contribute to SUS. Nupur Samuel and Monishita Hajra Pande were appointed as Assistant Professors in English Language Feaching at SUS in the Winter Semester 2016.

#### CENTRES

#### CENTRE FOR COMMUNITY KNOWLEDGE

The Centre for Community Knowledge (CCK) at AUD is developing many interdisciplinary work areas such as, field work in community-based oral histories and practice-based knowledge, collaborations with museums to open up their collections, digital archiving.

## 1. Delbl Citizens Memory Programme

As part of this long term project to collect and disseminate lived-experiences and oral narratives from Delhi the following activities were carried out.

Dara Shikoh Festival — The Dara Shikoh Festival of lesser known narratives from Delhi was held from March to April 2015 at the AUD campus in Kashmere Gate. It involved a sound and light show at the Dara Shikoh Building, a specially researched and created dastaan on Dara Shikoh and his times, a theatre performance on the life of Dara Shikoh and a listening session on the musical arts of Delhi from the 17th and 18th centuries.

Delhi Oralities Project — The Delhi Oralities Project, funded by ICSSR, began in September 2014 and has so far collected 85 in depth life-histories of the city. The objective is to collect 100 detailed oral narratives in the form of lived-histories by August 2016. These will be published as Memories of Delhi, and discussions are underway with publishers.

Hum Sah Nizamuddin — A month long neighbourhood museum programme was held at Nizamuddin (East & West) of south-central Delhi (April-May 2015). This is part of the ongoing neighbourhood museum series to create dialogues with local memory as part of community engagement programme of the University and the city.

Shadipur Shani Bazaar — An exhibition on the market of Shadipur was held from August to October 2015. This exploration looked at vendors, merchandise and customers of the weekly informal market in west Delhi, providing low-cost products to the neighbourhood for almost two generations. The exhibition looked at the, history, organization, narratives of vendors and other interesting facets that made the bazaar. This was the culmination of a field research project carried out by a team of MA Sociology students mentored by CCK (August-October 2015).

## 2. North East Region/Forum

The first North East Forum research project (2011–14) on Material Culture, Creation and Use: Perspectives from Inside the Community, has led to a peer-reviewed research publication—Objects, Identities, Meanings (December 2015). A follow up research project on transformations in material culture as a result of wider socio-cultural changes, as the topic of the next research volume, is being discussed at the Forum.

An international conference on "Oral Traditions: Continuity and Transformations—North East India and South East Asia" was held at Shillong. Meghalaya, India from 1–4 February, 2016. This interdisciplinary conference was co-organised by INTACH, and brought together 40 scholars, heritage professionals, small museums and organizations involved in the material and visual representation of this region, to highlight the cultural and historical linkages between communities of the region of North East India between each other, and with wider East and South East Asian communities.

## 3. Repository and Digital Archiving Programmes

This Ambedkar University Digital Archive (AUDA) records and stores, in digital format, all the happenings at the University. The present collection includes:

AUDIInstitutional Memory Project (IMP) This project continued to document University events, record interviews of current and ex-AUD students, staff and faculty. To make the collection visible to the student community, and use it to initiate and continue dialogues on everyday life in the university community, a university wide interactive event called PLAYBACK was held in September 2015. University events are already shared and visible online in a Youtube channel. Texts and interviews will follow in the AUD Digital Archive being built. Currently offline, the archive is already showing its usefulness for all University constituents.

Lotika Varadarajan Ethnological Archive This archive on traditional technologies and practices of weaving and seafaring covers the period from 1960 to 2010 is expected to be completed by May 2016. This is now available online at www.maritimearchives-eck.com. This collection of research material, donated by Dr Lotika Varadarajan, is annotated and archived through a grant from the Ministry of Culture 2013–14, and a follow up grant from the Vasant J. Sheth Foundation, Mumbai (2015–16).

Social Science Research Archive This archive is a CCK-SLS digital archive of works of rare documents and images, of literary figures and amateur collectors of the twentieth century. The first two of this are the journals and diaries, photographs and unpublished notes of the progressive writer, Amrit Lal Nagar, and a collection of Persian, Sanskrit and Urdu documents and artefacts from North India, Central Asia and Persia in the collection held by Naseem Mirza Changezi, Pahari Imli, Delhi. An e-eatalogue of the collection is expected to be ready by June 2016.

Delhi Photo Archive of Everyday Life — This archive comprises of photographs and public images obtained from residents of Delhi that describe everyday life in the city from approximately 1930 to 1980. Collected from various amateur (Lala Narain Prasad, Fozan Ali Ahmed.) and professional (Jan Friese, Photojournalist) individuals and neighbourhood photo studios (Nizamuddin and Shadipur): Currently the archives comprise about 1200 digitised photographic images of the city of Delhi, and more are being collected.

## CENTRE FOR DEVELOPMENT PRACTICE

The Centre for Development Practice (CDP), established by the Board of Management in July 2013, has a two-pronged focus: one, the creation of a cadre of professional leadership to engender transformative social action in rural development; second, the establishment of the CDP as a vibrant space/platform for dialogue between development practitioners and academics, engaging in collaborative research, documentation and anthologies of practice. CDP has initiated research collectives around:

- Caste and Class: Need for a theoretical and empirical re-examination.
- Gender, health and development.
- Discourses of empowerment: Processes of change, resistance in rural India.
- · Mapping the development sector.

## AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship (ACHE)

The Centre for Incubation, Innovation and Entrepreneurship is visualised to complement the academic programmes of several schools of AUD. The incubation centre aims to achieve the two-fold objective: (i) to translate theoretical and conceptual learning into socially useful practice; and (ii) to reach out to the less-privileged sections of society who may not otherwise have access to new knowledge and contemporary practices.

The centre will invite innovative ideas from the students of AUD as well as from those outside, nurture them through a process of mentoring and organising/facilitating financial assistance from angel investors/venture capitalists to convert those ideas into real business ventures. It will provide opportunity to those with ideas to become a social entrepreneur. It will facilitate learning the skills required to design and set up a low-cost business model and an opportunity to develop and test new ideas. It allows to share other success stories that have emerged from working with experienced mentors from various sectors/fields. The centre will provide incubation support to start-up ventures of fresh graduates, such as infrastructure support, mentoring, and networking which are crucial to such a start-up. The centre will be the home for the students of the MA Social Entrepreneurship programme especially, during the second year of their study.

Recently AUD has received a grant of Rs. 1.5 crore from the Government of Delhi to support the activities of the Incubation Centre.

## CENTRE OF PSYCHOTHERAPY AND CLINICAL RESEARCH

The Centre of Psychotherapy and Clinical Research (CPCR) came into existence in July 2013. Prior to this, the idea of the Centre and the work which went into its creation was being incubated by the School of Human Studies (SHS). The Centre is founded on a psychoanalytic clinical orientation which believes in the unconscious, in an experiential lens, a value for caring relationships and an ethic of cultivating compassion. The aims and objectives of CPCR are to:

- develop and provide quality psychological services with a minimum fee.
- train psychoanalytic and socially-sensitive psychotherapists, through an intensive MPhil programme in Psychotherapy and Clinical Thinking,
- work in community contexts through inter-subjective and mutually transformative journeys.
- research, publish and disseminate knowledge in the area of mental health and psychotherapy.
- become a hub for training mental health and allied professionals and to evolve a model of appreciating and receiving subjectivity in humanities and social sciences.
- form an association of psychoanalytic psychotherapists in India informing policy on mental health care.

In 2015-2016, the centre moved forward towards its aims with the following functions.

## Ehsaas—The Psychotherapy and Counseling Clinic

Since its conception in 2011, Ehraus clinic at AUD has been functioning as the training, teaching and practice site for psychoanalytic psychotherapy. Housed within the University, Ehraus serves crucial function to bridge the gap between academia and the marginal voices from the social, formulated through the language of 'symptoms'. True to the vision and the university's ethos of social justice and equality, Ehraus provides free and nominal fee counseling and psychotherapy to persons from all socio-economic backgrounds. Ehraus continues to make mental health services accessible not only to those coming from socio-economic margins but also offer them a chance for in-depth listening and a provision for an engaged understanding of the life context and an empathic amelioration of their pain and symptoms. Commitment to these concerns is renewed by training MPhil trainees in enabling reflective clinical practices through regular supervision and mentoring.

In 2015-16, approximately 100 patients have availed long-term and short-term psychotherapy at *Elisaas* and several others have come to the clinic for consultation and advice. Most of the clinic's work has been with students and teachers and non-teaching staff who belong to Ambedkar University and individuals and families coming from different sections of the society. Adults, adolescents, children and families have come to the clinic seeking help and a majority of them have stayed in therapy for a considerable duration. Out of the patients visiting *Ehsaas*, most patients have been young people between the ages of 18 and 27 from various universities in

Delhi. The patients coming to *Ehsaas* have sought therapy for difficulties ranging from anxiety, depression and suicidal intentions to gender dysporia, body image issues, behavioral problems, adjustment difficulties, associability, feelings of emptiness or lack of meaning in life, addictive behavior, and loss of a loved one or intractable family issues such as domestic violence, alcoholism or psychosis of a family member, broken homes, sexual abuse or difficulty in sustaining relationships.

The psychotherapeutic work with students involves a link between their academic performance and their internal lives which are affected by the multiple social locations they occupy, dynamics within their families and the relationships around them. Often we find that a collapse or a conflict in one sphere affects all of the other. Students in the university often experience that the intellectual atmosphere in which they exist does not engage with their difficulties in relationships and in their self-experience which affect various parts of their lives but they don't find an adequate representation. The clinic becomes a space where, through mutual recognition of absence(s), a representation is evolved which provides a generative potential in the individual's life.

Through its philosophy of care for the diseased parts of the self, we at *ehsaus* attempt to foster a reflexive and nurturing space for individuals to develop a capacity to recognize relation between the disconnected parts of their inner world, to survive pain and restore a meaningful self-other relationship in one's life.

In collaboration with Centre for Equity Studies, in 2015 Ehsaas began working with the homeless population around the Yamuna Pushta area by providing psychiatric intervention and brief counseling to the homeless mentally ill persons residing in the shelter homes therein. The initiative involves working with the community workers who can then identify and suggest Ehsaas to the homeless persons experiencing psychotic breakdown or mood disturbances. Some of the people from the homeless shelters have started to visit ehsaas clinic for psychiatric advice and brief counseling. Ehsaas hope to link clinical work with community engagement to break the binary of office-based work and community life located outside.

## Mental Health Day - Awaaz 2015

On the occasion of World Mental Health Day 2015, CPCR and School of Human Studies jointly organized annual Mental Health Day (Awaaz) on 18<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> November 2015. This year's theme was 'Living with dignity: Care for the Homeless and the Homeless Mentally Ill'. As part of this event a community walk to shelter for women at Jama Masjid and shelter for men at Yamuna Pushta was organized, in which many faculty members and students participated.

A documentary film, *Patri par Bachpan*, was screened. This film is about the live stories and living context of children growing up in the streets of Delhi. The film screening was followed by a panel discussion which focused on testimonies and narratives around work with homeless persons. The panel discussion initiated rich reflections on the possibilities and challenges of engaging with the life of street dwellers. The Centre also deliberated on the various connotations of homelessness; both as an experience as well as a socio-political and psychological category. Thoughts on starting an exploratory work with those existing on the streets was exchanged as

well as the initial anxieties and fears of psychologists embarking on such a journey were given expression to. All of this was done with the aim to prepare ourselves to enter this difficult, yet nevertheless involving human journey. The University fraternity was also involved in putting upcycled items for a display in the University. Awaaz 2015 was successfully punctuated by an evening of poetry and sharing of experiences around home and sense of homelessness.

## Community Mental Health

The engagement with the community began with an informal collaboration between Centre of Psychotherapy and Clinical Research and Centre of Equity Studies and Aman Biradari in their project 'HAUSLA', work with adult homeless people.

Over a few meetings CPCR became more familiar to the field and lives of the homeless in the homeless shelters and became particularly familiarized with the issue of mental illness amongst the homeless and the kind of vulnerabilities it leads to. From October 2015 the engagement with the field has been multifaceted. On the one hand CPCR held its annual two day event in lieu of International Mental Health day keeping the theme for 2015 as 'Living with dignity: Care for the homeless and the homeless mentally ill'. The MPhil students and some more students of college went for a community walk to the shelters near the college campus and spent the evening there.

On the other hand individuals with mental illness have been coming to *Elisaas* clinic accompanied by the shelter staff and have been seeking consultations with the clinic psychiatrist and some psychotherapists. Our therapists have also held a peer-supervision group for the field staff and shelter counselor for *Khushi* home for homeless/street children. We are also engaged in guiding the research by Centre for Policy Research on the vulnerabilities of homelessness, particularly in the section of mental health.

CPCR is looking at deepening this engagement through involvement of MPhil trainees in the field for community internships.

#### MPhil Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy

Anchored by the larger values and principles which the University stands for, namely, engaged scholarship, praxis-based generation of knowledge that seeks to approximate the contours of lived life, an active concern for social justice and equity and regard for those existing at socio-economic margins, this three-year-long MPhil programme for training psychoanalytic psychotherapists, hopes to create reflective and involved professionals who will make significant contributions to the field of mental health. The second batch of this three year program began with nine students in the month of August 2015. The students were also taken for their first experiential immersion to the Balaji Temple in Rajasthan as well as to the Nizamuddin Dargah in Delhi—both of which are vibrant sites of cultural healing of mental disorders. The primary objective of the immersion was to help students gain a firsthand experience of how mental suffering is looked at and responded to by cultural and spiritual practices in Hinduism and Islam.

Psychotherapists and faculty members from CPCR also actively participated in providing clinical supervision and mentorship to the MPhil candidates. At present they are involved in preparing an

induction programme which will enable the MPhil students to begin their clinical internship at the *Ehsaas* clinic as well in the context of community mental health.

The Centre for Publishing (CfP) was activated in AUD in 2013 with the two-fold objective, namely, (i) to engage in publication activities and (ii) to offer academic programmes in publishing.

#### AUD Press

Through its publishing activities (in the name of AUD Press), CfP hopes to engage in a planned activity of acquisitions and dissemination of scholarly and creative information and knowledge delivered by the best, adhering to the best practices and ethical values. This would facilitate and assist AUD in publishing academic literature, including occasional papers, conference proceedings, monographs, edited volumes, course readings and reference books

As a first step towards this, an Editorial Committee has been set up within AUD with members of the teaching faculty and Mr C. Sajcesh Kumar, CfP, as the member secretary.

## PG Diploma in Publishing

Through its academic programmes in publishing, the Centre aims to provide the best human resources, information and support, and other resources that are needed to promote a promotional publishing atmosphere in India. To achieve this objective, since 2013, a one-year Postgraduate Diploma in Publishing is being offered through the School of Business, Public Policy and entrepreneurship. Given the objective of imparting managerial and administrative aspects and viewing publishing as an enterprise, the programme has been located at the School of Business, Public Policy and Social Entrepreneurship.

A new elective course 'epublishing' has been included in this year in the syllabi of the PG Diploma in Publishing programme.

Establishing a workstation for the Centre with 10 computers with the software required for publishing is in progress.

Three students graduated from the third batch (2014–15) are placed in reputed publishing houses. The current batch (2015–16) has 10 students who would be graduating in May 2016.

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## CENTRE FOR SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH METHODS (CSSRM)

The idea of CSSRM originated during the Social Science Research Methods Festival organised in December 2010. The Centre was conceived as a focal point to enhance the scope for dialogue across disciplines for research, training and capacity building activities related to research methods.

In November 2015, an associate professor was appointed to initiate and coordinate the activities of the Centre. A tentative list of experts has been identified as the Centre's Advisory Committee; a draft concept note on the Centre has been prepared. A process to finalise these will be initiated shortly. A meeting of faculty members involved/interested in teaching and undertaking research will be convened to carry forward these initiatives. Meanwhile, the Centre has initiated a process of consulting individual faculty members from Schools/Centres in AUD to identify mutual concerns and areas of interests between CSSRM and the respective Schools/Centres. On the basis of requests made by the concerned Dean/faculty members from Schools, CSSRM has a begun its contribution in teaching research methods and dissertation assessment.

#### CENTRE FOR URBAN ECOLOGY AND SUSTAINABILITY

The Centre for Urban Ecology and Sustainability (CUES) was set up with a view to work towards the creation of sustainable cities and enhancing the quality of urban life with learnings from experiences gained by engaging with the city of Delhi. The Centre would serve as a focal point where scientists, government agencies, private consultants and people converge and participate in the planning, implementation, and evaluation of sustainable environmental projects in cities. The Centre will collaborate with Schools and other Centres in AUD on areas of common interest, and will build linkages with academic programmes within the University to provide opportunities to students to foster engaged scholarship. The Centre is managed by a Director under the guidance of a duly constituted Advisory Board chaired by the Vice Chancellor

#### Collaborations

Delhi Development Authority The first and most prestigious project of the Centre—Restoration of Dheerpur Wetlands—is a collaborative effort of DDA and AUD where piece(s) of wetland belonging to the DDA have been handed over to AUD for wetland restoration. The DDA has also pledged limited financial assistance to begin the project.

## Research Projects


Dheerpur Wetland Restoration Project — This project envisages to ecologically restore, over a period of five years, the 25.38 hectares of land earmarked for conservation of wetlands at Dheerpur as per the agreement between DDA and AUD, using well-established frameworks of restoration science. Once established, the Wetland Park would provide hydrological, regulatory, cultural and aesthetic benefits to the people of Mukherjee Nagar, Nirankari Colony, Gandhi Vihar and the upcoming Ambedkar University Campus. It is also envisaged that the Wetland Resource Centre of the Park would serve as a hub for nature education and outreach programs that further the cause of conservation of wetlands and long-term urban sustainability.

A detailed project proposal to restore the wetlands of Dheerpur was prepared and submitted to DDA. The proposal includes 1) Details of Topography Outlines, 2) A Review of Stormwater Wetlands, 3) Detailed volume of earthwork estimates of Horizontal Flow Wetlands, 4) A Re-Vegetation Plan, and 5) Species Introduction Plan. It was proposed that the on-site excavation work and civil infrastructure of the project be developed with the help of in-house capacity of DDA. The proposal also requested that an initiation grant be provided to AUD to start the work on site.

#### Events/Activities

A team of researchers working at the Centre drafted a vision document and plan for the Centre. The Vision Documents also lays out the objectives of other programmes of the Centre.

The Dheerpur Wetland Park was formally inaugurated on 19 June 2015 by Shri Balvinder Kumar, Vice-Chairman, Delhi Development Authority (DDA).



With the help of the start-up grant, a small team of researchers have been recruited. Besides collecting baseline data for Dheerpur Project, the CUES team also maintains two websites:

CUES at AUD (https://cuesataud.wordpress.com/). The CUES blog gives general information regarding the Centre, its Vision, Mission, Goals, Organisational Structure, Programmes, and Advisory Board.

Urban Wetland Restoration (https://urbanwetlandrestoration.wordpress.com/). The urban wetland restoration blog specifically deals with the Dheerpur Wetlands and Parks Project. It outlays the basic information about wetland restoration, the vision planned for Dheerpur Wetland restoration, the Advisory Board, research conducted at Dheerpur, etc.

Baseline data has been generated for the present condition of the Dheerpur wetland site in terms of soil, water, flora and fauna. Field surveys were conducted and laboratory assessments of soil and water have been performed.

The Eco Club of AUD (TERRA) conducted a bird count survey at the Dheerpur wetlands as part of the Campus Bird Count 2016, where a team of avid birdwatchers from AUD, along with a few friends from outside the University took part. Several species of birds were spotted, and the checklist has been uploaded to E-Bird—a repository for data collected from such citizen science projects.

## Field-trips

The team visited Harike Bird Sanctuary in Punjab, Yamuna Biodiversity Park and Okhla Bird Sanctuary in Delhi. The objectives of these field-trips were to understand the broad distributional patterns of wetland species and establish ecological references.

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
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#### DIVISIONS

#### Publicity and International Partnerships Division

Publicity and the International Partnerships Division manages existing academic collaborations with foreign institutions, develops new proposals, provides administrative facilitation for visiting international academics, convenes meetings with relevant faculty, provides assistance to foreign students/faculty with FRRO registration and Exit Permits prior to departure besides convening periodic meeting of the Advisory Committee on International Partnerships (ACIP). It also oversees follow-up actions recommended by the Committee.

In addition, exploring funding opportunities for students and faculty to pursue their academic interests and posing relevant information onto the AUD website, vetting sponsored research projects, creating visibility of AUD's programmes and activities by sending reports to the media before and after major events, serving as the media office, facilitating interaction of AUD faculty with media for press coverage of various programmes.

## International Partnerships

AUD has established collaborations with many foreign institutions. The major ongoing partnerships are listed.

Urban Knowledge Network Asia (UKNA) The EU-funded staff exchange programme with other universities (2012–2016) is currently on-going. Rohit Negi(SHE), as a UKNA scholar, worked at the International Institute for Asian Studies (IIAS) Leiden from March—June 2014. Surajit Sarkar (CCK) participated in a UKNA workshop on heritage in Singapore in July 2014. Surajit Sarkar (CCK), Sayandeb Chaudhary (SLS), Shaina Sehgal (SHE), and Praveen Singh (SHE) are the scholars to take up further UKNA assignments.

San Francisco State University SFSU has signed the new sub agreement for faculty and student exchange to be a part of the main MOU (signed in 2011) that deals with 1) Collaboration: research projects of mutual interest, 2) Sharing of expertise on curricula and pedagogy, 3) Organising of symposia, seminars, conferences for joint projects, 4) Mutual exchange of resources to further joint collaborative projects, 5) Exchange of students, 6) Exchange of faculty, 7) Development of joint education programs, and 8) Development of other activities.

**The American India Foundation Trust** Signed in 2012 to implement a Knowledge Partnership pilot project.

The University of Hawai'l Manoa Signed in 2012 to enhance educational processes at respective institutions for faculty to develop courses, teach and conduct research and to offer University-based Study Abroad Partnership Program with AUD.

So far 10 students and 3 faculty from the University of Hawaii, Manoa have visited AUD. Dr Ned Bertz, Associate Professor, Department of History, University of Hawaii (UH) at Manoa

will be serving as a Visiting faculty at AUD for Monsoon Semester 2016. He is accompanied by two students; one pursuing undergraduate course and the other pursuing postgraduate course for a term in 2016.

University of Northampton (UK) Signed in 2013 to promote 1) Academic exchanges and faculty collaboration in teaching/research in social enterprise, 2) Student exchange, 3) Design and Implementation of academic programmes (Joint programme development, exploration of collaboration at course level, e.g. the MBA Social Enterprise). Discussions are going on for the development of MA (Social Enterpreneurship) program of AUD and other areas such as joint research, student and faculty exchange.

Bank Street College of Education, USA Signed in 2013 to collaborate on research projects of mutual interest and benefit: sharing of expertise on curricula and pedagogy, organising symposia, seminars, conferences, and joint projects; mutual exchange of resource for joint collaborative projects; exchange of students and faculty, development of joint educational programmes.

Prof Susan Ellen Stires from Bank Street College visited SES in March 2014 as a visiting faculty to conduct workshops on reflective writing for both students and faculty members and review plans for the Masters in Education (Early Childhood Care and Education) of AUD to provide critical feedback to strengthen the program. She facilitated a dialogue to reflect on current practices in field attachment in SES and motivated faculty members to develop new strategies. She supported the effort of CECED to develop a policy brief in special education. She was one of the key speakers in the panel discussion on the theme 'Working with Young Children from Marginalized Communities' at the University. She also addressed the Round Table Consultation on "Decoding Emergent and Early Literacy: The Emerging Scenario" at India Islamic Cultural Centre, Delhi, organized by CECED.

The International Institute of Social Studies at Erasmus University Rotterdam (Netherlands) Signed in 2013 to foster academic and educational cooperation by 1) Dual degree programmes: AUD-ISS masters programme and special certificate course, 2) Exchange of faculty and/or research fellows; 3) Collaborative research, lectures, symposia and workshops.

Norwegian Institute of International Affairs (NUPI) Signed in 2013 to implement the project "The state, Globalisation and Industrial Development in India: the Political Economy of Regulation and Deregulation". This project was selected for award of assistance by the Research Council of Norway under its INDNOR programme for a period of three years from 2013 to 2016. Indian Institute of Management. Kolkata is the other participating institution in this collaborative project. Dr Surajit Mazumdar and Dr Chirashree Das Gupta were the researchers from AUD. A workshop in Oslo in 2014 led to clearer specification of the research themes. Project Associates were also hired subsequently and with their assistance work on finalizing different studies is under way. A workshop was held in IIM; Kolkata in December 2015 for a review of the project. The Research Council of Norway has given a year's extension for finalization of all the studies undertaken by this project.

Yale University Signed in 2014 for a study on "Early Childhood Development for the Poor: Impacting at Scale (NIH Study)" to 1) Investigate alternative service provision modes, their scalability and effectiveness relative to previous smaller-scale interventions; 2) identify mechanisms that determines impact of ECD interventions on child development.

This study involves a two year intervention of 2000 infants and toddlers in three rural districts of Odisha (Balasore (Soro), Cuttuck (Salepur) and Bolangir). CECED is a technical partner working in collaboration with IFS, Yale University, Pratham (Odisha and Delhi), JPAL-SA for the research in Odisha designed to document how early stimulation, in combination with a nutrition program, offered through different modalities (individual support to caregivers and group support to caregivers) can affect child development outcomes

The stimulation intervention, an adaptation of the Infant Stimulation package developed by Dr Sally Grantham-McGregor in the University of West Indies, has been on-going since December 2015. Major activities are:

- Development of group curriculum and supplementary documents
- · Piloting of group curriculum
- Training on curriculum and assessment tools
- · Monitoring visits

European Union Signed in 2014, for the project "Enhancing quality, access and governance of undergraduate education in India (E-QUAI)" is a European Union funded International Collaborative Project with a funding commitment of over one million Euros till May 2017.

The project is being implemented by a consortium of partners, with the British Council being the lead partner along with Ambedkar University Delhi, Jadavpur University, King's College London, Shiv Nadar University, University of Bologna and University of Hyderabad.

The objective of the project is to enhance the quality, access and governance of undergraduate education in India, through promotion of Indo-EU Higher Education partnerships and collaborations, which is in line with Government of India's plan to provide greater access and improve quality of higher education in India.

The project activities are being implemented in four key disciplines Critical Thinking, Cultural Studies, Human Ecology, Natural Resource Management and Sustainable Development. The Project is aimed at facilitating exchange of best practice, experience and knowledge in undergraduate teaching and learning, using technology enhanced approaches relevant to India's context.

## Major activities are:

Produced three documentary films. These documentaries were shot in and around Kuno Wildlife Sanctuary in Madhya Pradesh, Banjar in Himachal Pradesh and I so Kar basin in Ladakh, Jammu and Kashmir. These media resources along with other video lectures will constitute the Open Educational Resources (OER) being produced under the project.

Developed a four-credit elective course for School of Undergraduate Studies students, Introduction to Human Ecology, which was taught during the Monsoon 2015 semester.

Organised a student conference titled "Learning From Learners—Equalising Diverse Higher Education Landscapes" on 19 and 20 February 2016 at India Habitat Centre, New Delhi with an objective to highlight autobiographical accounts of students, through which educators might more effectively analyse diverse learning experiences as well as adapt to real learning environments.

Three new documentary films have been commissioned under the project this year and these arc currently at various stages of production. The project will also be organising a teacher training workshop and an academic conference in August and October 2016 respectively.

Nottingham Trent University Signed in 2014 with the School of Art and Design of Nottingham Trent University under the British Academy International Partnership and Mobility Scheme 2014–2017 and funded by British Academy to study the "Sustaining cultures in local environments. Learning from the Indian handicrafts sector".

Babes-Rolyai University, Romania Signed in 2015 to exchange staff and students under the Erasmus+ programme.

Royal College of Art Signed in 2014 to evolve the best practices for postgraduate teaching and learning about Design. Culture and Society: "Developing curriculum, pedagogy and teaching materials through collaborative, cross-cultural partnership". The project is now complete and collaboration has been concluded.

#### LIBRARY SERVICES DIVISION

The library of Ambedkar University Delhi is situated in its main campus at Kashmere Gate, Delhi. It is hub of knowledge activities with all modern facilities. The reading hall and stack of the library are fully air conditioned. Most of the operations of the library have been automated and the rest of the operations are in the process of automation. The library remains open from 08:00 am to 08:00 pm throughout the year except three national holidays.

The library committee consists of 25 members from different schools. Professor Geeta Venkataraman is the Chairperson of library committee.

#### Readers' Services

At present more than 2000 students, faculty members, scholars, administrative staff and visiting faculty use library services. The library provides reference; issue/return book services, internet services, tutorial, OPAC, online and print journals, ebooks access facilities etc. to its users.

#### Resource sharing

AUD library is a member of Developing Library Network (DELNET), Information and Library Network Centre (INFLIBNET). The library also provides inter-library loan facility to its members.

#### Library Resources

This year the library acquired 3023 books, of value Rs. 74.540,39. and has a collection of 36,000 books. The library has also 23,423 e-journals of value Rs. 14,986,407 and 53 print journals of value Rs. 544,494. Seven English newspapers and three Hindi newspapers are subscribed. It has 25 databases, 120 ebooks and 120 CDs.

## INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES DIVISION

The IT Services division serves as the backbone for all IT-related activities. The services provided include internet access, email, IT security, WiFi connectivity, centralised backup storage, Intranet, Moodle server, Virtual Private Network access and Library services, Job Portal, maintenance of University Website and ERP (at present for Student Life Cycle, HR, Finance, Purchase/Procurement, Store Register). The network comprises of more than 500 nodes, All ICT services offered by the division remain operational on 24 × 7 basis. To provide Internet facility and access to online learning material, the division administers a 100 mbps link to National Knowledge Network.

The existing ERP modules were enhanced/customised to automatically handle the functions of: admission procedures, academic programmes, human resources, finance and accounting and payroll system.

#### STUDENT SERVICES DIVISION

The Student Services Division is headed by the Dean, Student Services, and provides services in:

Admission-related matters involving advertising and publicity, coordinating the admission procedures, organizing the meetings related to admission/assessment procedures, maintainenace of the stock records of application/admission forms, supervision of sale and collection of students' fee, etc.

Issuance of final Transcript/Migration/Bonafide/Transfer/Degree certificates, refund of caution deposit and organizing annual convocation event.

Organising the fee-waiver committee meetings and disbursement of scholarship and student welfare fund.

Release of monthly stipend to research scholars.

Liaison with Directorate of Higher Education, Government of NCT of Delhi and participation in the educational fairs.

Coordination with Student Cell and handling Online Problem Redressal System for Students (OPRSS).

#### ADMISSION PROCESS

Admissions procedures for undergraduate and postgraduate programmes began in May/June and for MPhil and PhD programmes during July/Aug.

#### Reservation of Seats

Admissions are made in accordance with the reservation policies of the Government of NCT of Delhi in respect of various social groups and other categories as applicable to institutions of higher education. The current scheme of reservations is: Students from the NCT, Delhi—85% and students from outside the NCT, Delhi—15%.

#### Admission of Foreign Students

A few seats are reserved for foreign students in every programme. Foreign nationals who are not in India need to apply through their Consulate or Embassy. All foreign nationals must hold a student visa valid for the entire period of study endorsed by the Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India. The degrees of foreign nationals must be recognised by the Association of Indian Universities.

Fees for foreign students will be twice the fee applicable to Indian students for each semester and Rs. 500 per semester towards the Student Welfare Fund. In addition they will be required to pay Rs. 10,000 as a refundable deposit.

#### Selection of candidates

Admission to undergraduate programmes were based on merit (marks obtained in Class XII examination) and to postgraduate programmes and reaearch (MPhil and PhD) were based on written examination and interview.

Undergraduate Programmes To be eligible to apply for admission to BA Honours in Mathematics, students must have obtained a minimum of 65% in Mathematics in the XII Board Examination. For applying to BA Honours in Economics, the marks obtained in Mathematics in the XII Board Examination must be included in the calculation of the aggregate of the 'Best Four Subjects' of the XII Board Examination. A relaxation of 5% marks will be given in the eligibility criterion for SC/ST and PD categories in all programmes of the University. For BA English—student must have obtained a minimum of 65% in English in class XII Board of Examination.

Postgraduate Programmes Bachelor's degree with 45% marks or equivalent grade from a recognized university, except MA Education, MA Social Entrepreneurship and PG Diploma in Publishing for which a minimum of 50% marks or equivalent grade from a recognized university in any discipline and in SCCE a minimum of 40% of marks or equivalent grade from a recognized university in any discipline shall be the minimum eligibility. A relaxation of 5% marks is applicable to SC/ST and PD categories.

MPhil Masters degree in any field of the social sciences and humanities from a recognized institution with ≥55% or equivalent CGA (≥50% for SC/ST/PD applicants).

**PhD** As above plus MPhil (with thesis) in any field of the social sciences and humanities from any recognized institution. In special cases, applicants who have completed History courses beyond MA (for example, MPhil courses but without thesis) could be eligible for admission.

All MPhil and PhD candidates selected for the entrance test must submit research proposals in English on the date of the entrance test.

#### Lateral Admission Committee

Lateral admission committee facilitates the process of lateral entries in any particular programme of study. Admissions through this category is subject to submission of all relevant documents (results of previous semester/year etc.) and fulfilling the eligibility (additional, if any) criteria as prescribed for admission in that programme of study.

#### Fee Structure

Through the fee structure as well as the exemptions offered, AUD hopes to inculcate a social sensitivity in its students—to respect what they enjoy as privileges and to be able to serve society in their future professional capacities.

AUD has a fee structure which ranges from Rs. 1000/- to Rs. 2000/- per credit of the

programme. In addition Rs. 500/- per semester is collected towards 'Student Welfare Fund' and a refundable caution deposit (one-time) of Rs. 5000/- at the time of admission.

All candidates who are provisionally offered admission to a programme are required to deposit the fee within the time specified in the admission notice. Students are required to pay the fees of the subsequent semester/s within four weeks of the commencement of classes. A penalty of Rs, 100 is imposed per week for late payment and after four weeks of non-payment, the student is de-enrolled from the programme.

### Refund of Fees

After being admitted, if a student discontinue from the programme the fees would be refunded as; before orientation for a programme Rs. 1000 will be deducted and after orientation programme only caution deposit is refunded.

### Fee-waiver and Scholarships

The University offers full and partial fee-waivers to students who are in need of support given their economic background. In fact, 25 per cent of the fees collected from students are returned to the economically disadvantaged students by way of fee-waivers and scholarships.

Procedure for applying for fee-waiver and scholarships At the time of admission, a student can apply for fee-waiver by submitting supporting documents. If provisionally admitted to a programme, she will be permitted to take admission without paying the fee. Students, whose combined annual family income is less than Rs. 500,000 will be eligible for fee-waiver. A student will continue to receive fee-waiver provided he/she is found to be regular in attending classes and maintains an acceptable level of performance in studies. SC/ST/PD students are advised to submit their application in the month of February for Scholarships under the SC/ST/PD categories for the academic session of that year.

#### Student Welfare Fund

The University has created a Student Welfare Fund with the objective of making financial assistance available for meeting the welfare needs of students in need, such as emergent medical assistance, purchase of books and study material, meeting the boarding and lodging expenses equivalent to the amount that is required to avail AUD hostel facilities, and any other comparable needs of students.

An amount of Rs. 500 per semester is collected from all students towards the Student Welfare Fund and an equal amount is contributed by the University. The fund is managed and monitored by a committee which includes a nominee of the student community.



## Co-Curricular Activities (CCA)

AUD has established different student societies/clubs to galvanize the cultural and extracurricular life of students in the campus. Students are actively engaged in Theatre Society. Sports Committee, Debating Society and Literary Society. The Economics Society and the Society for Visual Culture has also been activated. There are regular talks, lectures, screenings and performances in the campus and students are encouraged to organize events and participate in them.

## Sports

Sports activities in AUD are conducted under the aegis of the Sports Committee. With the availability of both indoor and outdoor spaces, the committee initiated sports facilities at KG Campus. Sports activities received a major thrust during Monsoon Semester 2012. A fully functional sports facility for students and staff was inaugurated in August 2012. This was followed by first AUD Sports Day held on 05 October 2012, which attracted wide participation from students. AUD now has a fully functional indoor sports facility including Table Tennis, Carrom and Chess, and equipment for Badminton, Cricket, Basketball, Volleyball, Football and athletic activities. An annual 'faculty vs student' cricket match is organized by the Sports Committee. The committee is also in the process of formalizing a series of sport events that is sure to become annual attractions in the life of AUD.

Sports Committee works in tandem with students who actively participate in planning and organizing sports events. Student members elected from different Schools of AUD are represented in Sports Board, the general body of the Sports Committee. AUD is also empanelling an array of professional coaches for facilitating sports activities, providing training to students and selection of students for representing AUD at national events.

## Career Cell

AUDCC (AUD Career Cell) has been set up to facilitate interface between students and the world of link outside. AUDCC identifies these organizations that are interested to offer internship for students and liaise between students and those organizations while compiling the CV's of students with the major areas of interest.

#### Alumni Association

As of today, 1285 students have graduated from various programmes of AUD. We are in the process of establishing a university wide Alumni Association, though some of the Schools/programmes have initiated their own alumni association.

## Language Cell

While the medium of instruction at AUD is English, students from different linguistic backgrounds are encouraged to apply for admission to the various programmes at AUD. A Language Cell has been set up at AUD to help students to improve their reading, writing and comprehension skills in English.

## Mentorship and Counseling

AUD's mission is not merely to provide access opportunities for quality higher education to students irrespective of their backgrounds, but also to ensure that all students traverse through the process of higher education smoothly and attain success. The University endeavors to support every student in his/her struggle to find moorings in the university's academic and social space A system of Mentorship and Counseling has been set up at the University to facilitate this.

## Student Cell

The Student Cell acts as a liaison between Student Services and students. Student Cell works to help students to overcome difficulty and provide assistance in every possible way.

## ACADEMIC SERVICES DIVISION

Academic Services Division's activities include the University's academic governance and regulatory framework, implementing faculty recruitment; career management policies and managing matters related to external invitees and guest faculty. All the service matters of faculty including appointments, leave matters, appraisals, career advancement scheme, training etc. are being handled by the Academic Services division.

As on 31 st March 2016 there were 12 Professors, 22 Associate Professors, 68 Assistant Professors, 20 Visiting Faculty, 12 Temporary Faculty, 3 Tenure Faculty, 9 Contractual Academic Staff and 3 Library Academic Staff

## HUMAN RESOURCES DIVISION

The Human Resources Division in the AUD is a compact unit comprising six members. The Division supports the Schools, Centres and Campuses of the University by providing human resources services. It primarily takes care of all service-related matters, recruitment and staffing, training and development and initiatives for welfare of administrative employees of the University besides assisting the Registrar in performing statutory duties. These include developing and implementing appropriate personnel policies and procedures, providing appropriate support and information to concerned stakeholders and maintaining staff records and staff-based statistics.

Recruitment, Selection and Staffing is a vital function that the HR Division performs. In 2015–16 staffing was carried out for 16 posts of System Administrators, Technical Assistants, Security Supervisors, Consultants and Library Trainees. The Statutory Posts of Registrar and Controller of Finance along with a Deputy Registrar identified for PWD were filled. Performance review of 15 Group-A Officers and 63 contractual Staff was also completed.


An exhaustive review of HR Policy for Administrative Staff was undertaken by a Committee chaired by Professor Kuriakose Mamkoottam, Director, SBPPSE and Dean, Student Services. The Committee after undertaking a comprehensive study of staffing pattern of AUD, submitted its Report to the Vice Chancellor on 10.03,2016 which was considered and approved by the Board of Management.

As a policy and procedure measure the Biometric Attendance System was designed and implemented from 1st January 2016.

As a part of employee welfare measure, the HR Division prepared a proposal to extend group insurance cover to regular and contractual employees in AUD. Similarly, the existing Medical Attendance and Treatment Regulations were also thoroughly reviewed to make it more attractive for AUD employees.

Training and development is another important aspect of the HR Division that enables the University to work efficiently and grow. Four training programmes were organized by the HR Division to up-skill the staff. A Certificate Training Programme, covering English Language, IT & Computers, and Office Procedure, was conducted for 21 MTS of the AUD. The participants were presented certificates by the Vice Chancellor at a meeting organized for the purpose. Two half-day courses for 10 Junior Executives was conducted to refresh them on the topics of University Administration, Service Matters, Purchase Matters and Financial Management Training on the finance and accounting software, Tally, was provided to 11 staff in the Finance Division. The year ended on a high note with the much appreciated two-day National Workshop for University Officers on University Governance. 39 University Officers from eight Universities across the nation participated in the workshop. 20 AUD officers and staff were deputed to various training programs outside the university on a range of themes from Noting and Drafting to Disaster Management.

#### PLANNING DIVISION

The Planning Division of Ambedkar University Delhi performs a wide range of functions towards the overall development of the University. The different activities and functions carried out by Planning Division include formulating development programmes of the University in consultation with its Schools, preparing five year plans with budgetary allocations, organising and planning publications on information related to the University, planning and supervising the infrastructure development of the University, preparing and submitting plans for all major funding initiatives and following up these proposals with the funding bodies like the GNCTD and the UGC. In addition it supervises the preparation and printing of the Annual Reports and other information bulletins of the University from time to time. Other major activities of the Division are listed below.

#### Setting a multi-campus unitary university

The AUD has decided to be a multi-campus unitary University with an added focus on vocational/community college-based programmes. While it now operates from the Kashmere Gate Campus, it has been allotted two plots at Rohini and Dheerpur for constructing new campuses. Additionally, the University is being offered the old campus of DDU College in Karampura to set-up a new campus.

The planning for the new campuses has been done with a horizon of the next 10 years and the requirements have been finalised in consultation with the Senior Management Team of the University. It is projected that the Rohini campus would have a capacity of 3500 students (1400 UG + 2100 PG) with a faculty strength of 248. In Phase-I of the Dheerpur campus, the student strength is projected as 4200 (1300 UG + 1600 PG + 1300 community college) with a faculty strength of 298.

#### UGC General Development Assistance

UGC had sanctioned Rs.7 crores as General Development Assistance Grant under XII Plan to Ambedkar University Delhi. In the year 2015–16, UGC released its second installment of Rs.1.4 crores to AUD for its various activities.

#### NIRF Ranking

AUD participated in ranking of Higher Education Institutions conducted for the first time by the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) by MHRD. AUD ranked in top 100 universities in India and out of the 233 universities registered for ranking, AUD was ranked 96.

#### Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN)

AUD is one of 25 other State Universities in India selected to benefit from the Global Initiative of Academic Networks (GIAN), an initiative by the Government of India for Higher Education. GIAN is intended to tapping the international pool of talented seientists/entrepreneurs with an

objective to encourage their engagement with the institutes of Higher Education in India. The initiative is aimed to augment the country's existing academic resources, accelerate the pace of quality reform, and elevate India's scientific and technological capacity to global excellence.

#### Rashiriya Uchchtar Slksha Abhiyun (RUSA)

AUD submitted its Institutional Development Plan to the Government of the NCT of Delhi for the Rashtriya Uchehtar Siksha Abhiyan (RUSA).

## Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) guidelines mandate for the establishment of an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) as a post-accreditation quality sustenance measure by every accredited institution. The primary aims of the IQAC are:

To develop a system for conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the institution, and to promote measures for institutional functioning towards quality enhancement through internalization of quality culture and institutionalization of best practices.

The Board of Management of Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD) in its 18th meeting held on 8 October 2015 approved the establishment of AUD's Internal Quality Assurance Cell with the Vice Chancellor as its Chairperson.

The IQAC submitted its first AQAR (Annual Quality Assurance Report) to NAAC in the year 2015-16.

#### CAMPUS DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

#### DHEERPUR CAMPUS

The Ministry of Urban Development (Delhi Division. Government of India) allotted land, measuring 20 hectares, for setting up of Ambedkar University campus at Dheerpur Phase-I. Directorate of Higher Education of GNCTD made a payment of Rs. 140.22 crore towards the cost of this land to DDA. Immediately, after taking over possession of land, PWD was entrusted with the responsibility of constructing a boundary wall and it awarded the contract for construction of boundary wall at a rate of Rs. 1.32 crore and as per the current estimates, the work is likely to be completed by 31 August 2016. In order to strengthen the security at site, a proposal to provide lighting arrangements consisting of floodlights on boundary wall with a provision of three high mast lights inside the plot at the rate of Rs. 31.73 lakh is also under execution by the PWD. Looking to the conditions existing at site, the security of the plot has now been taken over by AUD.

#### Shifting of Overhead 33/11 KV Power Line

The presence of overhead 33/11KV HT-LT power lines in the plot was considered as an encumbrance and the matter was taken up with GNCTD for approval of a proposal at a cost of Rs. 5.44 crore for shifting these lines. GNCTD accordingly sanctioned this amount in December 2015 and the work is under execution by M/s Tata Power Delhi Distribution Limited which is likely to be completed by 30 October 2016.

#### Hydrological Studies

National Institute of Hydrology (NIH), Roorkee has been engaged for conducting the hydrological studies at Dheerpur site for assessment of (i) surface water and ground water availability both in terms of quantity and quality. (ii) rainwater harvesting, (iii) designing of major storm water drainage pattern/system. The NIH has completed the survey and the final report is expected by 30 June 2016. Nonetheless, a preliminary report received from NIH has been referred to Centre for Urban Ecology and Sustainability (CUES), AUD for their inputs.

#### ROHINI CAMPUS

In the year 2010, DDA allotted two plots of land measuring 2.98 hectare and 4.03 hectare for the new AUD campus at Rohmi, after amalgamating them into one consolidated plot of 7.03 hectares along with a 13.5 metre road running between these plots. The DDA had, earlier approved, in principle to relocate the road so that AUD can have a composite campus at Rohmi. However, in a subsequent decision communicated by the DDA, an underpass access between two plots has been approved as an alternative.

The plot allotted to AUD at Rohini already had a boundary wall around it which was old and damaged at many places requiring repair and strengthening. The PWD has completed this work and some additional work, though awarded to PWD earlier, is being taken up by AUD. The security of the Rohini plot has also been taken over by AUD.

PWD is in the process of executing a proposal for providing lighting arrangements on the boundary wall and high must light with a view to ensure better security at night. The contour survey of the site has been entrusted to PWD for which funds have been released to them. The survey is expected to be completed within two months which would enable NIH to complete the hydrological studies of Rohini site as well.

#### Horticulture

As a part of development of new campuses, AUD has decided to commence horticultural operations at both the sites.

#### **Execution of the Projects**

The PWD will act as Project Management Consultant for implementing new projects at both the sites. Necessary project details drawn up by AUD through its internal resources have been sent to -PWD for further action. On receipt of their response, a detailed proposal will be submitted to GNCTD for approval.

#### KASHMERE GATE CAMPUS

The annual renovation and maintenance works are being looked after by PWD. Major renovation works are also being handled by PWD. However, with the induction of engineering staff in Campus Development Division (CDD), some of the important renovation works of Incubation Centre and N6 area are being executed by the CDD.

#### KARAMPURA CAMPUS

Recently, a part of Deen Dayal Uppadhyay College at Karampura has been allotted to AUD to run a few programmes from the current academic session. The civil and electrical services renovation plans of the campus have been prepared by the Campus Development Division at a cost of Rs. 1.31 crore which are currently being executed by the PWD. The remaining campus of DDU is likely to be handed over to AUD by 31st December 2016 and a full-fledged campus would be operational thereafter.

#### ADMINISTRATION DIVISION

The Administration Division provides administrative and logistic assistance to the entire organization in support of the operations of the University. It procures goods and services for the Schools, Centres and Divisions of AUD. The division is responsible for formulating and implementing the annual procurement plan. It also carries out inventory management, which includes receipt, issue and accounting of the assets.

Conversion of one post of Assistant Registrar into Executive Engineer (Civil) to look after the civil maintenance work of the University and its Recruitment Rules

The broad responsibilities of the Executive Engineer (Civil) as identified and recommended by the Establishment Committee (EC) and approved by the Board of Management (BoM) are as under

Maintenance work: To execute works of the University to be taken up departmentally or through PWD or other agencies and maintenance of buildings, other civil installations/systems with procurement of material and machinery for speedy and economic execution of works, and implementation of the terms of contracts entered into with contractors/ suppliers; and perform other related duties and special projects as assigned or directed from time to time.

Minimum qualification and other eligibility conditions required for the post of Executive Engineer (Civil) as recommended by the Establishment Committee and approved by the BoM are given below:

#### Essential:

- (i) Degree in Civil Engineering with about 15 years experience in designing systems and construction of building, including their maintenance in a government/ semi-government/ university/ international organization. Out of the 15 years professional experience, at least 06 years should be as at Assistant Engineer (Civil) in PB-2 + GP 4600/- level or above in a University /Government Institution/ Department/ Public Sector Undertaking.
- (ii) Ability to prepare/analyze Detailed Project Reports (DPR) and project management/control skills etc.
- (iii) Good working knowledge of computer applications and internet; strong interpersonal skills, exceptional technical writing skills related to works.

The BoM, in its meeting held on 19.04.2016 considered the decision of the GNCTD that the PWD would act as PMC for implementing the new projects at Rohini and Dheerpur Phase-I, and resolved as under:

- (i) The selection of Architect for both the projects would be done through separate open competitions with laid down procedure under GFR 2005 and general guidelines issues by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India. The appointment of Architect would be through combined quality-cum-cost basis of selection giving 70% weightage to Technical Bid and 30% weightage to Financial Bid.
- (ii) Architects for each of the above projects will be selected by the University through an open selection process involving a jury constituted by AUD composition of which would include a representative of the PWD.
- (iii) The Public Works Department (PWD) of the Govt of NCT of Delhi shall be the Project Management Consultant (PMC) for both Dheerpur Phase-I and Rohini campuses of the University
- (iv) The Architect thus selected by the University shall be appointed by the PMC, i.e. PWD.

In pursuance of the above resolution of the BoM, the matter was finally discussed in a meeting held with Hon'ble Deputy CM, GNCTD on 05.07.2017. A proposal based on the decision taken in aforesaid meeting was submitted to Hon'ble Dy. CM, GNCTD on 29.07.2016 and the Hon'ble Dy. CM vide his approval dated 10.08.2016 while approving the minutes of meeting held on 05.07.2016, also approved the following.

- (i) In-principle approval to the tentative cost of Rs. 1350 crore (Rs 750 crore for Dheerpur, Phase-I and Rs. 600 crore for Rohini) as certified by PWD for preparing the RFP (Request for Proposal)/NIT (Notice Inviting Tender) for selection of the Architect.
- (ii) AUD would approve the RFP/Tender Document for selection of Architect.

- (iii) AUD would constitute the Jury and approve its evaluation of the design concepts. The Jury would also have a representative of PWD.
- (iv) AUD would approve the selection of the Architect.

The decisions of Hon'ble Dy. CM, GNCTD will be notified after BoM takes note of them.

As per the minutes of meeting held between AUD and PWD officials on 26.04.2016, a draft MoU to be signed between AUD and PWD specifying the role and responsibilities of both the parties in implementing the new projects of Rohini and Dheerpur Phase-I, in line with the practice followed by CPWD while undertaking deposit works for various Government and Seml-Government organizations has been prepared by the Campus Development Division. The draft MoU, after concurrence by the Registrar, AUD and the CoF, AUD is being forwarded to PWD for their acceptance. On receiving it back from PWD, the MoU will be finally submitted for approval of VC, AUD before being formally signed by AUD and PWD. One significant feature of this MoU is that a completion schedule of both the projects has been made part of it. As per this time schedule both the campuses are expected to be functional by September 2020 provided necessary approvals from GNCTD including budgetary provisions and clearances from other concerned agencies are received well in time.

#### Status of Campus Development at Dheerpur and Rohini

#### (A) Dheerpur

#### A.1 Allotment of Additional land of 3.76 ha

DDA had allotted an additional piece of land measuring 3.76 hectare at a cost of Rs. 28.58 crore at Dheerpur (Phase-I). Physical possession of this land has been handed over to AUD by the DDA on 29.07.2016. Thus, the total land available to AUD for developing the new campus is now 20 hectares.

#### A.2 Construction of Boundary Walf – Civil Works

It was reported in the last meeting of BOM held on 19.04.2016 that the PWD had awarded the contract of construction of boundary wall around AUD's plot at Dheerpur at a cost of Rs.1.32 crore and the work was stipulated to be completed within a period of 6 months i.e. by 08.04.2015. It was also reported that as per the status obtainable, at that time, about 70% of the boundary wall had been constructed by PWD. Upon taking up the matter vigorously with PWD to complete the boundary wall as early as possible, the PWD stepped up the construction activities and as per present indications, the boundary wall is expected to be completed by 30<sup>th</sup> November 2016, barring a 90-100 metre section where the accumulated rain water will take some time for drying. This portion is likely to take 3 more months for its completion.

#### A.3 Flood-Lighting of the boundary wall

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, there had been delay in award of work for providing lighting arrangements consisting of flood lighting on boundary wall and 3 (three) high-mast towers inside the plot. After persistent follow-up of the matter with PWD, the work has been awarded by PWD and the agency assigned the work has asked for some development work in the low lying area flooded with water during the recent rainy season. The site conditions are being improved for the agency to start the work Keeping the size of plot in view, the work is expected to be completed by 31<sup>st</sup> January 2017.

#### A.4 Shifting of Over Head 33/11 KV HT/LT Power Lines

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, an advance of Rs. 5.40 crore had been released to M/s TPDDL to execute this work. M/s TPDDL has completed the shifting of 11KV HT line from the AUD plot. For the 33KV HT line almost 90% of the underground cabling work has been completed. One new tower inside the AUD campus is in the process of being installed. M/s TPDDL is sorting out some technical issues relating to erection of second tower (outside the AUD plot) to complete the entire work. It is expected that the shifting of 33KV line would be completed by 31st January 2017

#### A.5 Area under litigation

The position in regard to the front area of 0.95 ha of plot remains unchanged as the matter is under adjudication by the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi. Considering the importance of this area, being a vital part of the frontage of AUD plot, AUD is in close liaison with DDA for allotment of the area to AUD as and when the legal case is decided in favor of DDA.

#### A.6 External Services in Dheerpur Phase I

DDA had been requested to confirm that all the external services had been laid in Dheerpur Phase-I. A reply from DDA is however awaited. The matter is being pursued with DDA.

#### A.7 Hydrological Studies

The National Institute of Hydrology (NIH), Roorkee who were entrusted with the hydrological studies has since submitted the final report in respect of Dheerpur Phase-I. The report has been shared with experts for their opinion

#### A.8 Security of the Plot

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, the security for Dheerpur plot had been taken over by AUD we.f from 01 05 2016 in keeping with the decision taken in the meeting held with CPM (Education) on 19 02.2016

#### (B) Rohini – Civil Works

#### B.1 Repair of existing boundary wall

It was reported in the last meeting of BOM, that PWD did not take up some additional work relating to repair of existing boundary wall for which an amount of Rs. 22,63,622/- had been sanctioned by the DHE. The reason for not taking up these works has been frequent organizational changes in the PWD. However, PWD subsequently was not inclined to take up the work being of small value and also that they wanted to engage themselves on

major project work, which is now expected to commence shortly. The Campus Development Division is accordingly preparing tenders for these additional works, so as to ensure that the boundary wall is secure and the plot is protected from encroachers.

#### B.2 Flood Lighting of the Boundary Wall

This work has been awarded by the PWD in June 2016 and is in progress. 2 (two) High Mast Towers are in the process of being installed. The progress of work is being constantly pursued with PWD to ensure the completion of the work by 30<sup>th</sup> November 2016.

#### **B.3** Contour Survey

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, this work was to be undertaken by the PWD who could not commence the work due to frequent organizational changes. However, subsequently with a view to concentrating on major project work which is likely to commence soon, and also given the small value of work, PWD requested AUD to undertake this work departmentally. The tender for this work will be invited by Campus Development Division shortly. It is expected that the detailed contour survey of the site would be completed within the next 6 weeks.

#### B.4 Hydrological Studies at Rohini

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, NIH, Roorkee was to conduct the hydrological studies at Rohini plot also. Although NIH has collected the rainfall data and water samples etc. from the site but some parts of the scope of studies is linked with the topographical survey of the plot which was to be done initially by PWD for which an amount of Rs. 60,700/- was released to PWD in May 2015. As stated above, this work will now be done by the AUD and is expected to be completed within the next 6 weeks. The NIH will, therefore, be able to complete the hydrological studies, and submit its report by 31<sup>st</sup> January 2017.

#### B.5 Security of the Plot

As reported in the last meeting of BOM, the security for Rohini plot had been taken over by AUD w.e.f from 01.04.2016 in keeping with the decision taken in the meeting held with CPM (Education) on 19.02.2016.

#### (C) Setting up of Campus Development Team

It was reported in the last meeting of BOM that as a result of recruitment drive undertaken to fill up various positions created for the Campus Development Division, one Architect, has already joined. One project engineer (civil) and one project engineer (electrical) have also joined the division, thereafter. The Campus Development Team now consists of a Director, a Co-Director (Technical), an Administrative Officer, an Assistant Registrar (Finance), an Architect, a Project Engineer (Civil), and a Project Engineer (Electrical). 2 posts of Senior Project Engineers in Electrical and Civil domain have been notified recently to be filled up on deputation basis.

#### (D) Monitoring Mechanism for new Campuses

As reported in last meeting of BOM, the Task Group/ Steering Committee headed by the VC, AUD is meeting on regular basis to monitor the progress of construction and other activities connected with the new campuses. The Steering Committee while reviewing the progress of work suggests ways and means for early initiation of project work and also its completion within a stipulated time frame. Valuable suggestions given by the Steering Committee has helped in chalking out strategies for early start of the projects and their completion within a stipulated time frame.

#### Dr. Niharika Banerjea

Dr. Niharika Banerjea joined AUD as Associate Professor with effect from 1.9.2015 in the pay band of Rs 37400-67000 with AGP of Rs,9000. The Committee noted that prior to joining AUD she was working in University of Southern Indiana. The Committee scrutinized the letter dated 6.5.2013 issued by the University of Southern Indiana regarding her promotion as Associate Professor and the salary statements submitted by Dr. Banerjea.

After carefully examining—the request of Dr. Niharika Banerjea and the documents provided by her the Committee observed that prior to joining AUD she was promoted as Associate Professor with effect from 20 8.2013 in the University of Southern Indiana and has acquired a good amount of teaching experience. The Committee, therefore, recommends grant of three advance increments (non-compoundable) with effect from the date of her joining AUD i.e. 1.9.2015.

#### Dr. Nakkeeran Nanjappan

Dr. Nakkeeran Nanjappan joined AUD on 16.11.2015 in the pay band of Rs 37400-67000 with AGP of Rs. 9000/- on contract basis for a period of three years extendable by another two years. The Committee noted that prior to joining AUD he was working as an Additional Professor in Public Health Foundation of India. # Activities of the Centre for Urban Ecology and Sustainability (CUES)

The Centre for Urban Ecology and Sustainability was established by the University in 2015. The Management Structure and Vision Document was approved by the BoM in its 18the meeting. The Centre is managed by a Director under the guidance of a duly constituted Advisory Board chaired by the Vice Chancellor.

A brief report of the activities of the Centre is summarised below:

# Capacity Building

**Human Resources:** The University has notified the Advisory Board for CUES and has appointed Dr. Suresh Babu, Associate Professor, School of Human Ecology as the Director, CUES (Enclosure-I). The Centre has appointed a team consisting of Research Assistants and Research Interns on contractual basis (as per present budgetary sanctions) to initiate various objectives of the Centre envisaged in the vision document. They are engaged in conducting research, collecting baseline data, preparing survey designs among other outreach activities. In addition, the Centre also takes help of Volunteer network setup with student groups at AUD.

Equipment: The centre has procured Survey instruments (Binoculars, Rangefinders, GPS, Digital camera, Spotting Scope), and Computers, laptops and printer have been procured with a start up grant that was provided by the University. Additional equipments as required under different thematic initatives are in the process of being procured. In addition, the Centre has access to the Analytical facilities of the Ecology Laboratory of the School of Human Ecology.

### Financial Sanctions

The University, in response to the consolidated Five Year Budgetary Proposal [FYBP] that accompanied the Vision Document, has approved a partial sanction of Rs 27,02,000/- (Recurring) and Rs. 6,50,000/- (non recurring/capital expenditure) for the year 2015-16 (Enclosure-II).

# Thematic Activities

# I. Wetlands Programme

 AUD has a Management Agreement with DDA to restore Dheerpur Wetlands, which is a major initiative coordinated by CUES, which aims to restore wetlands in an area of 25.38 Ha in the neighbourhood of AUD campus at Dheerpur. A brief report of activites during the last one year is enclosed at (Enclosure-III).

- Initiated a detailed research study on Referencing for the Dheerpur Wetland Park restoration and completed collection of baseline data on native and migratory birds, flora and fauna of the site.
- Research team made short field trips to Harike Bird Sanctuary in Punjab, Yamuna Biodiversity Park and Okhla Bird Sanctuary, and Sultanpur Bird Sanctuary in Haryana The objectives of these field trips were to understand the broad distributional patterns of wetland species and establish ecological references.

### II. Parks and Woodlands

- Vegetation Sampling is being conducted in Southern Ridge Forests of Delhi to understand present plant species distribution.
- A study in Sanjay Van to understand Distribution and Habitat Use of the Golden Jackal (Canis aureus) using camera trapping method has been initiated to gain insights into behaviour of urban adaptations of wild fauna

# III. Urban Sustainability

- In collaboration with The Eco Club of AUD (TERRA) conducted a bird count survey at the Dheerpur wetlands as part of the Campus Bird Count 2016.
- Plantation Drive at DWP: Saplings of native species which were arranged and produced from local and government nurseries were planted along avenues and boundaries of the wetland site during and after the monsoon season (approximately 1000 saplings of trees species and bamboo have been undertaken, along with introduction of 6 species of grasses)
- For Outreach Activities, Besides maintaining the Facebook (https://www.facebook.com/CUES.AUD/) and Twitter (https://twitter.com/cues\_aud) pages of CUES, the team also maintains two wordpress blog pages (https://cuesataud.wordpress.com/) and Urban Wetland Restoration (https://urbanwetlandrestoration wordpress.com/).
- Seminars and Public Lectures
  In collaboration with SHE, a public lecture by noted environmentalist
  Mr. Rahul Basu, on 'Mining issues in Goa, Intergenerational Equity and
  Resource Curse'.

## Collaborative initiatives with Schools of Study/ ongoing projects of AUD

 Under GIAN (MHRD Project) - Organizing a CUES-SHE Course on Urban Ecology, Integrating society and nature in the study of urban environments to be conducted by Prof. Daniel Schneider, University of Illinois (Scheduled between 15-22nd November).

- Environmental Management Committee of the University assisted in monitoring water quality at Kashmere Gate Campus and finalizing plan for plantation of native species in Rohini Campus.
- Campus Development Task Group and School of Design, to evolve a vision document of campuses - contributed to the vision document in terms of ecological contexts where our Campus Projects are located.

#### Other Achievements/Publications/Conferences and Seminars

- Director CUES, served as Member of Scientific Advisory Committee of the 8th INSEE Biennial Conference "Urbanization and the Environment" held at Bangalore from 4-6 January 2016. Dr Babu also Chaired sessions on "Culture, Consumption and Sustainability of Cities" and "Air Pollution, Solid Waste and Human Health".

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# A brief Report of Dheerpur Wetland Restoration Project (Nov 2015-Oct 2016)

A brief report of activities of the Dheerpur Wetland Restoration Project during the last year (Nov 2015- Oct 2016) is given below:

- Vegetation Surveys and mapping: In an effort to collect baseline data, researchers have completed a tree marking exercise which involves identifying tree species, assessing their general health, measuring their girth and height and recording their coordinates.
- Faunal survey. Developed standard methodology for conducting long term faunal surveys at Dheerpur Site. Avi-faunal sampling already underway with three cycles of bird count surveys conducted.
- Setting Up of a Field Nursery. A field nursery for managing the plantation requirements was set up at Dheerpur. Nursery consists of several saplings of native species in the nursery. Locally available wetland species are also collected and multiplied in the field nursery. Seeds of several grass species was also collected, processed and stored in the nursery. During this rainy season, about 1000 saplings of trees and bamboos were introduced at DWP Introduction of 6 species of wetland grasses were taken up in some parts of DWP.
- Setting Up of Field Station and Nursery: A temporary field station has been set up at the site to keep tools and various other field material. This temporary set-up is also used to conduct basic field based research, initiation of preliminary earthwork at certain places to prepare site for plantation and nursery development was undertaken. A large seasonal stormwater reservoir (~18 acres) was created by bunding one of the existing landforms. This reservoir was used document the physicochemical properties of the waterbody and sediments.
- Vector Control Programme: Vector control measures were undertaken to prevent breeding of mosquitoes in natural stormwater reservoir that included introduction of larvivorous fish (Gambusia affinis) In addition, Chemical Spraying of sewage filled areas with larvicide were undertaken.
- In pursuance with Detailed Project Proposal Submitted to DDA for action, DDA has completed the boundary wall on about 3/4<sup>th</sup> of project area. Two tubewells have been sanctioned and the detailed earthwork and desilting is expected to start in February 2017. Two large metal gates are also being installed at the East and Southern entrances to the Park.

# Status report of AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE)

Status Report: January – October 2016

#### Introduction

AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE) has been registered as a Not-for-Profit organisation under section 8 of the Companies Act 2013 with the main objectives of (i) translating theoretical and conceptual learning into socially useful practice, and (ii) to reach out to the less-privileged section of society at the bottom of the pyramid who may not otherwise have access to new knowledge and contemporary practices. The centre will facilitate technical mentorship and assist to generate financial support from angel investors, venture capital funding, CSR and other governmental and corportae sources to nurture potentially viable ideas to be set up as viable enterprises in the social sector.

In the 17<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Board of Management held on the 7<sup>th</sup> of October 2014 (Item No. 4), the BoM, AUD had resolved that (i) AUD may provide necessary space, infrastructure, furniture, fixtures, equipment and other facilities to set up ACIIE and (ii) AUD will extend full financial assistance to pay the emoluments of the core staff of ACIIE in the initial phase of 5 years


#### AUD - ACIIE Interface

In order to ensure autonomy while at the same time maintaining direct interface with AUD, it was decided that the Director/ Dean, School of SBPPSE and the Dean, SDes shall be ex-officio first Directors promoting the Incubation Centre as a section 8 company holding 5000 shares each on whose behalf AUD shall invest a total of Rs 100, 000/- towards a total of 10000 shares as equity capital. In other words, the SBPPSE and SDes are the initial investors of ACIIE, as a sectuion 8 company. It was also decided that the position of the Director, Board of ACIIE, shall be coterminous with the position of Director/ Dean of the School, SBPPSE and SDes respectively, who will be Mèmbers on the Board of ACIIE. In other words, as soon as an incumbent relinquishes the position of the Director/Dean of the above mentioned schools, he/she shall cease to be the Director on the ACIIE Board and the new incumbent will become the Director in place of the outgoing Director/ Dean of the school.

The AUD Centre for Incubation, Innovation & Entrepreneurship (ACIIE) was registered with Certification of Incorporation No. U74999DL2016NPL289333 dated 5<sup>th</sup> Day of January 2016 issued by the Registrar of Companies, N.C.T. of Delhi & Haryana approving the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company (copy of MoA attached).

Moreover, while ACIIE will function as an independent entity as a Not-for-Profit company, it was further decided to create a special arrangement by constituting an

Executive Board, for the supervision and management of the day-to-day operations of ACIIE comprising the following members:



# Progress since March 2016-10-20

- ACIIE, through AUD, received a grant of Rs 1.5 crore as seed money from the government of the NCT of Delhi in March 2016 to meet the initial expenses of the incubation centre including infrastructural expenses and manpower costs. It is also given to understand that on spending the initial grant of 1.5 crore during the current financial year (2016-2017), the government of the NCT of Delhi is likely to advance more funds for the incubation centre.
- Shri M.S. Farooqi has been appointed through a due process as the first Executive Director, ACIIE. Mr Farooqi assumed office of ED, ACIIE w.e.f 8<sup>th</sup> June 2016, on deputation from the School of Design for an initial period of 3 years.
- Professor Kuriakose Mamkoottam, who retired in May 2016 as Director, SBPPSE, AUD, and who was nominated by the Vice Chancellor, as the Executive Chairperson, assumed office on 1<sup>st</sup> August 2016 for a period of 3 years.
- ACIIE has been allocated the mezzanine floor of WS-3 to set its office and operations. The mezzanine floor has been renovated to accommodate the skeletal manpower and to create workstations to accommodate 10-12 incubatees. The centre is in the process of getting the space suitably furnished.
- ACIIE has completed the due process for appointing a suitable person in the position of Administrative cum Accounts Manager to assist the Executive Director in its day-to-day administration and financial management.
- Since the first week of August 2016, ACIIE has been making efforts to
  interact with the students of AUD, especially those who are in the final
  year of studies in various programmes, to communicate the objectives
  and proposed activities of ACIIE and to attract and motivate students to
  get engaged with the Centre. Several rounds of interactive sessions
  were organized for which limited response was received from students.
- A day-long workshop was organized on Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> October 2016 with the help of an external expert as facilitator on the theme of ideation in which around 27 students from various programmes participated. The student found the workshop interesting and useful providing clarity in their thinking towards developing ideas, which have entrepreneurial potential.

- A follow-up half-day workshop is being organized for the same set of students in the afternoon on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> October 2016, again with the help of an external facilitator on the theme of Imagining to enable students to think laterally and elaborately on their ideas.
- ACIIE hosted Ms. Belinda Bell, Programme Director, Cambridge Social Ventures, Cambridge Judge Business School, Cambridge University, on 19<sup>th</sup> /20<sup>th</sup> October 2016. Ms Belinda Bell visited ACIIE on 20<sup>th</sup> October and held an interactive session with AUD students on Issues relating to Social Entrepreneurship.
- ACIIE is in the process of getting a website designed and developed through due process.
- ACIIE proposes to hold further workshops on how to prepare a
  business plan, revenue model etc. to help students to articulate their
  ideas and prepare proper proposals, which may be further screened
  and scrutinized by a committee consisting of experience entrepreneurs
  before they are admitted by ACIIE for mentoring and financial support.

Since January 2016 five meetings of the Board of Directors, ACIIE, were held to deliberate on various matters; and the first Annual General Meting of the company was hed on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2016, in which the audited accounts and the Directors' Report were passed and the auditor of the company for the next year has been appointed.

Similarly the Executive Board of ACIIE has been meeting regularly to discuss and decide all matters of importance relating to ACIIE. In the 7<sup>th</sup> meeting held on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2016, the Executie Board expressed its deep appreciation of the decision of the BoM of AUD to allocate space, extend financial support for infrastrutural facilities and manpower etc for the initial phase of 3-5 years. However, the Executive Board has recommended that for the time being the expenses towards infrastructural development, purchase of equipment, furniture and manpower costs etc. should be met from the grant received from the government as this fund is more easily accessible to ACIIE enabling speedy payment etc. Moreover, utilizing the initial seed money fruitfully within the current financial year will also make ACIIE eligible for further grants from the government.

At the same time, the Executive Board of ACIIE noted that the idea of setting up the Incubation Centre was approved by the AUD BoM much before the grant was given by the Delhi Government and therefore resolved that the University may be requested to continue to extend appropriate financial support in the unlikely event of not being able to generate adequate funds from the government or other sources in the near future, especially during the first phase of five years.

Conceptualising Teacher Education at Ambedkar University Delhi (AUD)

## 1. Vision of the School of Education Studies (SES)

The School of Education Studies at Ambedkar University sims to bridge the gap between theory and practice of education in its multiple locations. It attempts to foster greater convergence between the study of education as a social phenomenon and the preparation of professional educators informed by local and global perspectives.

Since its inception in 2011, it has been an endeavour of the School to locate education within the wider contexts, structures and processes of society, culture and political economy and bring together multiple disciplinary perspectives to understand the challenges and questions of education. These understandings will guide us to develop sustained relationships with systems of education, in particular with the public systems, and with practicing educators, to make critical and constructive interventions.

# 2. Institutional Structures and Programmes

AUD is organized into Schools and Centres, where academic programmes are housed in Schools and Centres have been created to facilitate research and dissemination of knowledge in specific areas of significance. SES and the Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development (CECED) engage with education and children through academic programmes and research as shown in Table 1. SES currently offers two M.A. programmes: (a) M.A. Education and (b) M.A. Education (ECCE) has been offered in collaboration with CECED).

## 3. Challenges for Teacher Education

 The existing systems and models of school education have not been able to respond to the challenges of quality education and deteriorating learning levels.

- Pic-service teacher education is marked by crass privatisation and lack of professionalism.
   There is a need to strengthen the public education system through pre-service teacher education programmes, preparation of teacher educators and robust in-service programme for teachers and administrators.
- In-service programmes designed by DIETs, SCERT and departments of teacher
  education in the universities often work in isolation from each other with little
  collaborative networks and common knowledge to augment teacher development
  capacities.
- Delhi's specificaties with regard to diversity, immigration, inequalities across social groups and spaces and, stratified educational provisions demands re-envisioning of teacher education programmes

The situation needs a 'significant paradigm shift' in the teacher education model as well as the model for preparation of teacher educators, with the core aim of enhancing the quality of teacher education in public institutions in line with international standards—with twin aims of improving quality of teaching-learning in schools and knowledge production.

# 4. Responding to the Challenges: Teacher Education Programmes at AUD

Considering these challenges, School of Education Studies at AUD envisions a futuristic and immovative model of teacher education that simultaneously addresses concerns about teachers' subject knowledge and pedagogic understanding informed by ethos of democracy, secularism, equity and justice with care and nurture at its centre.

Some of the important features of proposed innovative programmes would be:

- 1. Holistic approach to think about teacher education with inclusion and equity at the centre
- 2. Provisions for entry at different entry levels, trains professionals from school teachers at pre-printary stage to teacher educators and interconnects pre-service and in-service
  - (a) Pre-service teacher education programmes: Two defined pre-service teacher education trajectories in the 4-year B.A.B.Ed. programme based on levels of school education
    - Pre-primary + primary: To enable a sound foundation in child "development, learning, participatory knowledge creation and societal values
    - ii) Upper primary + secondary: To promote robust disciplinary knowledge and higher order skills and abilities
  - (b) 3-year integrated B.Ed.-M.Ed. and 2-year M.Ed. programmes for preparation of teacher educators
- 3. Break isolation of teacher education institutions from
  - a) Úniversity/multidisciplinary environment.
  - b) In-service programmes, educational practitioners and communities
  - c) School systems
- 4. Professionalise teacher education through
  - a) Integration of subject knowledge and pedagogic knowledge
  - b) Intensive internship/ field experience of working in schools in Delhi
  - c) Interface of teaching, research and field experience

- d) Collaborative engagements with state institutions like DIET, SCERT, schools in Delhi
- e) Teacher capacity development programmes through in-service, credit based courses and research
- f) Teacher resource centre
- 5. Weave research and policy analysis with pre-service and in-service programmes through
  - a) Collaboration with the Centre for Early Childhood Education and Development (CECHD)
  - b) Ph.D. Programme
  - c) Faculty research
  - d) Research with and by school teachers

SES plans to offer a set of programmes aimed at preparing teachers, teacher educators, administrators and other professionals to address concerns about quality of education, teacher capacities, and systemic challenges of public school system in a holistic manner. # 6. Strengths and core capabilities of School of Education Studies
